18. Description

Two-story brick residence painted white. Gable end roof with two brick, corbeled chimneys at each end, joined by a parapet wall above the ridgeline. Two-story wings extend from each end of the main block. Brick stringcourse across front facade of main block and wings. Two-story portico with four columns and a pediment with dentils. Doorway has semi-elliptical fanlight. Inteiror retains original mantels, floors, and woodwork. Crown molding, over door pediments, and reeded woodwork are among the classical details on the interior. Original plans indicate that the house is essentially unaltered. A swimming pool and frame bathhouse were added at the rear of the house in the 1960s. Flower gardens which were contemporary with the building of the house are being restored by the present owners.

19. History

The house was built in 1928 for Bruce Haldeman, a well-known figure in the Louisville newspaper field from 1885 when he began working as a reporter for The (Louisville) <u>Courier</u>, Journal, until 1918 when he retired as president of the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times Company. The Haldeman family's involvement with daily newspapers in Louisville began prior to the Civil War when Walter N. Haldeman (Bruce Haldeman's father) founded the <u>Daily Courier</u> which merged with the <u>Journal</u> and <u>The Democrat</u> in 1868 to form <u>The Courier-Journal</u>--a newspaper which still exists.

The house was designed by the Louisville firm of Nevin, Wischmeyer, and Morgan, which was active from about 1920-1929 under that name. Frederick Morgan (1889-1970) was the partner most likely responsible for the plan. Morgan was well known for his work in Revival styles, especially Georgian and Colonial Revival. Many of his commissions were for handsome residences with particularly fine interior millwork and details. The original plans are in the possession of the present owners. The gardens were planned by Annie Bruce Haldeman, a Louisville landscape designer and daughter of the builder of the house.

20. Significance

The Haldeman House is an excellent example of a Colonial Revival residence of the 1920s. Situated in Glenview, one of Louisville's wealthiest suburban enclaves since the early 1900s, the house was designed by a prominent architect in one of the most popular revival styles of that period.
