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Rectangular clapboard structure of Greek Revival design with Gothic details. Gabled roof supported by four large square columns which rest on brick piers. Two engaged columns at end under portico. Double front Christian doors surmounted by a lancet arch with tracery of wood and glass. In center of pediment is a rectangular design with pedimented architrave. Three windows (six over six) with clear glass panes on each side of building. Each window is crowned by a lancet arch with tracery of wood and glass that is similar to the one over front entrance. A door has been added in the left wall of structure.

Interior woodwork is all hand carved and the slave gallery is in its original form. When the building was acquired by the Barnwell County Historic Preservation Commission, it was moved from its original location to an adjoining lot. Originally, the four columns stood on a brick front porch which was not replaced when the building was moved.

Significant for its architecture and as town of Barnwell's first Presbyterian Church which was used as the Barnwell County Court House during the Reconstruction era of South Carolina history. One of few remaining antebellum structures in town which was almost entirely destroyed by Sherman.

Organization of church was effected in June, 1832, by the Reverend Dr. James Henley Thornwell, noted Presbyterian clergyman and later President of South Carolina College.

Present church built Circa 1848. Remaining essentially unaltered and designed with classic simplicity, the church was apparently constructed by a local craftsman and has hand carved interior woodwork and slave gallery. The classic design of simple lines combines with the lancet Gothic arches over the front entrance and the side windows for a successful blending of styles.

After the Confederate War, the membership of the church had declined to so few that the Presbyterians rented the church to Barnwell County, and it was used as the court house for about twenty years until the present court house was built in the 1880s.

In this building in 1867, when South Carolina was undergoing Reconstruction, a period of military rule and supremacy, Circuit Judge A. P. Aldrich adjourned the court rather than obey the order of General Canby of the Second Military District. He said: "Gentlemen of the juries, for the present farewell; but if God spares my life, I will yet preside in this court, a South Carolina judge whose ermine is unstained. Mr. Sheriff, let the court stand adjourned while the voice of justice is stifled."

Among outstanding South Carolinians associated with the church were Dr. B. M. Palmer and Dr. J. L. Girdeau, theologians; William Hay Townsend, S.C. Circuit Judge; Johnson Hagood, Brigadier General (C.S.A.) and governor of South Carolina.

The Barnwell County Historic Preservation Commission plans to use the building as a museum.
