Summary Paragraph

The Schuetz Log Cabin is a small, one story rectangular log cabin constructed sometime between 1900 and 1920. The property is located in a rural region of Morrill County, Nebraska which had a population of 5,440 in 2000. The log cabin is sited in its original location on a ranch along the Greenwood Creek drainage basin. The surrounding landscape is comprised of flat to gently rolling topography interrupted by occasional buttes. The property on which the log cabin is located has several modern farming buildings and a primary residence for the owners. The cabin and other farm buildings are accessed by a gravel and dirt road.

Narrative Description

The Schuetz Log Cabin is a one story, rectangular log building measuring 13 feet by 25 feet. The logs used to construct the cabin vary from roughly 10 inches to 15 inches in diameter. The horizontal logs are hewn flat on the exterior while the corner posts used to connect the logs, are hewn square. The horizontal logs are built up in even tiers as a result of the squared corner posts. The gable ends are constructed with vertical boards in the peak, that until recently had clapboard siding as part of an overall later alteration. Original stone and mortar chinking between the logs is evident in spots; however, much of the chinking is absent.

The cabin had several alterations over the years that are currently in the process of being removed, bringing the cabin back to a historic appearance. The entire cabin was clad in wood clapboards at one point; however few clapboards remain, with the remainder in the process of being removed. The southern and northern facades had small frame additions that have been removed. Currently the southern facade is composed of one window opening on the western end and two door openings to the east. Only the openings exist, and no doors or windows are present in this façade. A chimney flue constructed of concrete blocks, existed between the non-extant addition and the original log cabin interior. This non-original chimney is in the process of being removed as part of the rehabilitation. The east gable end facade has one window located in the center of the elevation that is in poor condition, as only the wood frame is extant. This window frame appears to have been a one over one double hung window. The northern facade has a non-historic gable addition to the roof, which is in the process of being removed. Additionally the area to the north of the cabin has a wooden floor covering a cellar. An addition to the cabin once existed over the cellar but has been removed. The concrete and concrete block cellar is non-historic. The entrance to the cellar is next to the cabin with a three foot non-historic stud frame projection existing as part of the previous addition to the cabin, over the cellar. Another entrance is located along the north elevation of the cabin. The original door opening is still located in the center of this facade; however the original door is non-extant. The western gable end facade has one central window opening with a double hung window frame without glass. The roof of the cabin is in poor condition currently with many of the original wooden shingles missing.

The area surrounding the cabin has continued in operation as the heart of a farm since the farmstead's establishment. Several corrals for livestock, a shed, workshop, bunk house, abandoned outhouse, and modern cabin, have been constructed on the farmstead. The log cabin is located at the far eastern edge of the farmstead's building complex, nestled in the corner of a small windbreak. Numerous trees are found around the immediate area of the farmstead and along the nearby spring and Greenwood Creek. The general topography consists of rolling hills to the west with flatter land to the east. Numerous buttes are located within several miles, the most famous of which are Courthouse Rock and Jail Rock.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance and applicable criteria.)

The Schuetz log cabin is significant at the local level under Criterion C for architecture as an excellent example of log construction in Morrill County, Nebraska. The cabin exhibits significance through its unique log construction which was at one time a favored and convenient construction method. Despite its fair condition and past alterations, the Schuetz log cabin has maintained its core character defining features that are in the process of being revealed as rehabilitation progresses.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

Criteria C:

The Schuetz Log Cabin is significant at the local level according to Criterion C for architecture. Log construction has long been favored in frontier regions for the ease of construction when few building supplies are readily available. As the western half of Nebraska was settled under the Homestead Act and Kinkaid Act in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, log construction was often chosen by those with a source of suitable trees. The logs used in the Schuetz Log Cabin are believed to have come from trees along Greenwood Creek. The particular construction method used for constructing the log cabin, where corner posts are used for connections, is believed to have been chosen as a result of the short trees available in the region. Corner posts allow for shorter logs to be used more efficiently and numerous segments of log panels can be constructed in a manner similar to the pièce sur pièce method; however the doors in the Schuetz Log Cabin have large boards framing the opening opposite of the corner posts, making this cabin not truly constructed in the pièce sur pièce method.

Log cabins undoubtedly composed a significant number of the early building stock of Morrill County, Nebraska. The Nebraska Historic Resources Inventory currently lists nine known log cabins in Morrill County. Of those nine the Schuetz Log Cabin represents one of the best examples of log construction in the county. Six of the log cabins have substantial modifications or additions, altering their character. The two other log cabins exist in a near ruinous condition. Based upon the recorded properties, log construction appears to have extended throughout the period of settlement from 1880 to 1930, with most of the log cabins dating between 1890 and 1910.

