DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Crescent Hill Branch Library is located in the eastern section of the city of Louisville in the Crescent Hill neighborhood. The area is primarily residential, with the Frankfort Ave. strip as the commercial hub of the area.

The library is a one-story, buff brick building designed in the Beaux-Arts style. The facade is symmetrical with a central portico and flanking three-window groupings. The portico has paired fluted Doric columns which support an entablature of triglyphs and metopes which continues around all sides of the structure. The pediment over the portico is lined with block modillions, as is the cornice which also continues around all sides of the structure. The entrance contains double doors and a semi-circular transom under an arch with garland molding and a keystone. The three-window groupings on the facade and sides of the structure have stone surrounds and keystones. A red, pantile hip roof caps the structure. The building rests on a raised basement which has entrances on either side of the front stairs, directly beneath the window groupings.

In 1961, a one-story addition was made to the west side of the structure. It is constructed of the same buff colored brick and continues the entablature motifs found on the original building as well as the same scale.

The main room of the library is light and airy with pilasters containing classical scrolls and garlands adorning the walls. The room has a simple classical crown molding. The library also has an auditorium in the basement.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Crescent Hill Branch Library is one of nine Carnegie endowed libraries in the city of Louisville. It is an excellent example of the Beaux-Arts style, and was designed by the local firm of Thomas and Bohne in 1908.

The current library system in Louisville was begun under the Carnegie funding in 1902. The Main Branch of the Louisville Free Public Library was opened in 1908 on York St. Branch libraries rapidly thereafter began opening.

Of the nine Carnegie endowed libraries in Louisville, five are listed on the National Register: The Main Branch, Jefferson Branch, Western Branch, Parkland Branch, and the Highland Branch. The Shelby Park Branch Library is pending listing. The quality of design which was insisted upon for these Carnegie endowed libraries is evident in all examples.

The Crescent Hill Branch was one of the first branch libraries to be constructed. It was completed in 1908, the same year that the Main Branch was completed. The design is one by Thomas and Bohne, a Louisville architectural firm. In 1889, the firm was begun as Drach and Thomas. F. R. Bohne joined that firm in 1894 after prolific partnership with F. W. Mowbray, architect for Louisville's Union Station. Many Victorian residences in Old Louisville and the Highlands neighborhoods of Louisville were designed by Mowbray and Bohne. Drach and Thomas designed many commercial and industrial buildings in Louisville, and several of the finest residences in the Russell Historic District. Thomas and Bohne also designed Firehouse #21, located on Frankfort Avenue at Franck Ave., six blocks north of the library. The firehouse is pending listing.

The design of the Crescent Hill Branch Library is classical in its proportions. The decorative details are simple and elegant. It is an excellent example of the Beaux-Arts style as adapted to a small building. It is an amenity to the Crescent Hill neighborhood both educationally and aesthetically.
