DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Scully Ranch comprises six buildings dating back to the early 1850s situated on the south side of Sutter Creek and west of the Five Mile Drive (Old Ione-Stockton Road), Ione, California. (Appendix 1)

The main drive way from the Five Mile Drive to the Scully house is bordered on the west mainly by locust trees (at least 10): diameters range from 2 to 3 feet; heights to over 40 feet. Other trees include: two olive trees and valley oaks. The oak north west of the Scully house is 5 feet in diameter at the base and over 60 feet high; some native shrubs as wild grape.

The MARLETTE archway over the entrance road: Erected by Robert H. Scully in the mid-1960s. The origin of "MARLETTE" is obscure. It may have been derived from Seneca H. Marlette who surveyed land about 1856 in the vicinity of the present Scully Ranch; Marlette Street, Ione, ends at the Scully Ranch; it is conjectured that Marlette lived on the Scully Ranch at a time while James Porter Martin still owned the place. (Appendix 5:15)

Other trees around the Scully house: black walnuts, redwoods, fig, chestnut palm¹ and magnolia¹ trees.

Ornamentation (Grounds) -- Statue: St. Francis -- Patron Saint of animals and gardens; bird bath & water fountain and figure of girl.

Open fields east, west and south of the Scully house. At present, volunteer barley flourishing in these fields.

Environment -- The Scully Ranch is situated in the central Sierra Nevada Mountain foothills. It is located in Ione Valley on the 250 foot topographic contour within the Digger Pine-Chaparral Belt: intermingled pine, oak woodland and brush lands; hot, dry summers and moderate winters, little fog (Storer & Usinger, 1963: 27).

¹ Apparently, James Porter Martin planted the magnolia trees early 1860s. Martin's wife died 1867. It is said no plantings were made here after her death. Josephine McClean Scully (1852-1911) probably planted the palm trees early 1890s. The size of the Scully present palm tree is about the same dimensions as palms planted at the Preston School of Industry, presumably at the time the "Castle" (State Landmark No. 867) was constructed (1890-1894).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Scully Ranch dwelling house (1A) was built ca. 1852 - 1858 possibly by James Porter Martin. He was one of the first white men to come to Amador County in the early 1840s (Appendix 4). It is architecturally significant as a mid-19th century, two-story, Classic Revival, brick structure; originally, with classic two-story veranda. About 1890 the original veranda was replaced with a "Victorian" veranda which also contributes to its architectural significance.

The Scully Ranch is significant for its historic associations with the development of industries (agriculture and clay mining) in the Ione area; the first white settlers: the Hicks, Martins and Scullys; the Ione area as a transportation center in the early years; the effects of settling the chaos engendered by land title disputations pertaining to the Arroyo Seco Grant -- the Scully Ranch was within the boundaries of this grant and was involved therein.

James Porter Martin (1822 - 1895) came to Ione Valley in 1843 (Appendix 4) and lived west of Ione City sometime prior to 1850 (Appendix 5, page 5). Perhaps, Martin built this house as indicated by certain implications: It is said that the Scully house (1A) reflects the builder's Virginian background. Martin was born in Virginia (Appendix 6). Martin may have been wealthier and more influential than some of his nearby neighbors, thus, accounting for a capability to build a two-story, antebellum "southern mansion" (Appendix 7). Martin farmed the surrounding land and noted for his particular fine agricultural products; won premiums at county fairs (Appendix 5, page 15).

William Scully (1832-1890) arrived in California in 1854, in Amador County by 1855 (Appendix 8); a native of Ireland, naturalized June 6, 1859 (Appendix 9). He owned land in Jackson Valley, Amador County, by 1867, and, perhaps, earlier (1856-1860) as indicated by mortgages on the Scully property and land records (Appendix 10, 11 & 12). William Scully's eviction (1865) from his house during the Arroyo Seco Grant fracas referred to his Jackson Valley home (Appendix 12).

Deed records show James Porter Martin granted to William Scully on October 11, 1882, land situated in Ione Valley (Appendix 13, Item 9).

Ranch House -- The Scully Ranch House (Appendix 2-1) is a two-story L shape building of common bond brick construction consisting of the original (1A) structure; a "kitchen" (1B); tank & well house (1C & 1D) and an annex(1E).

The main building (1A) is forty feet wide by forty-nine feet long. The roof is a medium hip, covered with composition shingles; four brick chimneys; boxed cornices, shelf & brackets at roof line. Above the front door is a single fanlight with glass and radiating dividers. Open (two-tiered) verandas extend across the east and west sides of building; squared wood posts (first tier). At present, no roof over second tier veranda (west & east sides). Prior to ca. 1910, roof over veranda, east side, wood columns. Present condition: good.

