DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Al Ringling house is a two-and-one-half-story late Richardsonian Roman-esque mansion of rock-faced Lake Superior brownstone from the Port Wing quarry and trimmed with smooth-faced brownstone. The house has a steep-pitched hip roof broken by gables and a three-and-one-half-story, square, hip-roofed tower at the northeast corner. The picturesque effect of the silhouette is heightened by four tall chimneys. Around the tower is a veranda. Both it and a porte-cochere, located on the south side of the house, are supported by polished granite columns. Though the house gives the impression of great mass, it has ample fenestration.

A one-story addition built of brownstone salvaged from the original carriage house was added to the west side by the Elks Club in 1948. This wing has no warchitectural or historical significance and is not included in the nomination. Its demolition would not constitute an adverse effect upon the house.

Each room on the ground floor is decorated in a different style. One enters from the east through a vestibule and arrives in a broad, oak-finished hall. On the left is a reception room decorated in a Louis XV style with white-enameled woodwork, silk-coyered paneling, mahogany trim, and a Mexican marble fireplace. Beyond the reception room was a billard room. Now used as a small dining room, it has a beamed ceiling and a panoramic landscape scene painted above oak paneling. Across from this was the oak-beamed "Gothic" dining room, now a small cocktail lounge. The original kitchen was removed when the 1948 addition was built.

Between the reception room and the billard room is an oak staircase that ascends at right angles to the hall. Slightly above the landing is a small conservatory. The second floor contained bedrooms, now converted to game rooms, and was simply decorated. In the basement was a ballroom which has become a cocktail lounge.

The Al Ringling mansion has been well-maintained by the Elks Club. Its modifications have had minimal effect on the integrity of the building, and many of the original fixtures and furnishings are still intact.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

At the time of its completion in 1906, the Al Ringling mansion was hailed as the "finest home in the county." It is a late example of Richardsonian Romanesque domestic architecture and is noteworthy for the richness of its interior decoration. It is unusual to find a mansion of this size and style outside of major urban areas. The house is a landmark in Baraboo and is historically significant for its association with Al Ringling.

Albrecht C. Ringling (1852-1916) was the son of August and Marie Ringling and the eldest sibling of a family that included seven brothers and one sister. He was trained to follow his father's occupation of carriage building, but he became interested in the circus, and, in the mid-1870's, he began to perform with a succession of small circuses. In 1882 he organized, with four of his brothers, the Ringling Bros. Classic and Comic Concert Co. This led to the formation in 1884 of the Ringling Bros. Circus which by 1907 developed into the country's largest circus empire.

Al Ringling remained attached to Baraboo throughout his life. In 1905 he decided to build a mansion on the site of his parents' home. The house was completed in December, 1906, and Al occupied it with his wife, Louise, until his death in 1916. The house was owned by the Ringling family until it was purchased by the Elks Club in 1936.

The original nomination for the Albrecht C. Ringling House was prepared without a verbal boundary description or a boundary justification. The following information amends the original nomination.

10. Geographical Data

Verbal Boundary Description:

The Albrecht C. Ringling House property consists of lots 1, 2 and 3, block 12, original plat, City of Baraboo.

Boundary Justification

The nominated boundary corresponds to the historic parcel of the Ringling House and garage (no longer extant). The nominated parcel includes the historic house and its additions. The current (1999) legal parcel for the property also includes lot 4, block 12. However, lot 4 is occupied by a paved parking area. The parking lot replaces a house that occupied the parcel adjacent to the Ringling property.
