and probably a later modification. Fireplaces in the west end of the house have been removed. In the east end there are stone corner fireplaces on the first story with stone foundations in the basement and simple wooden mantels. There are pegged doors and door frames on the first floor and a narrow, steep staircase with vertical-board paneling. Doors on the second floor are of vertical boards but are not pegged. Roof rafters are numbered and pegged. Exterior details include a denticulated cornice and back-banded moldings around doors and windows. A one-story porch covers the entrance and has saw tooth trim, paired posts, and a balustrade. A two-story ell is at the rear with a one-story addition on the rear of the ell. A porch is on the west side of the ell with an exterior staircase to the second floor.

deed mentions an improvement. Remley sold the property, along with several other Middletown lots, to John C. Marshall in 1838. In 1839 Marshall sold it to Charles E. Beynroth and it was owned by the Beynroth family until 1924. Possibly Beynroth enlarged and clapboarded an existing one-story log structure after buying the property in 1839. With the exception of closing the fireplaces on the west end of the house and adding bathrooms on the second floor, the house has been little-altered. The rear ell appears to be a late nineteenth-century addition.