Date of construction: 1852 - 1858 (Appendix 3)

An annex (1E) is attached to the southeast corner of the main building (1A). Annex is 10 feet wide by 12 feet long. Exterior walls: asphalt shingles. Roof shape: shed, plain roof line with brackets.

Date of construction: about 1960. Use: bathroom. Present condition: good.

The present "kitchen" (1B) is 20 feet wide by 25 feet long; exterior walls: common bond brick. Roof: medium hip, covered with composition shingles; one brick chimney on south side; boxed cornices, exposed rafters. Open veranda extends across north side, wood posts. Basement: 17 feet wide by 23 feet long. The present "kitchen" (1B): good condition; probably constructed early 1860s. Apparently, the original kitchen, in same location, was a wood, frame structure separated from the main building (1A) by a breezeway.

The tank house (1C) is a 12 feet by 12 feet wood structure; originally 10 feet higher than present (1978); exterior walls: shiplap. Roof: pyramidal, plain roof line; roof covering: composition roll; plain boxed cornices. Built ca. 1894, to house a 6,000 gallon water tank for domestic purposes. Present condition: deteriorated.

The well house (1D) is a 12 feet wide by 15 feet 6 inch long shedlike structure, lattice exterior walls. Roof: plain, covered with composition roll. Constructed about 1894, contains well, concrete curbing, water supply not in use at present. Windmill prior years: power to pump water to tank (1C); windmill tower used at present for TV aerial. Condition of well house: deteriorated.

The tank and well house^s are separated by a 7 foot 9 inch wide wood structure or "breezeway". Condition: fair.

Property features include:

Stonehouse (2B) -- A structure 16 feet wide by 30 feet long (Appendix 2-2). Exterior walls: native stone & mortar. Roof: low gable, covered with corrugated galvanized metal sheeting. Condition: fair. Apparently, no alterations. Original use: granary; present use: miscellaneous storage. Date of construction: prior to 1882. Building on original site.

Stonehouse (2B) is joined on the west end by structure 2A: 17 feet wide and 30 feet long. Exterior walls: shiplap and planking (?). Roof: low gable, covered with tar paper. Present use: farm equipment storage. Condition: deteriorated. Construction date: prior to 1882 (?).

A bunk house once joined the west end of the Stonehouse (2B). Bunk house was approximately 16 feet wide and possibly 30 feet long. Built about 1882; demolished about 1963.

Blacksmith Shop (3) -- A structure 16 feet by 28 feet long (Appendix 2-3). Exterior walls: vertical board. Roof: low gable covered with corrugated galvanized metal sheeting, plain eaves. Building on original site; built prior to 1882; no alterations; condition: deteriorated. Used continuously: blacksmith shop-- many of the original tools and equipment are in the building.

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Wagon Shed (4) -- A structure 44 feet wide by 55 feet long. (Appendix 2-4) Exterior walls: vertical boards. Roof: low gable; covering corrugated galvanized metal sheeting. Building on original site; built prior to 1882; some alterations. Condition: damaged and deteriorated. Use: wagon shed; however building design suggests it may have been used as a barn for feeding stock. Present use: storage.

Barn & Milk Shed (5) -- Barn is 62 feet wide and 60 feet long; (Appendix 2-5) milk shed is 62 feet wide by 24 feet long. Exterior walls: vertical board, both buildings. Roof: Barn, low gable; milk shed, shed. Roof covering: corrugated galvanized metal sheeting for both buildings. Probable dates of construction: Barn prior to 1882; milk shed about 1910. Present condition: barn is deteriorated; milk shed is fair. Present use: none, both buildings.

The barn was originally placed about 250 feet south of its present location. Moved to present location about 1900.

Milk Processing Structure (6) -- 9 feet by 9 feet -- and adjunct to a dairy operation. (Appendix 2-6) It was constructed in 1945. Exterior walls: poured concrete; low gable, covered with corrugated galvanized metal sheeting, damaged by wind. Structure on original site. Present use: none. Condition: damaged.

The main house and the above described outbuildings situated on 7.34 acres make up the original historic ranch headquarters.

- (1) William Scully (1832 - 1890) and wife, Josephine.
- (2) John Scully (1878 - 1966) and wife, Annie.
- (3) Robert H. Scully (1921 -) and wife, Etta.
- (4) James Robert Scully (1952 -) Resident: present.
- (5) Son of Kathleen Scully Lee (1967 -) Resident: 1967 - 1973.
(Interview: Robert & Etta Scully, Jan. 1978)

Robert H. Scully has lived here continuously since birth. He married Etta M. Stoudt August 25, 1946; four children.

