The Prescott House is a large wooden residence with a gable roof and clapboard siding. Attached to the east side of the two-and-one-half story structure is a two-story wing with a shed roof. A small utility wing joins this section with a two-story carriage barn that is positioned at a right angle to the house.

The entire complex is ornamented in the Italianate style. Both the house and the carriage barn have wood quoins at each corner. There is a four-story tower joined to the center of the south facade. Bay windows, located on the south and west elevations, have paired brackets supporting a cornice. This motif is repeated on the cornice for the gable roof and on the mansardic roof of the tower. The latter is ornamented with a bullseye dormers and cast iron cresting. Two small porches, one over the main entrance at the base of the tower and one at the intersection of the ell, have chamfered posts, brackets and pendants. Finally, the carriage barn has a small cupola.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The J. L. Prescott House is the largest, most finely executed and most stylish house of its' period in southern York County. It is particularly interesting to find it in a small rural community which boasts only one other house, the Queen Anne Mary Hurd House (N.R.) of consequence.

Unknown

The house was built by J. L. Prescott, owner and president of the Prescott Stove Polish Comapny, then located in North Berwick. Prescott was much involved in Maine politics and entertained both Governor Joshua L. Chamberlain and his successor, Governor Sidney Perham, at the house. He remained in the house for only a relatively short time, however, since he relocated the stove polish plant to New Jersey in the early 1880's.

At the present the house is in deplorable condition but has not lost any of its important features. The York-Cumberland Housing Development Corporation has received confirmation of Fund Reservation from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development of \$854,100.00 for restoration and rehabilitation for multiple housing.
