| Architectural Description and Present Condition: Wilkes Knob is a two story frame structure with a one story side addition and a one story rear addition. The house is rather plain in regards to details. Windows are tall, thin, and shuttered, while the offset door has a transom and sidelights. Excellent condition. The house is hidden by foliage and there is a garden in the rear yard. Frame tenant houses sit across the road. The remainder of the land is farmed. Good condition. |

| Historical Narrative: I.F. Murph was born in 1845, to some of Marshallville's earliest settlers from Orangeburg County, S.C. In the 1870's, when he built Wilkes Knob Plantation, Murph began developing extensive peach orchards near S.H. Rumph's Willow Lake. He became president of the Elberta Crate Factory of Marshallville, then Bainbridge, in 1904 and it reportedly grew into the largest crate and box factory in the U.S. Murph was also Vice President of both the Citizen's Bank of Marshallville and the First National Bank of Fort Valley, and later became president of the Georgia Fruit Exchange. |
| SIGNIFICANCE Agriculture |
| Areas of Significance Architecture; Commerce Statement of Significance: Although architec- turally simple, Wilkes Knob is indicative of the type of vernacular architecture from the late 1800's being built in Marshallville. Its major significance comes from I.F. Murph's involvement in the commercial peach industry, both as a planter and as a supplier to that industry (of crates). Murph's financial and commercial dealings were also important as Marshallville began developing a commercial and financial district in the 1880's and 1890's. |
