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18. Description

A two-story structure with stuccoed exterior walls, a hipped roof, and tall, corbelled brick interior chimneys. Three dormers have pilasters and pedimented roofs. The two-story portico with square columns was added in the 1960s. At the same time the three-windowed bay above the entry and the large, pedimented front entrance were also added.

19. History

At the turn of the century a number of prominent Louisville families built year-round homes in Glenview, a wooded area in the bluffs above the Ohio River which had been, in the 1870s and 1800s, the locale for a summer colony. This house was built about 1905 by Major John B. Pirtle, Confederate Army veteran and vice-president of the Louisville Trust Company. He lived there until his death in the 1920s. The surrounding acreage was subdivided about 1958.

20. Significance

The Pirtle house is significant as an example of an early 20th century Colonial Revival country house. It is one of a number of houses built in Glenview in that period by prominent Louisvillians. (See JF 542, and Glenview Historic District, JF 546, JF 547, JF 553.)


