7. Description.

The main interior space of the armory has always been the large drill-hall with its tall windows. Originally, however, this was somewhat diminished by a ward-room on each side of the main entrance at the west. In the 1890's these two rooms were re-located in the eastern extension of the building, where other small rooms were built above them and where there was installed a stairway which also serves the basement and a shallow balcony overlooking the drill-hall. Probably at this same time occurred the application around the drill-hall of a five-foot wainscot of quartered oak. Two large glazed cabinets and three exit doors now fill the east wall of the drill-hall below the balcony. Behind the cabinets and through the doors are, on first-floor level, the flag room, the drum-corps room and the stairwell. Above are the quartermaster's room, two storage rooms and access to the balcony. The basement now contains the company room, a kitchen, toilet facilities and a heater room—the first and second of these taking up most of the space.

The building is owned by the State of Rhode Island but continues in occupancy by the Kentish Guards, who meet there every week and who preserve their records, relics and trophies of nearly two hundred years of existence there.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

The Armory of the Kentish Guards is a fine example of Greek Revival architecture as used for semi-public buildings which, however small, were nevertheless intended to have a dignified and -- if possible -- monumental aspect. This is achieved here through the portico and the arrangement of openings which it contains. The building has, of course, been since its erection a visually pleasing landmark of East Greenwich. It still serves its original purpose, housing the activities of the volunteer miltia unit or "chartered company" for which it was built.

This group, the Kentish Guards, has importance in Rhode Island history. It was founded and named in 177h by fifty-six citizens of Kent County; its first captain was James Varnum, and at the beginning it redieved military training under the direction of Nathanael Greene. By April of 1775 the body had grown to one hundred and ten men, who set forth on the march within three hours of hearing of the Concord-Lexington battles. They subsequently returned to East Greenwich and throughout the Revolutionary War garrisoned harbour and other local defences. During the War of 1812 they were stationed at Newport, and during Dorr's Rebellion in this state in 1842 they were sent to protect the State Arsenal in Providence. The Guards provided two full infantry companies in the Civil War. The fifth-oldest chartered military company in the United States, this body has provided many men besides Varum and Greene who have been prominent in Rhode Island's military history.
