#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The W. A. Brannon Store/Moreland Knitting Mills consist of four attached parts: a twostory brick 1894 store, a 1904 one-story brick warehouse, a connecting enclosed alleyway (1937), and a one-story 1891 brick cotton warehouse. The bricks were locally produced. The 1894 and 1904 buildings retain their original doors and windows with granite sills The 1894 store contains some plastered partitions and tongue-and-groove and brick arches. ceilings on both floors. It also retains its original store counter and freight elevator (1894), sprinkler system (1904), and coal burning fireplace. The skylights date from 1937 and the indoor plumbing from 1920. The second floor of the store, supported by three rows of wooden posts, is an open room with a large office enclosure. There are two staircases. The 1904 building is one large room with skylights added in 1920. The roof is supported by one row of wooden posts and a beam. It has painted brick, open ceiling rafters, and oiled hardwood flooring. The alleyway consists of a long room and a long skylight with various door and window openings into the 1894 and 1904 buildings. The buildings stand on a relatively flat lot near a former railroad siding. Outbuildings consist of a 1904 water tank built by the R. D. Cole Co. of Newnan; a brick wellhouse; a wooden warehouse with a brick foundation, and several loading ramps. The property is located on the south side of the town square which is now paved with two structures on it. On the west is a railroad, to the south some residences, and to the east the original Moreland post office. Changes to the property include mainly the structural ones necessitated by combining four structures into one complex. New window openings and doors, and especially skylights were added, and the alleyway enclosed. The site includes the known locations of the site of the post office, detached boiler room, fertilizer mixing plant, and the W. A. Brannon House.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The W. A. Brannon Store/Moreland Knitting Mills is significant in <u>architecture</u> as a good example of a late 19th-century general store in a small commercial center. It reflects the other buildings needed for such an operation and the results of the conversic of the site to a mill in the 1920s by adapting the existing structures and adding new ones. The buildings are significant in <u>commerce</u> because the store was a trading center for the town of Moreland from 1894 to 1920. It sold general merchandise - almost anything anyone needed for the home or business. The buildings are significant in <u>industry</u> as the site of the Moreland Hosiery Mills, 1920-1927, and then the Moreland Knitting Mills, 1927-1968. It was the small town of Moreland's only manufacturing plant for forty years.

These areas of significance support the property's eligibility under National Register Criteria A and C.

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#### Historical Narrative

While the history of this site really begins with the first granting of the land in 1835, the history of the current structure starts with the arrival of W. A. Brannon (1857-1952). He came to Puckett Station(later Moreland) in 1876 at the age of 19 and went into business with James R. Cotton (1848-1916) selling general merchandise. After two successful years he moved back to Grantville for five years, again in the general merchandise business. He returned to Puckett Station about 1884 and went into business with G. E. Camp. The community that is now Moreland had begun as "Mt. Zion" in 1843. When a railroad was completed in 1852 to Grantville, it became a wood and water stop and the name changed to "Puckett Station". The first mercantile business was started there in 1870. The town was also the center of a large fruit growing The first railroad station was erected in 1886 and in 1888 the name of the settlement was changed to honor Dr. John F. MOreland, the first doctor for the Atlanta and West Point Railroad and a member of their Board of Directors from 1868-1877. The community reached its peak between 1910-1930. The decline was caused by the depression in the cotton market due to the boll weevil and the subsequent national depression. In October of 1884 Mr. Brannon purchased Lot #1, the west half of the property. January 1887 he acquired most of Lot #2, including a house which was on the property; this was the east half of the present property. In this year he and G. E. Camp divided the stock and he continued alone in the business, then amounting to \$100,000 a year.


In December 1888 Mr. Brannon acquired a twenty foot strip of land on the south side of Lot #2 which completed the aquisition of the present property. In 1891 he built a large cotton warehouse on Lot #2 and became a cotton broker as well as a merchant. In 1894 he had the large two-story store built by R. D. Cole and Co. of Newnan, Georgia. Mr. Brannon manufactured the brick for the building. At this time he operated a fertilizer plant (destroyed around 1935) as well as a warehouse and store. Early in 1895 he sold half interest in the business to J. F. Cotton of Grantville and changed the name of the company to W. A. Brannon and Company. In September of 1899 the A & WP Railroad built a coaling platform with a 60 car capacity just west of the property. Moreland became a coal and water stop for the railroad at this time.

In 1904, while serving as President of the Coweta County branch of the Southern Cotton Growers Association, Mr. Brannon built a new brick warehouse and a large water tank for fire protection. In 1906 the Newnan Board of Trade was chartered with W. A. Brannon as president. He was also serving as vice president of an oil mill chartered in Grantville at the same time. In 1908 Mr. Brannon was sent as one of the delegates to the Southern Cotton Congress in Memphis. He was considered one of the outstanding men of his era.

In 1912, while serving as a member of the Georgia House of Representatives, Mr. Brannon was doing business in both Newnan and Moreland that approached a million dollars annually. His business in Moreland did a business of \$100,000 over a year, handling two or three thousand bales of cotton annually, selling about 1500 tons of fertilizers and everything in the mercantile line.

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In 1917 parts of the county had no rain from April 5th to June 22nd. Peas, corn, peanuts and cotton had no moisture to grow in. The W. A. Brannon Company failed for a large amount due to poor collections, crop conditions and the cotton blockade due to World War One. From 1921-1926 cotton prices dropped further, ruining all associated businesses. In 1920, Mr. Brannon sold the 1904 warehouse with a 100' x 200' tract of land to the Moreland Hosiery Mill along with the right to build sewer and water lines on the property. Mr. Brannon was to have the privilege of using these utilities for his store. The water in the tank was to be used for fire protection. The Hosiery Mill, which acquired in 1923 the rest of Mr. Brannon's property on Lots 1 and 2, employed about 20 people, mostly women, girls and boys.

The Moreland Hosiery Mills was incorporated on May 14, 1920 and its organizers included the leadership of Moreland, mostly members of the Camp family and W. A. Brannon who was elected secretary-treasurer of the new corporation. The new company arose at a time that the cotton market was decreasing and by 1926 was deeply in debt and had its mortgage foreclos It was sold at public outcry on September 30, 1926. It went for \$40,000 to a group of investors who in November, 1926 formed the Moreland Knitting Mills. These investors were from Newnan and Moreland. In 1927 the Moreland Knitting Mills acquired the property of the Moreland Hosiery Mills.

During the years of its existance the Moreland Knitting Mills employed as many as 100 people. It started out making cotton hosiery, switched to rayon and finally to nylon. Many of the former employees still reside in Moreland. The depression wiped out most of the industries in town, leaving only the Knitting Mill which continued operation until about June 1968. The entire property was sold to Charles B. Thomas and was used mostly for storage except for a brief period when used by Bobby Powell to manufacture ladies garment Mr. Thomas sold the property to the PEB Corporation in May 1974. It was used to manufacture women's uniforms and housecoats until about 1978. In 1983 the PEB Corporation deeded the property to the City of Moreland as a gift.
