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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Laurel Hill plantation house is set on a low hill just west of the west branch of Thompson's Creek in the undulating farm country of northern West Feliciana parish.

The house began in 1834 as an unpretentious two-story, four-bay farmhouse one room deep with two rooms on each floor and two exterior chimneys. There were one-story galleries front and rear, two front doors on the north facade, and a single flight central staircase which was entered directly from the south gallery.

In 1873-74 a pretentious frame addition with a wide side hall and double parlor arrangement was built. A new north gallery was built across the entire front with a full entablature and molded capitol posts. The hall has a quarter turn winding stair with a massive multifaceted newel post and a broad transom side light doorway at each end. Windows in the parlors reach the floor, and the mantels are of painted slate in the Renaissance Revival mode.

Recent additions include the installation of three bathrooms, seven closets, and the enclosure of the rear gallery. There has also been a small one-story side wing added, and the central staircase in the 1834 portion has been altered to provide access from the interior.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criterion C

Laurel Hill is significant in the area of architecture as an important representation of the English architectural heritage of the Feliciana parishes. The 1834 portion is a typical Carolina "I" house of which there are only three other examples in the two-parish area. This early portion, along with the more pretentious 1873 addition, represents a pattern of accretionary growth in farmhouse architecture which is typical of the eastern United States and most untypical of most of Louisiana.


Laurel Hill was long associated with the McGehee family and their close relatives, the Stewarts. In about 1833 Judge Edward McGehee obtained the house site. It is not known whether he built the original house or if it was already there when he obtained the property. Architectural evidence suggests that the older portion of the house was built in the 1830's. In 1861, when his daughter Caroline married Duncan Stewart, McGehee established them at Laurel Hill. In the years following they had six children, and the addition to the home was constructed in 1873. Caroline Stewart resided in the house until her death in 1920, when it passed to her daughter Louise Stewart, who lived there until her death in 1942, at which time it passed out of the hands of the Stewarts.


