Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The area commonly known as Isley Field/Saipan International airport is located on the southern end of Saipan.

Official/U.S. military histories and local spellings of the World War II airfield are incorrect. The airbase was named after Commander Robert H. Isley of VT-16. Prior to the American capture of Saipan it was a Japanese forward maintenance and fighter base named Aslito. Construction of Aslito began in 1934 and continued to the time of the invasion of Saipan in June 1944.

Aslito airfield was secured by troops of the U.S. Army 27th Division on 18 June, 1944. P-47's of the 318th Fighter Group flew into Aslito on 22 June. Aviation/Engineers and a Naval Construction Battalion moved four million cubic meters of earth to construct a 2,667 meter runway for the B-29 superfortresses that were to bomb the Japanese homeland. The first B-29 landed on the completed runway on October 12, 1944. By November 1944 15,000 members of the 73rd Bomb Wing had arrived as well as the aircraft of this unit.

The first B-29 raid on Japan was launched on 24 November, 1944.

Isley field was deactivated in 1949. In October 1973 construction was begun on the Saipan International airport. The present runway is located on top of the Isley field south runway. The terminal building is situated at the site of a Japanese hanger and revetted munitions building. The Isley field district has three distinct areas; the Japanese Aslito field complex, the two Isley runways, taxiways and 110 hardstands, and the 73rd Bomb Wing Headquarters and living area.

Located within the Aslito field complex are twenty-seven intact Japanese constructed buildings. Brief descriptions of a sample of the buildings is offered below. Attached are elevations for one of the more significant buildings. Additionally, there are hundreds of foundations of American buildings and relics of Isley Field. The foundations and building functions are delineated in a 1980 survey of the district.

Intact Structures

Operations Center

This former Japanese Operations Center was employed by the U.S. 73rd Bomb Wing for similar purposes. Today it is adjacent to the Saipan International Airport terminal and is a fine example of adaptive reuse.

WWII Bomb damage to the building has been repaired, the building has been painted, and new tile floors have been installed. It now serves as a tourist information center and office of the Marianas Visitors Bureau.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Marianas were captured (and Guam recaptured) for their tactical importance in the B-29 neutralization of Japan. It was from these islands that the war in the Pacific was brought to the Japanese homeland and ultimate victory achieved in large part by the B-29 bombing raids. Of the B-29 bases in the Marianas Isley Field was the most important and has the greatest number of features that recall its World War II history. As indicated in section 7 there are 27 intact structures, two runways, and hundreds of hardstands and foundations from the U.S. period. Concrete and asphalt roads have survived as have other relics of the Japanese and American bases.

Extant is the original wood ceiling, wiring conduits, steel doors, and windows. The interior configuration retains the original floor plan.

This concrete building survived the bombardment of Saipan with major damage limited to a bomb hole (1m + 1.50 m.) in the operations office (today, director of the Visitors Bureau Office). The hole was repaired during the construction of the Saipan airport. The original 2 cm. thick steel plate doors and window covers are in place.

Elevations of this building are attached.

Gas Drum Storage Bunkers (4)

These concrete and rebar bunkers are 8.4 meters high, and the walls are 80 cm. thick. Windows and doors are sheltered by steel plates 2 cm. thick. The inside dimensions are 14.20 m. x 16.00 m.

Bomb damage, including penetration, is present at each of the bunkers.

The interiors are open and contain four roof support posts. The roof interiors in two bunkers are spalling.

Other Intact Buildings

A bunkered, two story, power plant building and a two story generator building have survived. There is also a semi-underground bomb storage building, revetted by a L shaped concrete and soil wall 150 x 50 m. A gun emplacement is on the soil covered roof of this structure. This is the only remaining example of this type of building in Micronesia, and the structure is in excellent condition.

Another unique building is a semi-underground fuel storage facility (inside dimensions 10.45 x 14.80 meters), with three large fuel tanks. Adjacent to the fuel storage building is a pump house, upon which camouflage paint is still visible.

Additional buildings are a torpedo regulating shop, 11 concrete air raid shelter, and a cold storage building.

