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7.	ESCRIPTION	
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	The buildings comprising the Military Headquarters, erected in 1862, were substantial wood frame structures. They included a commanding officer's quarters, adjutant's office, two large barracks for soldiers, a hospital, guardhouse, laundry, commissary and a stone powder magazine. Only the "Powder Magazine" and the "Officer's Quarters" buildings remain. The Officers Quarters building is in fair condition with only	
	minor alterations, closely follows its early form, a late Greek revival style with the hipped roof of the earlier Federal style. It is a two-story wood frame structure approximately 60' x 87' resting on exposed brick foundation; finish floor level about 26" above grade. The hipped roof is covered with wood shingles; exterior walls have wood siding. The front porch (11' x 24') on the east side is the most prominent exterior feature. It

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Drum Barracks was established at Wilmington in 1862 and became the United States Military Headquarters for Southern California, Arizona, and New Mexico. It was a garrison and base for supplies, and a terminus for camel pack trains operated by the Army until 1863. Abandoned in 1866, the site remains a landmark of the Civil War in California. The building located at 1053 Carey, was the officers' barracks. Only one other structure remains of those which formed the quadrangle. The powder house near here is that structure.
