

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Situated in the center of a lot near the south end of the original commercial core on Main Street in Spearfish, the Henry Court house is a two story Queen Anne dwelling. Rising from a parged stone foundation, the rectangular wood frame building is covered with clapboard siding and a corner trim. It is capped by a central hip roof with intersecting gables all of which are covered with asphalt shingles. There are two brick chimneys on the roof. The wood porch at the front entrance has a gable roof forming a triangular pediment supported by turned wood columns. There is a metal handrail on each side. To the left of the main entrance is a two story porch wing that appears to have been added to the house - probably at an early date. On the rear of the house is a one story section, original to the building, containing the kitchen and back bedroom. It has materials similar to those found in the rest of the house. The small porch that extends from the rear of the building has been re-sided with plywood paneling. There is a fairly low and unobtrusive redwood deck extending off the rear of the house. Fenestration includes one over one double-hung windows on all facades of the building and some fixed small pane windows on the stairway. The wood windows on the front sleeping porch and the back porch are fixed with small pane surrounds. Most of the windows have aluminum storms. The floor plan is asymmetrical. The main entrance, on the northeast corner, opens into a hall and stairway that leads to the upper floor. To the left of the entrance hall is the front and back parlor with the dining room and kitchen to the rear of the hallway. Most of the original interior elements including the turned stair balustrade and handrail, the door and window trim, and base detail still exist. There is a corner fireplace in the back parlor but the brick appears to be a later addition. The dining room has been completely remodeled by the current owners. The kitchen has also been modernized to some degree with new appliances and cabinet work. Most of the original paneled wood doors remain intact.

In the northwest corner of the property is a one story wood frame garage (noncontributing) with drop lap siding and a gable roof with asphalt shingles. The building has been altered extensively on the east side with the addition of a wood frame appendage covered with vertical boards and a shed roof. It is now used as a greenhouse with storage in the rear.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the Henry Court House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a good example of the Queen Anne style of architecture as popular in Spearfish, South Dakota, during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Pian, the nominated property relates to the following historical context: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement (1858-present), D.2. Urban Development/Residences (1858-1899).

During the last two decades of the 19th Century, Queen Anne styling dominated domestic building throughout the nation. Influenced by the work of English architect Richard Norman Shaw, Queen Anne houses provided increased comfort and domesticity for single-family households. Prominent aesthetic features of the style include Irregularity and asymmetry of facades, irregular roof lines, multiplicity of siding materials - especially the use of fishscale shingles, and decorative treatments to gable ends, porches, and projecting bays. The front facade is usually divided into uneven squares or planes. Fenestration is always asymmetrical, often consisting of a number of shapes and sizes of windows. Often a tower is incorporated into the design. The Henry Court home is a good illustration of the applications of these elements.

Spearfish, located on the eastern rim of the Black Hills, was founded in 1876 in response to the emerging gold rush. It quickly grew into a vital service community for the area miners and ranchers. In the mid-1880's the city became the home of Black Hills Normal School, now known as Black Hills State University. Henry Court came to Spearfish in 1880. In 1883 he opened a confectionery and fruit store. By the late 1800's he served on the Spearfish City Council for two terms and as a member of the state legislature. From 1881-1885 he was postmaster in Spearfish.

The period of significance of the nominated property does not extend beyond the date of construction in 1898.