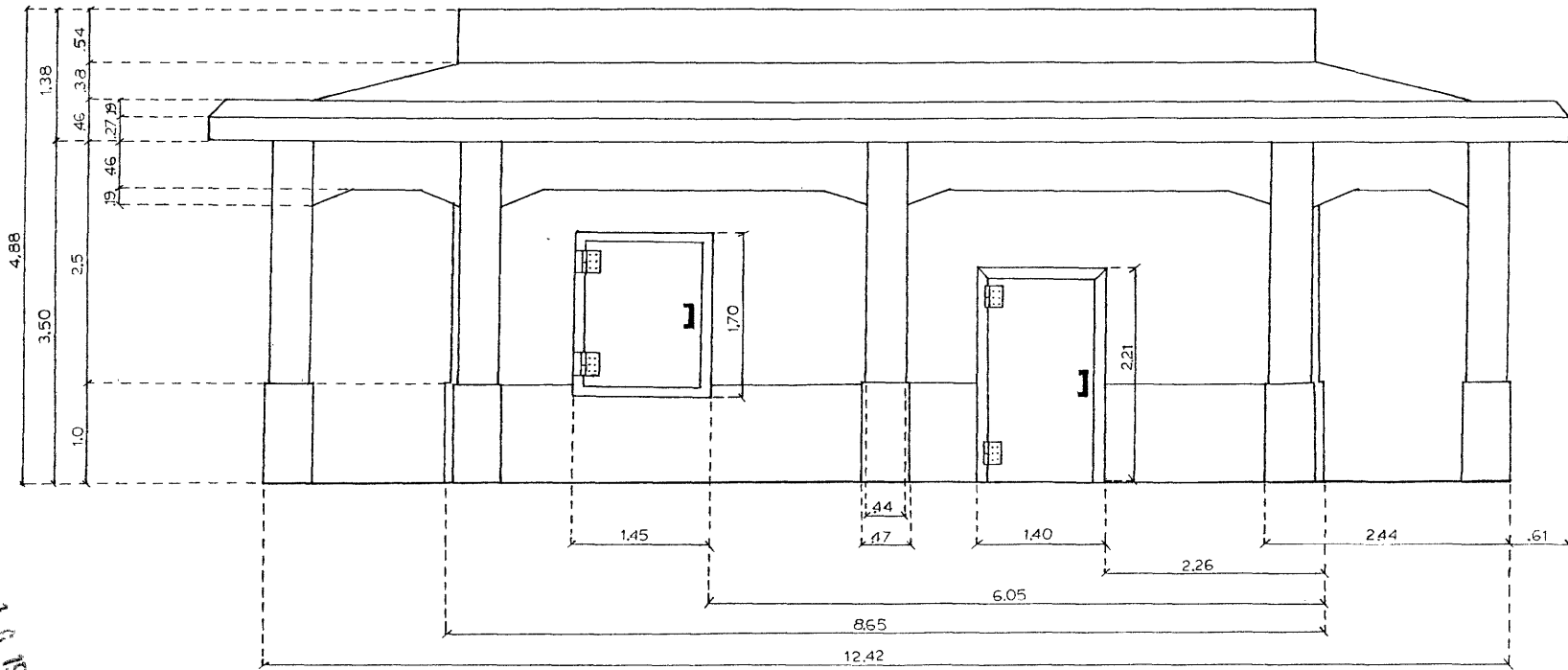

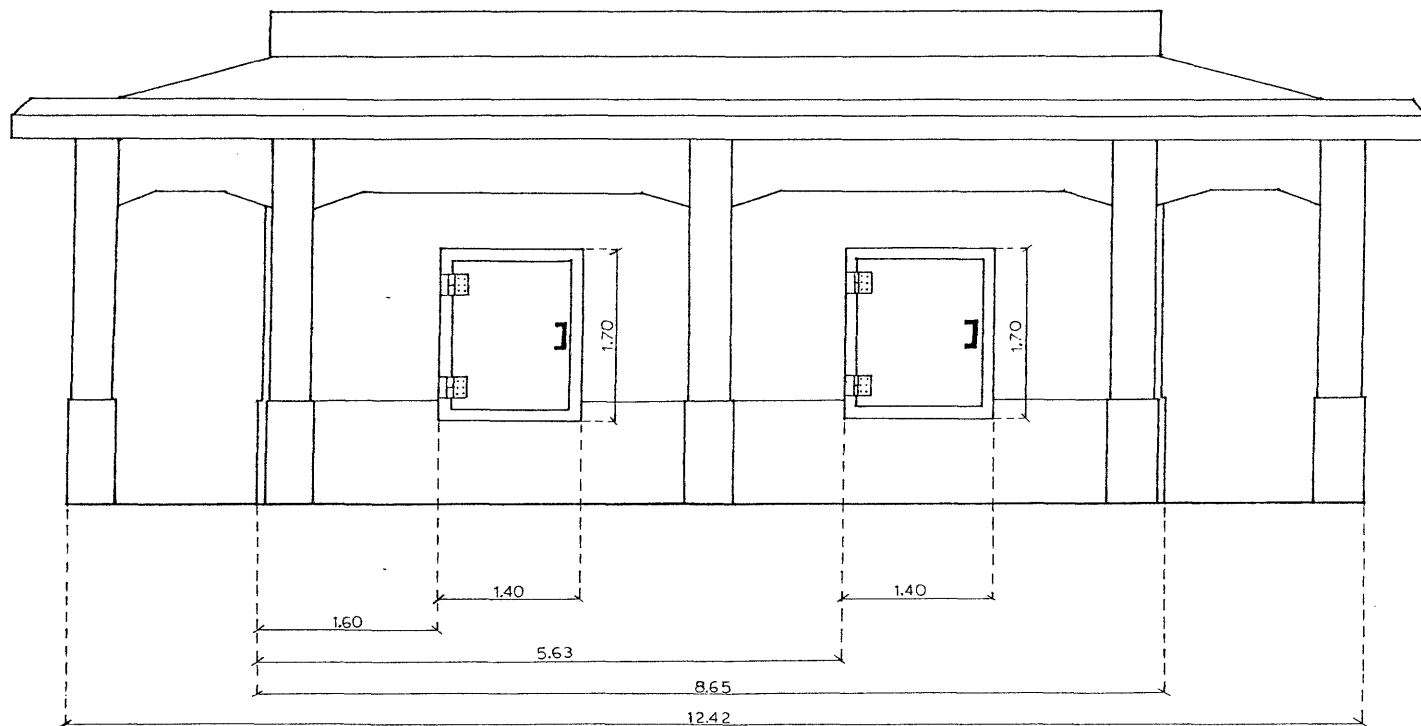

