The Peter Powers House of Deer Isle, Maine, built in 1785, is a remarkably well preserved and rare example of the cape style dwelling with a gambrel roof.

The house is of l_2^1 stories with a central brick chimney, clapboard siding, and field-stone foundation. Fenestration throughout is 9/6, save for the second story of the east end which contains 6/6 windows.

The facade, which faces south, is three bays wide with a central entrance consisting of a single panelled door. But for the fact that bay enframements project slightly, detailing on the house is of the utmost simplicity. The ends of the house contain two bays in each story.

Projecting from the east end of the building is a one-story, gambrel-roofed entry. This was constructed around 1960, but was harmoniously designed and well built. East of the house is a gable-roofed barn of two stories with shingle siding.

Internally, the Powers House is likewise very well preserved, featuring two principal rooms on each floor and original fireplaces. As with the exterior, function dominates over decoration.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In 1785 the First Congregational Church of Deer Isle, which had originally gathered in 1773, issued a call to Rev. Peter Powers of Newbury, Vermont, to become their first settled minister. Powers, New Hampshire born and a Harvard graduate, had been among the founders of Dartmouth College in 1769. The call included an offer of \pm 100 annual stipend, 100 acres of land from the 400 acre ministerial grant established by the General Court of Massachusetts together with a house, 20 X 32 feet to be built thereon "in such manner as such buildings are commonly finished in country towns".

Mr. Powers, a strong and outspoken supporter of independence who had largely alienated himself from his predominantly Tory parish in Vermont, accepted with alacrity. He moved into his snug new house and served his Deer Isle flock faithfully until his death in 1800.

This small dwelling, the oldest house in Deer Isle that has survived intact, is particularly unusual in having a gambrel roof, rare in Maine and especially on a Cape. The extreme simplicity of the interior attests to its authenticity as an early rural abode.

Significance is also derived from its first occupant, a man of no little achievement and distinction,
