

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#### Description:

The Burbank Schoolhouse is a large one-story building located on one of the main blacktop roads that intersect in Burbank, a small farming community. Since its construction in 1910, the current building was used continuously as a school until 1970. It has been used as a center of community life and a public meeting place and still serves the community in these ways. It also served as a location for township voting until the early 1980s. A variety of events, such as the annual Easter Egg Hunt for Fairview Township children, benefits, fund-raisers, and family and community picnics have taken place at the site.

The original school building is rectangular, measuring approximately 32 feet by 60, with a hip roof and front projection in the center of the front facade. The front projecting gable covers the school bell, which was enclosed circa 1965. This alteration was needed to prevent water damage to the building and does not affect the architectural integrity of the building. The original projection featured a flat roof with a balustrade. A brick foundation supports the school house. The wood-frame building is sheathed in horizontal clapboard. Cornerboards and fascia are all of the same simple millwork.

The front facade features two ribbons of three one-over-one double hung windows on either side of the front projection. The projection features a fanlight over the double door entrance. Also, in the 1960s an entryway to the exterior basement stairs was installed. The entrance is on the south side of the front projection. The north and south elevations both feature four one-over-one double-hung sash windows. The double-hung windows of the west elevation were replaced with glass block circa 1965. The owners are planning to remove the glass block and put in replicas of the double hung windows.

If you enter the building through the foyer, the center is divided into a lobby and an elevated theater stage. The stairs to the basement are on the right side of the lobby, and the "stage right" door is directly ahead. Built-in cupboards line the south wall of the foyer and lobby. To the right of the lobby is a short hall with an adjacent restroom that leads to the northern classroom. This classroom features a closet that

originally served as the teacher's coatroom and storage. The stage curtain serves as one wall of the room. Not only did this room to seat audiences for school plays, it was also functioned as a performance area for community children after the district was incorporated into the nearby Vermillion Schools. Under the stage, accessed from the lobby, is storage for folding chairs. To the left of the lobby is another short hall with an adjoining restroom and another large classroom.

This classroom features a tall built-in display cabinet on the north wall of the same elaborate woodwork as used throughout the rest of the building. Also on the north wall is a door leading backstage. The entire main floor is covered with maple tongue-and-groove flooring. All ceilings on the main floor measure 12' high, with molding approximately 2' below the ceiling. Walls and ceiling are original lath and plaster. Chair-rail molding can be found throughout the main floor on most walls; below is varnished pine wainscoting and mopboard at the floor.

The main access to the basement is by the stairway in the lobby. The floor plan is roughly the same as the main floor. The central area is bordered on two sides by coat-hanging areas for children, with a shelf above. Under the stairs is built-in storage, and on the southwest corner of the room is another stairway leading to the outdoors. This entrance was enclosed in the early 1960s. West of the coat area is a large furnace, utility and work-room with more built-in cupboards. A large double door on the south wall of the coat area leads to the dining room and kitchen. The kitchen and dining area are original to the building but were modernized in the late 1960s. Between the large entry to the dining hall and the door to the kitchen stands a cupboard that held dishes for the children's meals. The southern wall of the kitchen consists of a serving counter with a large window opening onto the dining hall.

The opposite end of the basement is open, with the south wall holding more coat hooks and shelving. This area made an excellent playroom on days when the weather prevented the children from going outside. All of the basement windows are glass block. The basement walls are back-plastering.

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### Narrative Statement of Significance:

Burbank School Number 10 is significant under criteria A in association with the events of the growth of the town of Burbank. This school is a symbol of the development of the community. It is also significant under criteria C due to its architecture. The building is one of few remaining examples of rural school houses built in 1910.

The community of Burbank began as a settlement named Victors at the site of a Missouri River ferry crossing in 1859. When the Dakota Southern Railway was built from Sioux City to Yankton in 1872, the name was changed to Burbank in honor of John A. Burbank, who was governor of Dakota Territory when the town was founded and also one of the directors of the Dakota Southern Railroad.

Block 4 of the town of Burbank was set aside for the school when the town was originally laid out and platted by Cornelius Andrews, Nelson W. Cusick, and Jonas S. Meckling, on June 3, 1873. This fact was recorded October 6, 1873 at 9 o'clock A. M. on Page 311 of Book A of Deeds at the Office of the Registrar of Deeds in Clay County, South Dakota. The original school building was built in 1881, in time for the first class to be taught by Alma Maynard.

Within twenty years, original building built on this site in 1881 grew too small to serve the needs of the children. School District 10 issued bonds that were purchased by Clara Salmer of Vermillion to build the present school on the same spot as the original.

Since its construction in 1910, the current building was used as a school until 1970. As a center of community life and a public meeting place, it still serves the community in these ways and was used as a location for township  $\mathring{v}$ oting until the early 1980s.

Burbank School Number 10 is an example of the rural school houses that used to dot the countryside, of which few remain. The school house is also one of only two older buildings to survive in Burbank. The building is the only remaining

meeting hall in Fairview Township and hosts both the township board and the local Community, Parks and Cemetery Association.

The Burbank school has undergone few changes. Some windows have been replaced, and the bell tower had a gabled roof added. The school retains its original integrity and is a reminder of the small-town rural schools that used to be abundant. The town of Burbank itself has also retained its small farm community atmosphere and the school still stands as a focal point of community life.
