DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Lancaster Presbyterian Church was built ca. 1862 in the Early Gothic Revival style. Building dimensions are 60' by 37'. The stone foundation supports a water table of stuccoed brick. The walls, approximately 16" thick, are of handmade brick.

The entrance facade features a projecting narthex with crenellated parapet. It was originally accentuated with a tripartite portal configuration of which only the central door remains intact. Located above the narthex is a pointed-arched window, while on each side is a lancet window. The apex of the gable features a bargeboard.

Originally, a tower supporting a steeple rose from the left side. According to church records, a committee recommended in 1884 that the steeple be demolished and replaced with a new design. Sometime after ca. 1910, the tower was completely removed.

The sides of the church are composed of five bays with brick label moldings surmounting the tall, narrow windows. The windows on the sides (directly adjacent to the front facade) are bricked-in. The lower portions of the other windows were bricked in ca. 1930, but the original stained glass is still intact in their upper sections.

<u>Interior:</u> Two doors lead from the narthex into the church sanctuary. Basilican in plan, the church features a gallery along the sides and back of the sanctuary and culminates in an arched pulpit apse. The walls are stuccoed and scored to resemble stone (although presently covered by painted canvas). The original ceiling is plaster on split lath but has been covered by a wooden ceiling.

Interesting details include hood moldings over the arches, cornice brackets with pendants under the gallery, and round wooden columns supporting the gallery.

The church is presently in poor condition. Prior to the stabilization now in progress, portions of the roof had collapsed, thereby extensively damaging the floor. Brickwork needs repointing, windows need repairing, and the ceiling needs replacing. Despite these obstacles, a very active preservation organization has been formed to restore the building and adapt it to a community use. In 1976 the South Carolina General Assembly authorized \$5,000 to finance the project which has also received a Bicentennial grant of \$5,000.

<u>Surroundings</u>: The cemetery, dating from the 1830s, is located to the left and rear of the church.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lancaster Presbyterian Church, located near the center of Lancaster, South Carolina, has played an integral part in this community's history since the mid 1800s. The church cemetery, significant in its own right, contains the graves of many of the town's leading citizens. Completed ca. 1862, the present church is thought to have been the first brick church in Lancaster County.

The Lancasterville Presbyterian Church was organized in 1835. In that year Eliza S. Gill deeded one acre and 18 poles, "whereon the Presbyterian church is built," to the trustees of the Presbyterian Church. The first pastor of the church was the Rev. James H. Thornwell who served until 1838. (Thornwell later became a leading Presbyterian and educator and served as President of South Carolina College from 1851 to 1855.)

In 1860 it was decided to erect a new church (the present structure) on the site of the original one. The contract was given to Sidney Retting of Charlotte, North Carolina, and the church was completed by January 1862. Designed in the Early Gothic Revival style, this church was dedicated on March 29, 1862.

Prominent local individuals have been associated with the church throughout its history. These include George McCottry Witherspoon (1812-1898), a commissioner of public buildings, member of the South Carolina House of Representatives, member of the South Carolina Senate, a district judge, and probate judge of Lancaster County; and Leroy Springs (1861-1931), a leading manufacturer and banker who organized several cotton mills in the area, including the present-day Springs Mill.

The church cemetery contains the graves of many of Lancaster's leading citizens. These include:

Dr. Joseph Henry Foster (1835-1885), Brigadier General/Medical Corps, Confederate Army

Dr. Robert L. Crawford (1825-1862), a captain in the Confederate Army, a signer of the Ordinance of Secession

Colonel James H. Witherspoon, Jr. (1810-1865), judge of the Court of Ordinary for Lancaster District, Commissioner in Equity for Lancaster District

In 1926 the congregation moved to a new church on Main Street in Lancaster. The old structure was then used by another church and later by the Masons. In 1962 it was purchased by Dr. Benjamin F. Emanuel under whose direction it became the Carolina Museum. Unoccupied since 1972, the church was purchased in 1976 by the Lancaster County Society for Historical Preservation, Inc. Plans are presently being made to use the church as a community center and park.
