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Architectural Description

Pleasant Ridge Church is located about 20 miles north of Phillipsburg at 381 East Buffalo Road 3 ¾ miles east of Highway 183. The building faces southward and is situated on a quarter acre of land in the Glenwood Township (T-1-S-R-17-W). This 20' x 32' building was built in 1898 and features a national folk architectural style. A 1940s frame outhouse with a tin gable roof is located north of the church and is considered a contributor to the property. The Pleasant Ridge Cemetery (previously known as the Sod Cemetery) is located across the road south of the church. The cemetery is not included within the boundaries of the nominated property.

Exterior

This simple one room, wood frame building rests on a concrete foundation and features a gable roof with asphalt composition shingles, a bell tower above the entrance, and an internal ridge brick chimney at the rear. Narrow weatherboard siding painted white gives the building a simple, uniform appearance. A concrete walkway leads to the building's only entrance, which is marked by a multi-panel wood door on the south elevation.

Each side elevation contains three evenly spaced 2-over-2 double hung wood windows. These tall, narrow windows provide the interior with ample sunlight. Three of the six windows have screens.

A wood frame, single toilet outhouse (C) is located north of the church. It features a tin gable roof and is painted white.

Interior

Much of the historic interior, comprised of a single large room 20'x 32', remains intact. Vertical wainscoting stretches four feet from the floor to the bottom of the windows. It is stained and varnished with a dark color and is topped with a molding. The interior walls above the stained wainscoting feature horizontal wainscoting, which runs up the walls and over the 11 ½' ceiling and is painted green. The bulls eye trim around the windows and door is stained to match the vertical wainscoting.

Sixteen wooden pews flank a central aisle that leads to a stage with a rise of 12" for the preacher's pulpit at the north end of the interior. At the center of the north wall extends a stovepipe from the chimney. Electricity was installed in 1950, but the building has no plumbing.

The floor is made of pinewood, but was covered with carpet in 1917 and then the current floral patterned linoleum in 1948.

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The building is in good condition, but minor repairs to the concrete foundation and sidewalk, stage floor, and windows are needed.

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Statement of Significance

The Pleasant Ridge Church (c. 1898) is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for its architectural significance as a good local example of the national folk tradition. Its simplistic design and rectangular form allowed for multiple uses of the building including a school and meeting hall. Although formal church services ended in 1969, area residents still use the building for holiday celebrations, weddings, and funerals. With most of its original materials intact, this plain frame church building retains a high degree of interior and exterior integrity.

Historical Overview

Phillips County organized in 1872 and was divided into seven townships with Phillipsburg selected as the county seat. By 1912 there were 25 townships. With successful harvest seasons during the mid- and late 1870s, settlers arrived in growing numbers. Census records indicate a significant growth in population in Phillips County from 2,813 residents in 1875 to 12,014 in 1880. The county's population peaked in 1900 at 14,442. It was during this era of population growth that the Pleasant Ridge Church was constructed.

Architecture

The national folk architectural tradition spread throughout the United States with the expansion of the railroad lines in the mid and late 1800s. No longer were builders restricted to the use of local materials. Railroads transported bulky materials used in construction, particularly lumber from forested areas. Wood frame buildings constructed with massed produced materials quickly replaced log and sod structures. The styles and shapes of modest national folk buildings were more standardized with less emphasis on regional traditions than preceeding architectural styles.²

Sod buildings dotted the early Phillips County landscape where few trees grew. Prior to the construction of Pleasant Ridge Church in 1898, worshippers gathered in a sod church across the road. The Central Branch of the Union Pacific Railroad was finished through Kirwin and Logan in southern Phillips County in 1880. The Denver extension of the Burlington and Missouri River Railroad was completed through nearby Republican City, Nebraska, in 1880. This gave residents and businessmen valuable access to eastern markets and later to western markets.

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The builder of the Pleasant Ridge Church is unknown. Parishioners and area residents most likely collaborated to build the church themselves with mass-produced construction materials shipped from a distant market. The style of the building is similar to country schools and churches of the period. Aside from its simplicity in design, the Quaker tradition is not reflected in the architecture.

Church History

The history of the church pre-dates the existing 1898 structure. In 1882, T.W. and Emily Dunton deeded land to trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church for the purpose of "divine worship." A sod building was then erected where the Pleasant Ridge Cemetery is today to be used as a church and schoolhouse. The school organized in 1878, yet the precise date of construction of the original sod building is unknown. The existence of a school *close* to this location is noted on an 1883 Phillips County map produced by Rand, McNally and Company and published with William Cutler's *History of the State of Kansas*. However, personal records indicate that a Reverend Goodredye dedicated the Sod Church in 1884. The school relocated at an unknown date. The trustees of the Methodist Church maintained ownership of the cemetery until 1944 when it was transferred to the trustees of Pleasant Ridge Community. Today, the Pleasant Ridge Church is often called the Sod Church.

