Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

This building is a one and one half story hall and parlor house with a gable roof. The facade arrangement is atypical for this type of house. Generally the openings of a hall and parlor house are symmetrically arranged on one plane. Although the arrangement of openings of this house is symmetrical, the south half of the facade is recessed. A door and single window are set into the recessed south half of the facade, and there is a single window on the north half of the facade. Both of the windows on the facade are the two over two double hung sash type. A porch with slender square piers and a straight post balustrade spans the facade. The house is two rooms deep, as indicated by its broad proportions, and by the two windows on the north side. The roof on the west side extends down toward the ground like a saltbox type roof. A major gable roof addition and a small shed extension were attached to the back of the house. Both alterations were probably made within the historic period, and do not affect the building's original character. They were built of materials and in a scale that complement the original building. rear extensions are part of Park City's architectural vocabulary. Although in many cases an extension represents a major alteration of the original house, it usually contributes to the significance of a house because it documents the most common and acceptable method of expansion of the small Park City house. This house is in good condition and retains its original character.

Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date: c. 1885

Built c. 1885, the Otis L. Brown House at 713 Woodside is architecturally significant as one of 76 extant hall and parlor houses in Park City, 22 of which are included in this nomination. The hall and parlor house, the earliest house type to be built in Park City, and one of the three most common house types that were built during the early period of Park City's mining boom era, significantly contributes to the character of the residential area.

This house was built by at least 1889, as indicated by the Sanborn Insurance Maps, having probably been constructed in 1885 by Otis L. Brown, who had bought the property that year from Edward P. Ferry, a member of the Park City Townsite Corporation. Otis and Francis A. Brown, apparently his wife, owned the property until about 1916. Nothing is known about the Browns.

Other owners of the house include W.R. Hutchinson (c.1916-25), and Andrew L. and Rhea Hurley (1925-40). The Hurleys lived nearby at 713 Norfolk.
