#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Perkins Memorial is a 2 1/2 story house with 9 principal rooms. Built in a style resembling an English manor house of the 15th or 16th century, the house has a fieldstone ground floor, with timber frame and rough trowelled stucco in the upper stories. The L shaped plan consists of a central entrance hall and stair, with the living room on the left and the dining room on the right. The kitchen wing which is behind the dining room, forms the "L" extention.

Above each of these rooms is a principal bedroom. There is a large bathroom either side of the central bedroom and an additional bathroom on the outer wall of the bedroom above the kitchen wing.

The 3rd floor garret has 3 principal spaces which occur directly above the entrance hall, the living room and the dining room. The kitchen wing has no 3rd floor. The garret room, which is over the living room, has a gable on the front, side, and rear of the house. The rear gable is bisected by a flue from the living room fireplace. This room was originally intended to be a billiard room, by the architect. The garret room which is over the entrance hall, has a hip dormer, which occurs on the front of the house. There is a bathroom directly behind this central room, which occupies a gable over the main stair hall. The garret room which is directly over the dining room has a gable on the front and side of the house.

This yields a roughly symmetrical entrance facade, with a central entrance porch. Each side of the porch there occurs a large gothic bay window, under a framed overhanging story, which terminates in a gable on the third floor.

In addition to the entrance porch, there is an end porch off the living room, this has a glassed in sleeping porch above (added later). There is a similar porch off the dining room. This one has a veranda above.

The exterior detailing is well crafted, with turned pendants and framing principals under the projecting overhangs, a tie beam front porch with scrolls and extended lateral girths, and thick walls with heavily incised window framing. In addition, the gable ends have heavy tie beams with strong vertical studs and wide barge boards. The front porch tie beam is inscribed as follows "D. & A. P. 1910" The porch also features tuned Jacobean balusters.

The interior features some fine colonial revival woodwork. In addition to its long rectangular bay window, the living room has a large inglenook framed in oak paneling with a fireplace mantle resting on a doric frieze. There are also french windows opening to a side porch. The dining room has a large semihexagonal bay window with a framed window seat. There are a pair of china cabinets with round

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head panel doors which occur either side of the doorway between the dining room and the entrance hall. This doorway has paneled doors, which fold back in a manner similar to screens.

There are also French windows on the end wall which lead to a side porch. The entrance and stair hall has oak chambered columns with scrolls, which support the half turn winding stair case. The stair is in 4 straight sections with a landing halfway up, which is formed in a semihexagonal bay, with 3 windows on the rear of the house. The stair also features a central elevator and elaborately cut and turned balusters in the jacobean style.

Adjacent to the house is the garage which has a garret apartment above. This was built in the 1930s in a similar style to the house.

The house is located on large roughly triangular tract of land which is planted with old evergreens which frame picturesque views of the house when viewed from Main Street.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Perkins Memorial was designed by Herbert C. Wise, a Philadelphia architect who appears to have been of some prominance. He co-authored 2 books, the first of which is of particular interest owing to Wise's use of colonial woodwork in Perkins.

His first book was

Colonial Architecture for Those About to Build

#### subtitle

Being the Best Examples, Domestic, Municipal, and Institutional, in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware, with Observations Upon the Local Building Art of the 18th Century.

(1913)

His second book was

College Architecture in America: and Its Part in the Development of the Campus.

(1929)

It is unusual to find an architect of this prominance working in New Jersey before the First World War.

The Perkins Memorial embodies many of the "craftsman" ideals, together with other concepts generally associated with the craftsman movement. This can be seen in its use of the inglenook, its solid simplicity, and its clean articulation. Moreover, the colonial and medieval styling is of a type which was becoming increasingly associated with naturalism, and going "back to basics". These styles are more or less correctly used, which also places the house within the context of an increasingly academic eclecticism. In this way Perkins Memorial can be understood as embodying characteristics from both major ideological poles which were prevalent at the turn of the century.

One of the earliest members of the Evesham Baptist Church (founded in 1803) was Mrs. Anne Perkins. This is the earliest extant evidence of the Perkins family in Moorestown.

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Joseph French and John Perkins established the Fairview Nurseries in West Moorestown in 1815. Joseph French died in 1825 and John Perkins formed a partnership with Edward French. This partnership was dissolved about nine years later and John Perkins purchased Pinehurst Farm, then known as the "Tan Yard" Farm and for many years conducted a nursery specializing in ornamental trees.

In 1910, Alice and Dudley Perkins commissioner Herbert C. Wise to design their home, at a cost of approximately \$12000.

The garage was added in the 1930s together with the sleeping porch. In 1966 the house was donated to the township by Mabel D'Olier.
