Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Orme Wilson Storehouse is located approximately one-quarter mile from the Tennessee River (Watts Bar Lake) in Loudon, the county seat of Loudon County. The two-story, birck, trapezoidal commercial building was built on a rectangular lot prior to 1852. It stands on a brick foundation and has a flat roof.

The most distrinctive feature of the building is its simply designed facade (northeast elevation). This wall is divided into three clearly defined bays and each bay has round-head openings. Protruding pentagonal-shaped bricks outline the apertures and emphasize the vertical lines of the building. The stories are also clearly defined by the stepped belt courses above and below the second-story windows. A corbeled, brick cornice girds the building. All windows have been covered with corrugated metal sheets or plywood. Two of the original paneled, double-leaf doors remain; the third entrance has been sealed with white bricks. Each entrance had a semi-circular transom. Although the original steps have been removed, the limestone continuous door sill was retained.

The windows in the remaining walls have segmental arch openings. A single-story frame shet building was recently attached to the northwest wall and painted reddish-brown to match the building. Except for some damaged bricks in the facade, the structure appears to be in good condition.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

When the commercial district of a small town shifts to a new location, the older buildings begin to deteriorate, few new businesses move into the area, and an air of hopelessness prevails. The interiors of buildings in the old commercial area are changed and the exteriors modernized in the hope that the improvements will stimulate business. Since many commercial buildings were strictly utilitarian in design, the community frequently welcomes the altered appearances of their commercial buildings. Some buildings, however, have retained their original appearances because the design was so pleasing or it exhibited fine craftsmanship. Such a building is the Orme Wilson Storehouse.

Before the Civil War and for many years after, the Tennessee River was one of the main commercial arteries in East Tennessee, and Loudon was a major port on the river. The town built a steamboat wharf in the late 1820s, and during the ensuing years a business district flourished around this entreport. By 1852 Orme Wilson and Company had built a storehouse in the heart of this commerical area. When the East Tennessee and Georgia Railroad reached Loudon in 1853, a second business district was built near the railroad, and for a time the town served both steamboat and rail commerce. Orme Wilson and Company later moved their operation to the railroad, but the old building continued to be used.

The storehouse has survived numerous vicissitudes, among which were the permanent shift of the town's commercial center after the Civil War, the result of the decline of river traffic, and the construction of the US 11 highway and bridge near the building. Over the years it has served as a glove factory, apartment house, and church; it is presently used as a warehouse for a hardware store. The storehouse is an important structure to the town of Loudon as a reminder of its early days as an important river port.
