#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The former Greek-Shears Mortuary is located at 118-120 Walnut Street in the block between Southeast First and Second Streets. Adjacent to the Riverside Historic District (National Register, 1978), the Greek-Shears structure is also situated just two blocks southeast of Evansville's central business district.

The two-building complex was designed in the Spanish Colonial Revival tradition popular from about 1915 to 1945. A two-and-one-half story brick house, erected approximately forty years prior to the construction of the mortuary, stands on the alleyside of the lot. A steeply-pitched red tile gabled roof, the length of which faces the street, surmounts the plain projecting eaves. The body of the house was laid in common bond red brick, later painted yellow to match the yellow brick facade of the new mortuary building. Arched radiating voussoirs adorn the seg mented, relieving-arched window-heads on the alleyside, while the plain sills on the facade are limestone. windows, double-hung sashes with 1/1 lights, are slightly recessed; one window on the lower elevation has been considerably lengthened, probably an alteration made in recent years. The house's Italianate facade was remodelled to convey the Spanish Colonial motif when the newer structure was completed. The entire two-and-one-half-story complex is decorated with light buff brick and a limestone trim which encircles the base of the edifice and caps the flatroofed gallery attached to the house.

The new addition has a clearly-defined rectangular plan and is ten bays in length. An arcaded wall treatment is the most outstanding feature on the facade of the overall complex. A row of bricks surrounds the windows which are further defined by a large keystone on the window-head and one smaller one on either side of the window. The tympanum is filled in with red tile blocks, and a stone cartouche accents each tympanum. Windows sills are limestone, and the slightly-recessed paired lights, separated by a thin pilaster strip, are multi-paned. Stone flower boxes supported by a triple volute underscore many of the windows as well as the arched openings on the gallery.

The impressive portal to the former mortuary is also surrounded by the same brick trim and keystone features of the arcaded windows. A red brick esplanade encircles the front of the building. Both entranceways on the facade enhance the delicate beauty of Spanish Colonial Revival architecture with their multi-paned glass doors; the door at the main entrance to the old mortuary is double-leafed, with glass side panels flanking either side of the flat-headed door. Multi-paned transom panels above the door appear to formerly have been glass panes that were later covered with yellow paint, and colorful tiles brighten the walls and floor of the entranceway. At the far right end of the complex is a large, impressive arched garage entrance with a Spanish-style wrought iron gate and red brick interior. Like the house, the mortu ary

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Greek-Shears Mortuary is one of Evansville's oldest continuing mortuaries. Established in 1864, the business has undergone a series of name-changes, as well as changes of locations. Today the successive firm remains one of the most prominent in Evansville.

The mortuary was originally named after its founder, Robert Smith, who along with his brother Fred, opened the business after serving in the Civil War. In 1930, the Robert Smith Mortuary moved to their sixth location when the new edifice at 120 Walnut Street, adjacent to the Riverside Historic District (National Register, 1978), was completed. The new custom-built mortuary adjoined a two-story house at 118 Walnut Street that was erected in about 1890. The house was remodelled to match the new mortuary.

Designed by local architect Fritz Anderson, who practiced in Evansville from approximately 1915 to 1942, and constructed by the Scarborough Corpor ation, the mortuary complex received attention for the beauty of its classic design—an uncommon design in Evansville which seems to have been influenced by the Spanish Colonial Revival architectural mode. The new mortuary was described as a "commanding structure" and as "a distinct asset to the city from both the standpoint of architecture and service." Indeed, the yellow brick paired against the roof's deep red tile conveys a colorful, if not impressive, appearance. The arcaded wall treatment vastly enhances the wall design; of particular note are the windows which are accented by stone cartouches and red tile blocks forming the tympanum of the arched, multi-paned casement windows. Colorful tile, probably imported, can also be found on the walls and floor of the entranceway. As far as can be determined, the former mortuary is in pristine condition.

For forty-four years, the Robert Smith Mortuary, which was later renamed the Greek-Shears Mortuary, remained on Walnut Street. After 1974, the house once again became a single-family residence, and the old mortuary was converted into apartments by its present owner; throughout the years, however, virtually no alterations have been made to the building's exterior.

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structure has a steeply-pitched red tile roof with shed dormers and slanting, parapet gables; each end also has a small attic window, one of which is vented.

The rear of the complex features a garage seven bays in length which once housed the mortuary's hearses.
