Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

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Bull Head Lodge and Studio are at the southern end of Lake McDonald in Glacier National Park. The two log buildings are set amongst mature fir and western larch trees and are oriented toward the lakeshore.

The studio was constructed in 1907 and is a one-story log building with a recently applied metal roof. Quartered poles are used as chinking between the logs. The corners have a v-notched connection. The gable end of the roof extends out over a partially screened porch. The windows and door are surrounded by a rough cut board trim. The structure sits on a log and stacked stone pier foundation. Stone steps lead up to the entrance. The chimney on the back is made of stone and mud, surrounded by logs. The interior walls are log and a huge hearth is at the back of the building.

The residence was constructed in 1916 by local craftsmen E. J. Cruger and Martin Sibley. It is a one-story cedar log building chinked with mortar. The addition to the west (date of construction unknown) combines log and frame wall construction and is covered with clapboard siding. The corners have a double v-notch connection. Eightlight casement windows are set in pairs or triplets. The gable roof is covered with wood shingles. A skylight, put in by D. L. Greenwalt, was added ca. 1930 to the center of the roof. On the interior, a balcony is built into the roof space. There is a brick chimney on the south side that is covered with stucco. The front porch has been replaced, but it still retains some of the original railings made from branches. The structure sits on a stone and log pier foundation. The interior logs are hand hewn log and the floors are wood. The fireplace is perhaps the most significant feature of the building because there are sixteen etchings in the smooth concrete face surrounding the hearth made by Charles Russell and his friend Philip R. Goodwin.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Bull Head Lodge and Studio, at the southern end of Lake McDonald, served as the summer residence and workplace for the noted Western artist Charles M. Russell from 1907 until about 1924 and are therefore eligible for inclusion in the National Register under criterion B.

The paintings, sketches, sculptures, and stories created by Charlie Russell during the span of his artistic career record the passing of the frontier in Montana, from the herds of buffalo that once roamed the plains,"When the Land Belonged to God," the devastating winter of 1886-7 that marked the end of the open range cattle raising era, to the influx of homestead settlers, and the "Trails Plowed Under." His work is anecdotal in nature; each painting, sketch, or small sculpture depicts a particular dramatic, usually humorous occurrence or an event of great historical significance, most often conceived from the perspective of the Indian participants. Russell brought a nostalgic idealization to his depictions of the old West. Although he never considered himself an "artist," Russell's work was bringing some of the highest prices in the art galleries of New York and London by the end of his career. A year before his death, Russell, always known as a master storyteller, wrote out a collection of his tall tales relating the cowboy adventures of Rawhide Rawlings. In the introduction to this volume, Russell reflected:

To have talent is no credit to its owner; what a man can't help he should get neither credit nor blame for - it's not his fault. I am an illustrator. There are lots better ones, but some worse. Any man that can make a living doing what he likes is lucky and I'm that. Any time I cash in now, I win.

Russell was a regular summer inhabitant of the lower Lake McDonald area from 1907 until about 1924. The land upon which he built his summer house and studio was originally part of a homestead claim, patented by Dimon Apgar in 1895. Apgar sold Russell a small parcel shortly thereafter. For many years, Russell visited and camped in this area that would in 1910 be set aside as a permanent wildlands reserve as Glacier National Park. Russell had local craftsmen construct his summer studio in 1907, and his residence, which was called Bull Head Lodge after the bison skull that he very often used as a symbol with his signature, in 1916. It was here that Russell entertained his friends and developed many of his sketches and clay figures that would be finished during the winter at his permanent home in Great Falls. Russell's Great Falls House and Studio were listed as a National Historic Landmark on October 15, 1966.
