#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Potts Brothers Store, built about 1894, is a simple one-story fieldstone structure located on a cleared lot in the tiny community of Gabbettville, in rural Troup County, Georgia.

The rectangular building is constructed of granite fieldstone, laid somewhat more regularly on the front facade, in the area protected by the porch, than elsewhere. The stonework is built up into a stepped gable on the front, masking the ridgeline of the hipped roof. The roof's unusually wide boxed overhang extends around the other three sides. The front facade has a full-width, shed-roofed porch supported by four crude wooden columns. The main entrance, protected by the porch, has double, wood-paneled doors with a segmentally arched transom above. One large, segmentally arched, eight-overeight pane sash window is located to either side of the entrance. Metal grilles cover the front windows and transom and also two rear six-over-six pane windows which flank a central rear bricked-in door. An additional paneled door towards the rear of the southeast side led into a wooden shed which has been demolished. A single interior brick chimney is located on the northwest side near the front.

The interior was originally one large room with pine flooring (now covered with carpet), plaster walls, and a ceiling of beaded tongue-and-groove boards. A simple hand-carved mantel on a raised hearth, located near the front, may or may not have been original. During the 1970s the majority of the interior space was subdivided into offices, leaving a large open area at the rear. Beaded wainscotting in the front reception area has been made from the old post office and store counters which remained in the building.

The store building is located on a corner lot at the junction of Gabbettville and Cannonville Roads in rural Troup County. It sits on a slight rise, near the banks of Long Cane Creek. The property is close to a railroad track and is surrounded by farmland. To the front of the building are several large shade trees and a low granite and brick retaining wall.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

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The Potts Brothers Store is historically significant in the areas of architecture and commerce. Architecturally, the building is a good example of a late-nineteenth century country store located in rural Georgia. It is one of the few, and by far the most substantial structure, remaining in the tiny community of Gabbettville. Its construction of fieldstone, a relatively rare building material in Georgia, adds to its architectural significance. In terms of commerce, the store is significant as an example of the type of all-purpose country stores that served the farms and plantations of rural Georgia at the turn-of-the-century. The above areas of significance support property eligibility under National Register Criteria A and C.

Architecturally, the store is at the same time typical and rather unique for a latenineteenth century rural commercial structure in Georgia. The one-story, open room interior is typical; the use of fieldstone, apparently quarried on a family plantation near the Chattahoochee River, is most unusual. Rural commercial structures were more typically constructed of wood. The stepped gable at the front probably relates to the "sign board" facades of the wooden commercial structures that were erected in Georgia's rapidly developing towns earlier in the nineteenth century.

The location of the Potts Brothers Store and Gabbettville, the tiny community surrounding it, can be explained by the railroad. In 1854 when the local railroad was extended from nearby LaGrange to West Point, a coaling station was established at this point, and later, in 1886, a pass track was constructed here. A small community began to form and in about 1894 Fanning and Frank Potts located their store here, no doubt because the pass track provided a convenient unloading point for the store merchandise. Like other all-purpose country stores of the period, the Potts Brothers Store sold a complete line of supplies for home, farm, and plantation, as well as horses and mules. In addition, the post office was located in the store for some years. Nearby the brothers operated two cotton gins, a flour mill, and a grist mill. About 1907, the store became the property of William Metz, in whose family's hands it remained until the 1970s. The building has been used as a tenant house and for storage before being turned into offices by the present owners. The existence of the store ledger books from the 1890s adds to its commercial significance.