The Schuetz Log Cabin is one of the best remaining examples of log construction in Morrill County, Nebraska. Sited on its original location, the house is in the process of being rehabilitated. The setting has changed little, with the surrounding ranch possessing numerous corrals and associated agricultural buildings, while a modern log cabin is the main residence for the family. The character defining features of the hand hewn logs and roof frame embodies a rare method of construction and craftsmanship for the region and possesses good integrity of materials and workmanship. The design of the cabin has been slightly modified over the years, but most of these modifications have been removed and the remaining modifications will be removed as part of the rehabilitation. The cabin continues to convey its feeling and association with the pioneer period for the high plains. For these reasons the Schuetz Log Cabin is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

Developmental history/additional historic context information (if appropriate)

Louis William Schuetz was born in Darmstadt, Germany on October 4, 1863. Louis was the son of Phillip Schuetz, a German man, who prospered in the profession of slate roofing. At fourteen years of age, Louis was sent to New York City when his health declined. His parents' hopes were that his health would improve by living in the city with his uncle. In New York City at age sixteen, Louis, then known as Louie, joined the United States Army as a drummer boy. In the Army, Louis continued his schooling as was required of all young recruits.

Louie came to Nebraska in the spring of 1880 to meet with his Army Company E, 21st Infantry. He was assigned to Ft. Sidney to protect Union Pacific Railroad workers from attacks by the Native Americans in the area. On December 17, 1884 Louie was honorably discharged from the Army. Like many former soldiers, Louie Schuetz took employment as a cowboy, being eventually hired by the Stevens and Lytle Cattle Company of Nebraska. A few years later Louie re-enlisted

in the Army, at Fort Sidney, and in two years he was once again honorably discharged due to injuries sustained from a horse accident. After his discharge he once again took to his life as a cowboy.

In December of 1890 Louie Schuetz was hunting in northern Cheyenne County (from which Morrill County would be created in 1908) with his friend, Woodson G. Land. While hunting they stumbled upon some land along Greenwood Creek that had not yet been claimed under the Homestead Act. Louis Schuetz seized this opportunity to claim land which had the most vital of resources for this semi-arid region, water. On December 20, 1890 Louie Schuetz filed for the 160 acres of land along Greenwood Creek. With the land acquisition Louie began his life as a farmer-rancher. His new occupation required him to hand dig postholes for a barbed wire fence that eventually would stretch more than six miles around his property as he increased his land holdings to 880 acres.

Less than a year after Louie acquired his farm, he married his wife, Margaret Jane Hughes on June 5, 1891. Margaret came to Sidney with her sister, Ella, from their parents' home in Jewell County, Kansas. She was originally from Rock Island County, Illinois, where she was born on February 13, 1867. Maggie, as she was more commonly known, was the oldest of nine children. Her father made a living working in the coal mines and later took up farming. The Hughes family was of English and Welsh descent. In Sidney, Maggie held the position of maid in Captain Ebstein's office quarters. She worked on the Fort where she met Louie. Maggie also filed a homestead claim and held 160 acres of land south of Courthouse Rock. On her 160 acres of land, she lived in a sod shanty, by herself, until the day she married Louie. After their marriage, Louie and Margaret moved to Louie's homestead and constructed a sod house. In the years following the marriage, Louie Schuetz replaced the sod house with a native-stone house (non-extant), the log cabin (extant), and finally a frame house (non-extant).

Turn of the 20th century life on the Schuetz homestead in rural Morrill County, Nebraska, was a life full of isolation. The farm was many miles from the railroad and was also a good distance from the town of Sidney. Outside communication came by mail, and Louie made it a point to ride to the Sidney Post Office to collect the mail as much as he could. Margaret and Louie had six children living on the farm. All of the children attended the Greenwood District School. In 1912, the oldest daughter, Creta, became the school's teacher which required her to teach her four youngest siblings and other children from the area.

During this period, settlement of the county increased rapidly. From a population of 4,584 in 1910, the county increased to a size of 9,950 by 1930 before beginning a gradual decline. The majority of people who settled in Morrill County in the early 20th century were involved in ranching, farming, or the oil industry. Attempts at farming the semi-arid land and the oil industry struggled over the years, but ranches, like that operated by Louie Schuetz, thrived in the county.

Louie and Maggie Schuetz both died on their farm in Greenwood Creek area. Louie died on March 23, 1943, and Margaret on January 10, 1954. After their deaths the land was kept in the family. Phillip, the son of Louie and Maggie, allowed his niece and her husband, Lois and Howard Reimers, to purchase the land. In 2004 the grandson of Lois Reimers, Bryan Reimers, purchased the land. In 1996 the Schuetz -Z- Ranch was given the recognition as a Nebraska farm with continued ownership within the family for over 100 years, through the Nebraska Pioneer Farm Award.

The boundary of this log cabin is limited to the immediate surrounding area formed by the small windbreak on the southern and eastern edges. The northern and western edges are delineated by extending off of the ends of the windbreak, thus creating a rectangular plot enclosing the cabin. The parcel extends 20 feet out from each façade of the log cabin, forming a rectangle measuring 53 feet east to west and 65 feet north to south with the cabin in the center.

Boundary Justification (Explain why the boundaries were selected.)

The boundary includes only the Schuetz Log Cabin, defined by the windbreak and the small amount of land surrounding it. The remaining portion of the ranch was excluded due to t non-historic agricultural buildings and development.
