During the 1954 renovation, at which time the house was converted to its present use as a library, the entrance was replaced by a window, and the rest was filled in with sandstone similar to the exiating. Originally, there was a porch which went across the entire southeast front; the outline can still be seen on the stone. The original first floor level was approximately $5^{\prime}$ above grade, which makes the house seem extrenely tall.
