7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The church Nuestra Señora de la Concepción y San Fernando of Toa Alta, built from 1752 to 1826, sits on a block by itself facing the town plaza, and is basically oriented on an east-west axis. It is separated from its immediate surroundings by a simple wall enclosing garden areas around the main structure.

The building plan consists of only one nave covered with a large barrel vault 38.6 feet wide. The brick of the barrel vault is exposed on the interior of the church. Walls of great thickness and wide buttresses receive the weight of the vault. Four lunette openings were placed above the nave in order to illuminate the interior space. There are four bays plus the apse and sacristies area. The apse and sacristies are also covered by individual barrel vaults. The entire structure is constructed of durable materials, such as mortar and brick. The floors are covered with colored native cement tiles of various designs. The original floors were probably replaced during the first half of this century. The interior decoration was altered in 1945. Pilasters were attached to the side walls in addition to a frieze of Renaissance design.

The facade is emphasized by two Corinthian columns with fluted bodies which support a small frieze above the entrance door. Above this area, two pilasters and the espadaña, or bell gable, with three bells highlight the importance of the entrance. Curious decorative elements top a series of small buttresses on the facade. The side facades are treated in a simple fashion. One arched door flanked on each side by enormous buttresses allows ventilation and light to the interior. The stucco of the arches above these side doors was scraped and the brick work has been exposed (1977), as in an interior arch between the nave and the apse. The exterior of the church is deteriorated, having vegetation growing on the walls and buttresses.

The most noticeable alteration to the main structure is the addition of a new parish house which is attached to the rear facade of the original church. The doors and windows in the main building are not original and are in a very deteriorated state.



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The church Nuestra Señora de la Concepción y San Fernando is of historical and architectural significance. In 1751, at the same time the city of Toa Alta was founded, the church construction began. The building is dedicated to Nuestra Señora de la Concepción and to San Fernando. It retains most of its original construction and design elements. It is a good example of the churches built from 1720 to 1820 on the Island that have a single nave covered with a barrel vault. The space created by the bold brick vault, finished in 1802, is surprising and impressive, and has miraculously survived until today. The barrel vault, 38.6 feet wide, is the largest of its kind in the Island. Construction of the church was finally finished in 1826. The small frieze on the facade is a rare example of a decorative treatment to this area. The columns at the entrance have fluted bodies. Both elements relatively of a small scale present an interesting contrast to the overall size of the church. The espadaña was placed after it was recommended by José Y. Hernández in a report in 1861. The most noticeable alteration that somewhat detracts from the significance of the property is the addition of a new parish house. The traditional relationship between the town plaza, the church and city hall is, however, maintained, presenting an example of early Puerto Rican town planning.