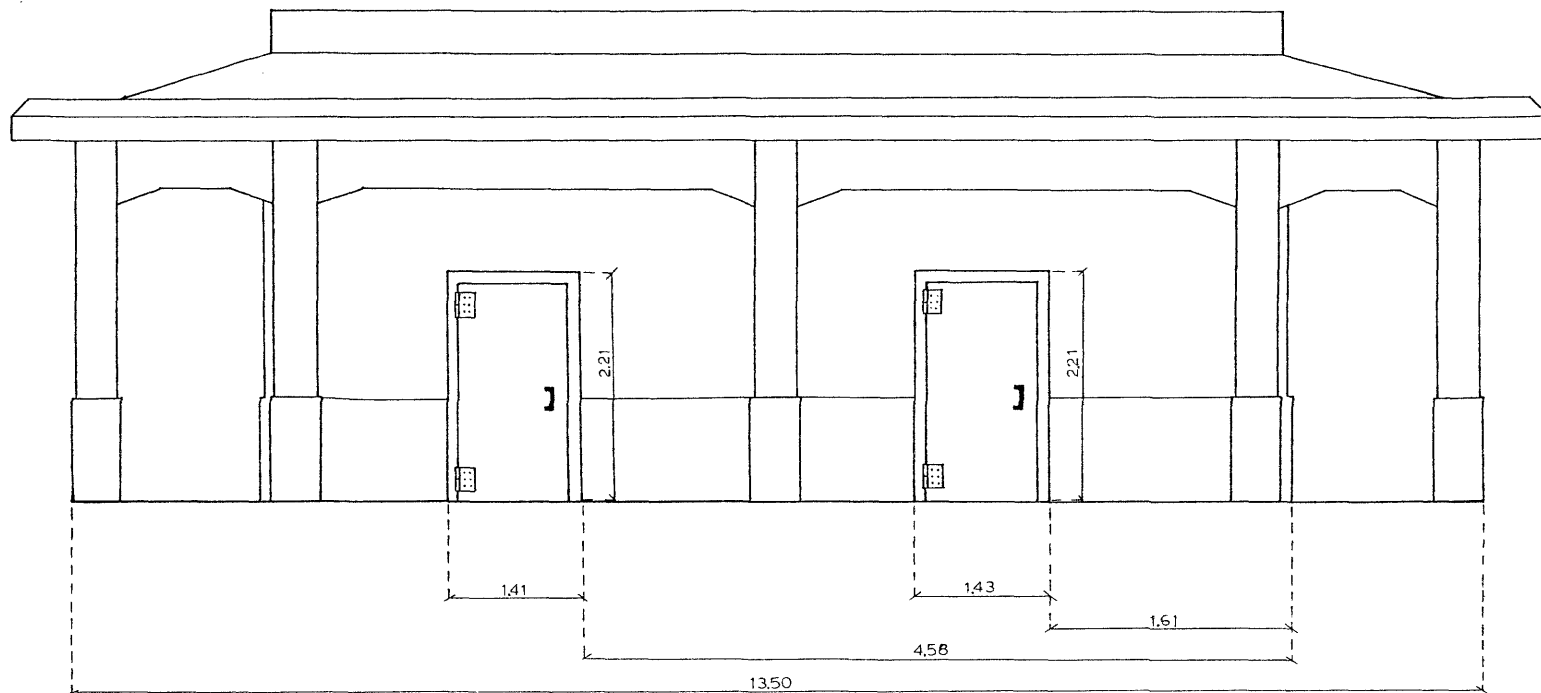

 (South Elevation)

