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Narrative Description

The Williamsburg Armory (WH-W-12) was funded in part by the Works Progress Administration, and is located near downtown on South Second Street. The armory is similar in appearance to the other WPA-era, two-story armories, such as Harrodsburg and Springfield. This armory has not been painted like the ones in Harlan and St. Matthews. The armory is a grey two-story poured concrete building with attached two-story drill hall/maintenance shop combination at the rear. Like the other five WPA armories of this time period, Williamsburg was designed by Louisville architect Edd R. Gregg. The building is topped by a flat, rolled asphalt roof and has elements of the Art Deco architectural style, with its linear and horizontal ornamentation on the east elevation (front facade). The original double wooden doors and hardware on the front of the seven-bay building are intact, as are most of the metal casement windows.

On the north and south elevations of the building, both the administrative and drill hall windows are original metal-casement and metal multi-light windows. The first floor (north elevation) features three garage bays. Above this is the barrel-vaulted drill hall.

On the interior of the armory, most of its original features are intact, including virtually every original wooden door with metal hardware, radiators, and the original hardwood drill hall floor. The original dedication plaque is intact in the entryway. A tiled floor has been put down on the first floor, but the rooms have not been altered or changed, otherwise.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Williamsburg Armory (WH-W-12) meets criteria A (historic association) and C (type of construction) of the National Register. The armory is a good example of the National Guard in Kentucky within the historic context of "Kentucky's National Guard Armories: 1931-1951." The armory served as both a military and community center during the period of significance, and it meets the registration requirements established for the armory property type because it possesses integrity of location, materials, design, and setting. The Williamsburg Armory is still in the residential/industrial setting in which it was built. The armory is still recognizable as such on both the interior and exterior, and has high integrity of materials and design. The armory is still owned by the National Guard, and has integrity of association. The old armory maintains a very high degree of integrity, with almost all of its original materials intact. The building is still owned by the Commonwealth of Kentucky and is currently being leased to Cumberland College, who uses the building for storage. The National Guard occupied the building until 1982, when they moved to a new armory close to Highway 75.

A military unit has been in Williamsburg since the Civil War, but a unit was not Federally recognized

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there until 1921, when Company D of the 149th Infantry was installed. The Infantry unit served in World War II; they were stationed in the South Pacific from 1941-1945. In addition to Infantry, the unit has been the 241st Tank Battalion, the 438th Military Police, and Infantry again. Currently, detachment 1 of the Headquarters and Headquarters Company of the 1/149th Infantry are in Williamsburg. The armory served as both a home for the National Guard and a community center for Williamsburg during the period of significance. Mr. Edward Freeman, a member of the Cumberland College staff and life-long resident of Williamsburg, remembers activities such as "... church group meetings, square dances, and basketball games..." taking place in the armory when it was still owned by the National Guard." (Interview with Mr. Freeman, July, 1998). In addition, the armory was used as a voting precinct for the area.

The Williamsburg Armory was one of eight Works Progress Administration armories built between 1941-42, and was the first armory built in Williamsburg. The Foster Lane family donated the land for the armory in 1940.

Verbal Boundary Description - The parcel designated by the Whitley County PVA as tax map/parcel #111-30-07-007.00.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The chosen boundary encompasses the lot historically associated with the Williamsburg Armory, including the land on which the armory sits, for a total of .20 acres.
