7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Mason-Watkins House is a two and a half story central chimney frame dwelling built in 1832. The main body of the house stands on a fieldstone foundation with split granite blocks above grade. The house has a five-bay facade with a central doorway bearing simple square-edged casings and having a rectangular transom sash above the door. The windows likewise have square-edged casings; the sash are 12/12. The facade has a simple moulded cornice.

The north elevation of the house has two windows on each floor and a single attic window in the center of the gable. The south elevation has three windows on each floor and one in the gable. Attached to the west (rear) elevation of the house is a long one and a half story gable-roofed wing with its southern wall set flush with the southern elevation of the main building. About one-third of the wing, adjacent to the main house, is a modern kitchen with a single-flue brick chimney. The remaining two-thirds of the wing were originally a carriage shed (now a garage), and a shed-roofed privy is attached to the wing's west end.

The house has a brick chimney which rises through the roof in front of the ridge. The chimney is built on a base which consists of two brick piers laid on a fieldstone foundation and spanned by heavy squared timbers several feet below the level of the first floor. The first floor hearths, about ten brick courses deep, are laid upon these timbers.

The front stairway is a compact triple run flight contained within the chimney bay of the house. Its newel and angle posts are turned in an attenuated vasiform shape, while the stringers are decorated with simple applied brackets and with a lower moulding having an enriched bead. To the left (south) of the entry hall is the parlor, which contains some of the most elaborate woodwork in the house. The mantelpiece has flat-panelled pilasters which extend upward into the bed mouldings beneath the shelf. These pilasters form flat blocks at the ends of the mantelpiece frieze, and the faces of these blocks are incised with stylized tree designs decorated with brass knobs at the point where the branches radiate from the trunks. The architrave of the mantelpiece is a band of vertical reeding, and reeding also appears in the room's baseboards and in the aprons beneath each window.

To the right (north) of the entry hall is a dining room with a similar mantelpiece; the form appears again in the bedchambers. Throughout the interior, the house has four-panel doors with flat panels, as well as delicate mouldings and other hallmarks of the Federal style.

The frame of the house is constructed of heavy hewn timbers. The posts have a pronounced flare at their tops, where they intersect the wall plates. The roof utilizes common rafters with horizontal boarding, a departure from the earlier New Hampshire practice of combining rafters and purlins with vertical boarding that runs from ridge to eaves.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Mason-Watkins House is a well-preserved example of a New Hampshire country dwelling which retains both the conservative central chimney plan and the Federal-style detailing of periods before its construction. The house demonstrates the persistence of vernacular architectural forms well into the nineteenth century, and further reveals the continuing influence of Asher Benjamin's early Federal period architectural guidebooks at a date when style in urban centers had already shifted to the Greek Revival. Virtually all the interior detailing of the house reflects the Federal style in its simplest forms; the mantelpieces are of a type introduced by Asher Benjamin in his <u>American Builder's Companion</u> in 1806. The persistence of these forms in the southwestern corner of New Hampshire as late as 1832, at a time when Greek Revival detailing was becoming evident in most other New England locales, serves as an index to the conservatism of the original owner of the house, of local builders, and perhaps of this section of New England as well.