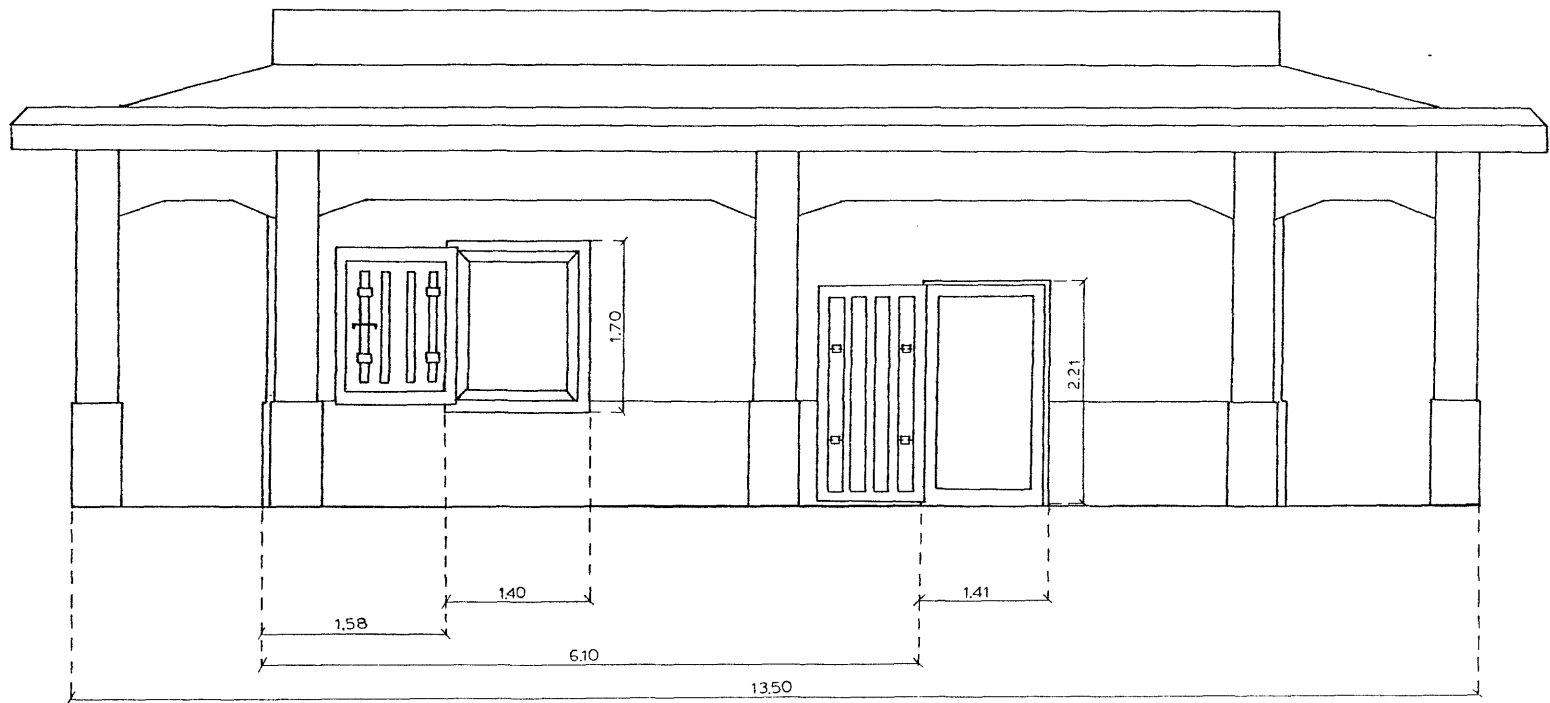