The Scully Ranch, especially the house (1A) has attracted the movie industry. The Quim Martin Producers, January 1974, spent three days here in producing a part of the series: Pilot "Manhunter".

Walt Disney Productions considered, September 1977, the house for production of scenes requiring a southern architectural styling.

The dwelling house, in addition to being the family home, is being also used for renting to overnight or longer sojourners. Scullys offer three bedrooms and serve a continental breakfast -- the MARLETTE INN.

This house and the outbuildings listed in the Physical Description comprise the historic ranch headquarters.

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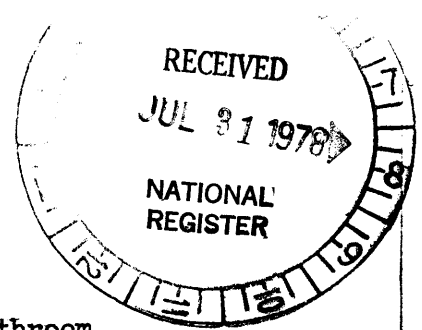

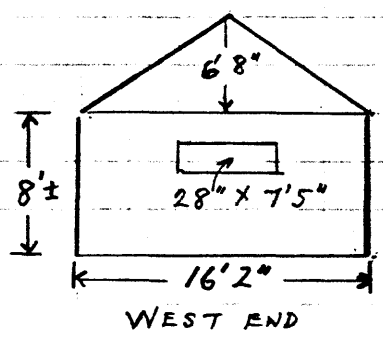

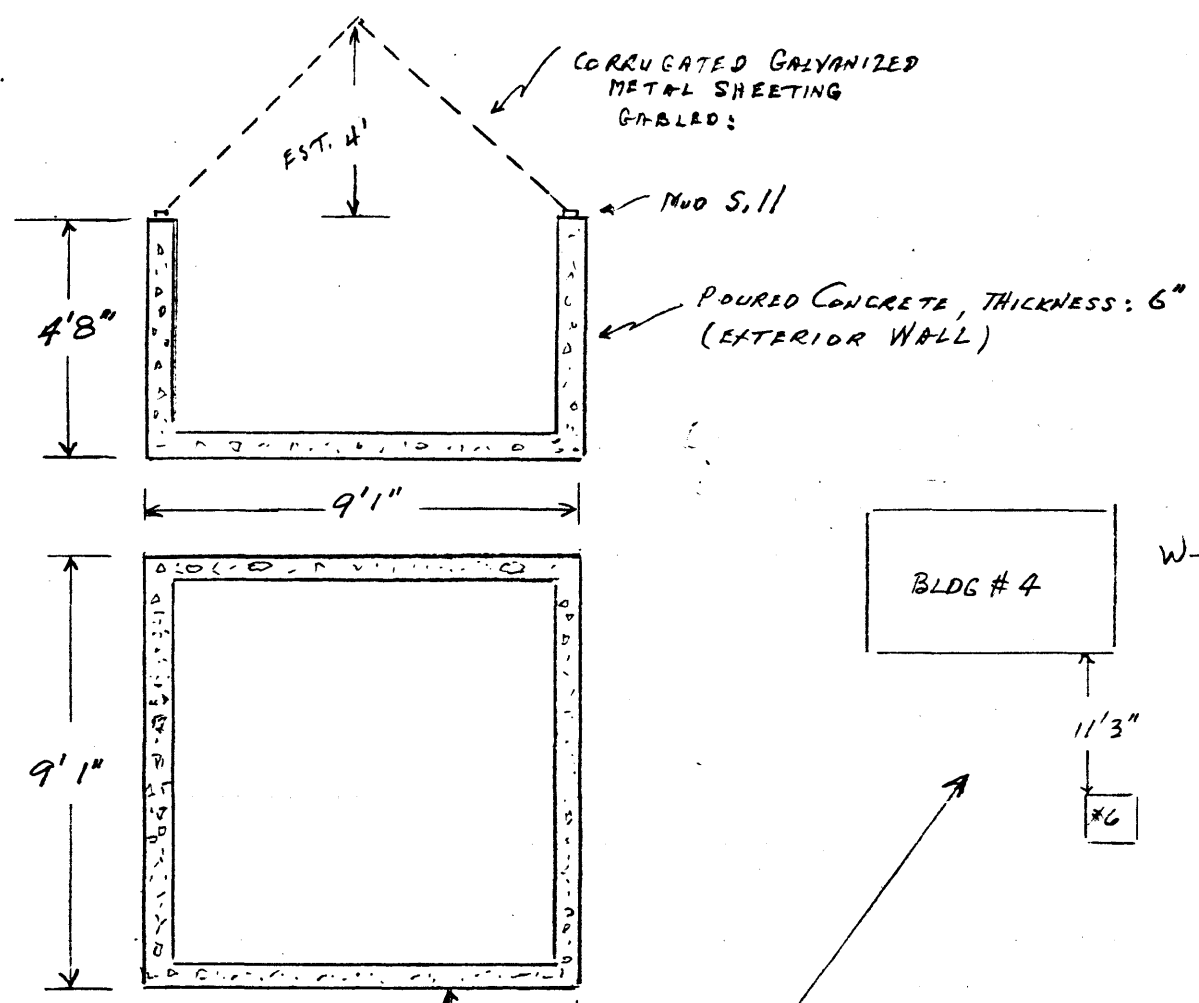

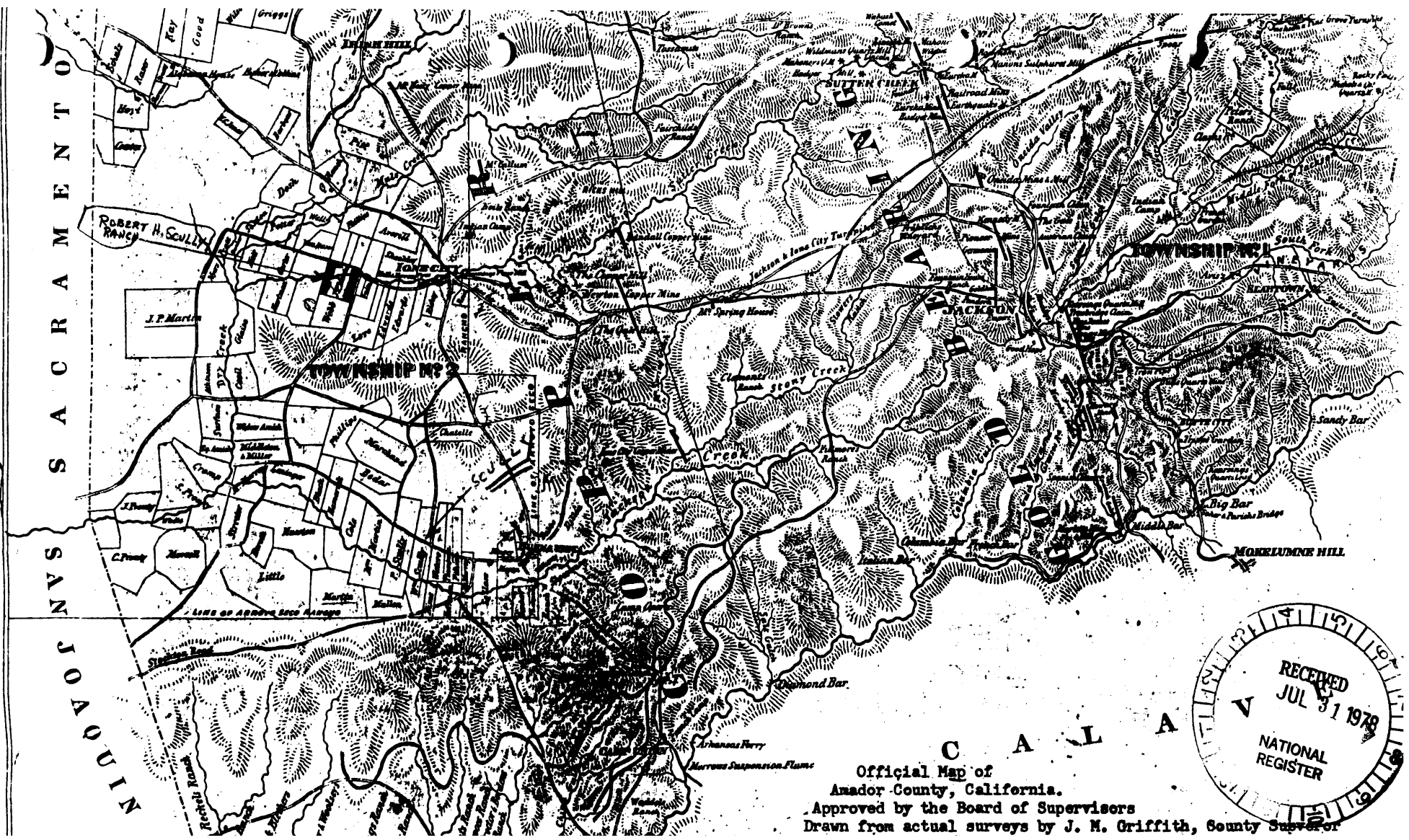
