#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The  $3\frac{1}{2}$  story New Britain Opera House is a red brick building located in downtown New Britain. It is part of a row of late 19th and early 20th century conwercial buildings. Attached at the south is a 4 story yellow brick Romanesque Revival block. Attached at the north is an undistinguished 2 story 20th century building with some colonial revivel details. Across Wain Street are several benches and recently planted trees in front of the large parking lot of a shopping center. Just south of the city block on which the Opera House is located a depressed, 4 lane highway is being constructed.

The Opera House's main facade is a sturdy, utilitarian Italian Renaissance Revival composition. Above the alterversion of a ed first story the main (east) facade is a carefully ordered design with restrained dignity. The two center bays of the six bay wide facade form a slightly projecting pavilion which rises above the building's hipped roof and is crowned by a decorated triangular pediment. The red Trentom pressed brick walls are pierced by windows with brownstone trim. Second floor 2/2 windows are rectangular with shaped lintels. Third floor 2/2 windows have semi-circular arches with keystones. Four narrow windows with straight-heads are found at the attic level of the pavilion. Plain brick pilasters with corbelling at the main cornice level give emphasis to the central pavilion, while similar pilasters without corballing define the corners of the building. Above the stepped corbel tables of the south pilaster are the letters "AD" and in the same position on the north pilaster is the date "1880." The name "OPERA HOUSE". is found between the two corbel tables. Between the second and thrid story windows is a stringcourse created from bands of terra cotta and of bricks set edgewise to the facade. The boldly projecting metal cornice with modillions and a frieze ornamented with the Greek key motif and dentils is repeated on the pavilion.

The remodeled first-story of the main facade has two intrusive 20th century storefronts and the central recessed entrance to the auditorium. This entry is also a 20th century remodeling and carries a movie theater marquee. Originally the first story facade was faced with granite and Portland stone.

Exterior side walls are common brick and are unadorned except for a brick cornice. A rear wing with flat roof was added at an undetermined date to the rear (west side) of the building. Most side windows have been bricked closed. A fire escape is attached to the south side. The roof is broken by several projections including chimnles, a large ventilator, and what appears to be an elevator shaft. The rear (west) wall has no openings.

The auditorium is located on the second and third floors and is reached by a central staircase. Originally the main floor of the auditorium had a seating capacity of 800 while the balcony sat 300. Seating has been altered and the entire theater now seats about 700. The restreint of the exterior disappears when one enters the auditorium. It has lavish ornamentation added in the early 20th century as well as original features. An elaborate chandelier hangs from a painted plaster ceiling with plaster mouldings. On either side of the elliptical arch

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

1880

During the late 19th century opera houses were erected in many communities throughout the United States. New Britain was not an exception . ts New Britain Opera House Association was formed in 1880 and the Renaiscance Revival style opera house designed by Mobert W. Hill opened in ovember 1881. The association was somewhat unusual as it was composed not of members of the city's most prominent families but of men of Irish decent iescribed in a contempoary newspaper article as "comparatively speaking. orking men."1 From the beginning the cultural facility was located on the upper floors and the ground floor of the building was occupied by income-producing business establishments. Eventually the auditorium as converted to a vaudeville house and then to its current use as a ovie theater. The exterior of the building, which is a restrained design, is little altered above the first floor, while the auditorium is a "emarkable space with original features enhanced by murals and other rnamentation added when it became a movie palace.

The New Britain Opera Association with Ambrose Beatty, president; Phomas McCabe, treasurer; and Bernard Moffitt, secretary, was formed in 880. By June 29, 1880. Robert W. Hill had designed the building and by July 20 excavation for it had begun. The walls were nearing completion in November and Eugene A. Burt had been chosen agent and manager. Mr. Burt on November 30; 1880, defended the rental of space for a liquor bar. An interesting fact since a bar occupies one of the storefronts today. One ay 24, 1881, the opening performance - a production of "Faust" - was see