In 1898, William and Sarah Boston transferred a small portion of their land to The Kansas Yearly Meeting of the Society of Friends for "the use of the pleasant ridge monthly meeting of said society." It is believed that the church was erected at this time for a cost of \$500. More commonly known as Quakers, this organization retained ownership of the land and church until 1989 when the Pleasant Ridge Historical Society, Inc. purchased the property.

The first recorded visit of Quakers into the territory that would later become Kansas was by Henry Harvey, Simon Hadley and Solomon Haddon in 1833. They later established a Quaker mission near Westport Landing along the Missouri River in 1837. Quaker families began moving to the territory after the passage of the Kansas-Nebraska Act in 1854 to Leavenworth, Osawatomie, and near Emporia. Their numbers totaled 200 by 1857. State census numbers from 1882 indicate the existence of 48 Friends organizations with 4,774 members in Kansas.

The name Pleasant Ridge is believed to have originated from the nearby Pleasant Ridge Stock Farm owned by Margaret McFarlane (circa 1900). The cemetery and original sod building sat on

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McFarlane's land.⁵ Another possible source for the name Pleasant Ridge comes from Pleasant Ridge Post Office in neighboring Harlan County, Nebraska, that served area residents from 1876 to 1887. Interestingly, in his book *Kansas Place-Names* author John Rydjord notes, "The Kansas pioneers suffered from almost every conceivable hardship, but still they tried to create the impression that Kansas was a pleasant land...One can only conclude that the hills and valleys, ridges and runs, were pleasing to the eyes of the pioneers."

Early settlers of this area included families from Scotland, England, Germany, Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Missouri. They also included several Civil War veterans, many of whom are buried in the Pleasant Ridge Cemetery and have early connections with the church.⁷

A record of church business and events was kept from 1900 to 1969. A secretary would record attendance, the amount of money collected, song titles, and who led prayers. Also noted is the cancellation of church services and classes due to inclement weather and illness, such as small pox. During the early years, attendance averaged 40 to 50 people, with the largest attendance recorded being 87. When church services ended in 1969, attendance averaged 15. With no reason given, the church temporarily closed from December 1937 to April 1938. Attendance was down and many faced hardships from the economic depression.

Although most of the ministers were circuit riders, it is believed that the first preacher at Pleasant Ridge Church was Reverend Jarbo. Missionaries travelling through the area often stopped to preach. Much of the community, no matter which religious denomination, attended revival meetings at the church. Church leaders hired a janitor in 1905 for general building and cemetery maintenance and chopping firewood. Reverend Jones took over janitorial duties in 1919. A librarian and assistant librarian worked at the church from about 1913 to the 1950s.

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The church name varied through its twentieth century history. Records suggest the church was known as the Pleasant Ridge Union Sunday School in 1904 and Pleasant Ridge Federated Church in 1919. The 1919 bylaws called for the church to be in the hands of not less than three elders, three deacons, and three trustees. The elders and deacons oversaw the church government, while trustees apointed committees to oversee Sunday school classes, missionary activities, and the activities of the church. ¹⁰

Members of the church were appointed to the Christian Mission Society from 1913 to 1949. The group raised money by serving lunch at farm sales, by making ice-cream and candy, making and selling quilts, and selling apples. The money was then used for flowers at funerals, cards for the sick, maintenance of the church, holiday treats, and supplies for church dinners. They made quilts and other items for orphans in Africa. Their missionary work included donating to the Red Cross and the National War Fund during World War II. They also donated packages to the veterans at Winter General and Victoria Hospital in Topeka. In 1948, the church voted to raise funds for the purchase of a new piano and to sell the old organ. ¹¹

The church hosted many activities in the early days, such as Thanksgiving dinners, Christmas and Easter programs, and Father's Day celebrations. No records were found regarding baptisms, but many in the community remember baptisms taking place at the nearby Republican River. One community member recalled that a handkerchief was placed over one's nose and mouth while being dunked three times – once each for the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

Regular religious services at the church ended in 1969 and the property was sold to Pleasant Ridge Historical Society, Inc. in 1989. The group has since repaired the roof (1989) and painted the building's exterior. The building is now used for Memorial Day services, weddings, and funerals.
