Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

J.J. McAlester built a four room log structure about 1870. Around this house a larger single story home was built a few years later. The log walls and foundation are still intact and visible from underneath the house.

At the same time a large two story Victorian house was constructed by McAlester and connected to the single story house with a breezeway. This two-story Queen-Anne home was an area showplace and status symbol, and was McAlester's residence until his death. Its square peak roof tower gables with fish-scale shingles, stained glass windows, and large three-sided verandas represented its builder's wealth and stability to the mining community.

In 1960 the house was critically deteriorated. J. L. McAlester, J.J.'s grandson, restored the home making only minor changes externally (enclosing the breezeway) and internally (making two living rooms into one large room). The interior retains original woodwork, bannisters, door locks and hinges, and Belgium light fixtures. Walls have been repapered, central air/heat installed and bathrooms added.

Some of the original outbuilding are on the grounds, including a well-house and a small structure once used as a school.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This property is significant because of its architectual character and for its long association with J.J. McAlester. McAlester was the founder of the city of McAlester and active developer of industry in southeast Oklahoma.

In the late 1860s J.J. McAlester convinced a commercial firm to help him establish a trading post in Indian Territory at the juncture of the California and Texas Railroads. McAlester was aware of the coal out-croppings in the area and recognized the possibilities of mining development. In fact, another railroad, MK & T, changed its route, dropping south to McAlester's store at Bucklucksey (as it was first called) because of the prospect of the coal mines.

Later as mining, other industries and commerce developed around McAlester's stores Bucklucksey was changed to McAlester.

As his influence and popularity grew McAlester entered the political arena. When Oklahoma became a state he was elected its first Lieutenant Governor and later Corporation Commissioner of Oklahoma. He and his work led to the development of coal as king in southeast Oklahoma. He brought transportation and population expansion to the area and aided in the development of a thriving and productive state.

Now maintained by the McAlester family in keeping with its early 1900's character, the house is a fine example of style adapted for large family/small town living.