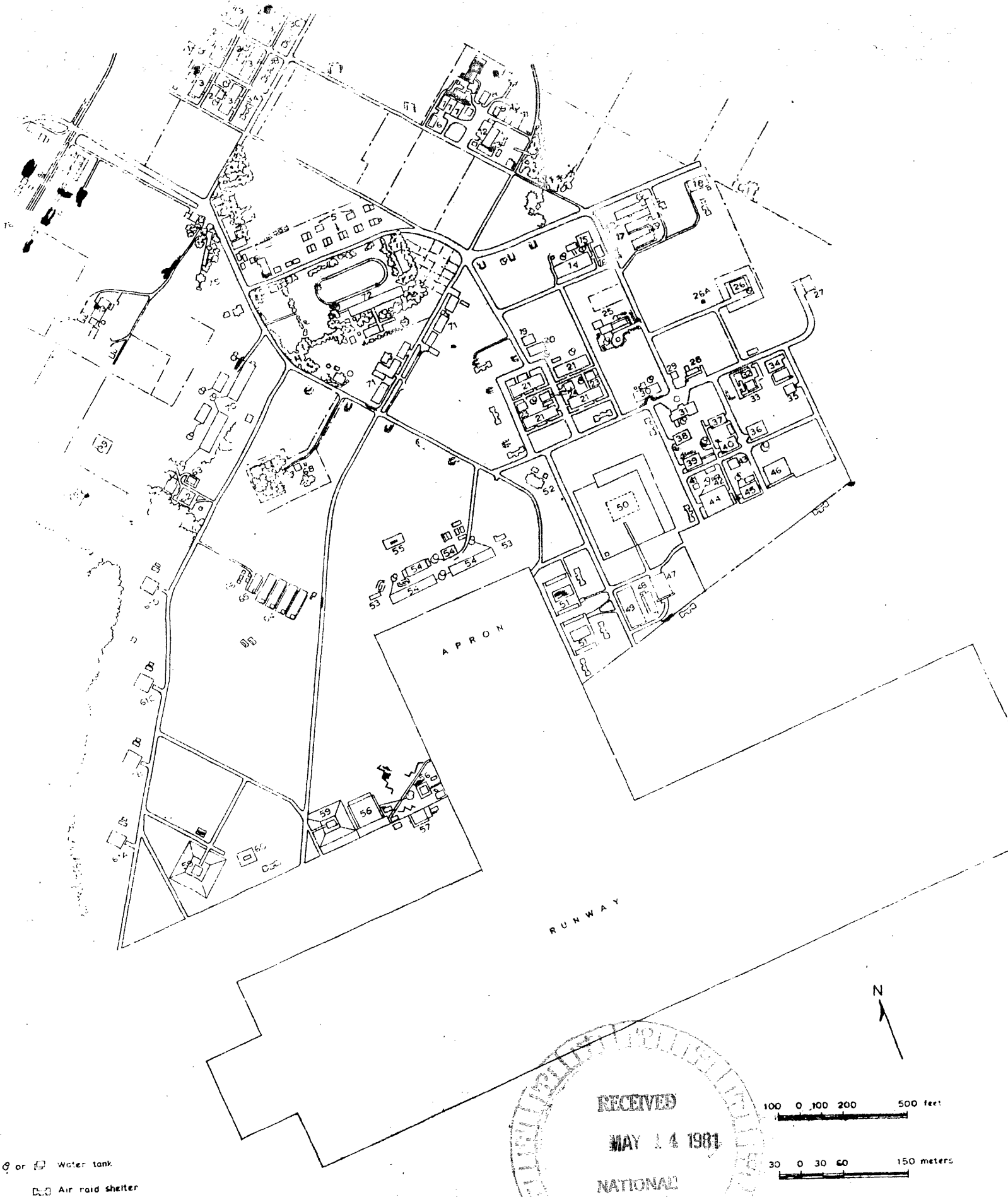
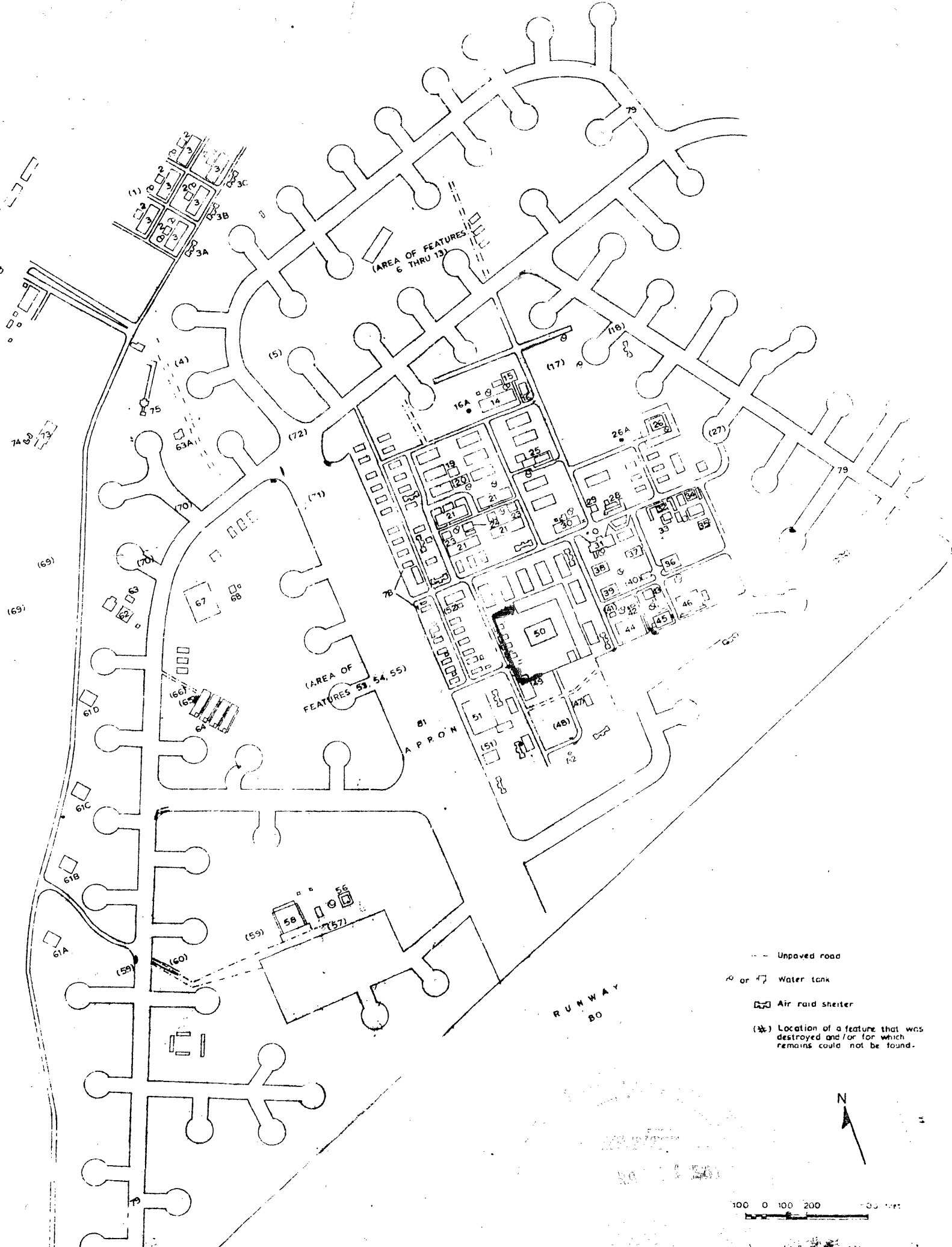


FIGURE 50. ASLITO AIRFIELD, SAIPAN, 1944

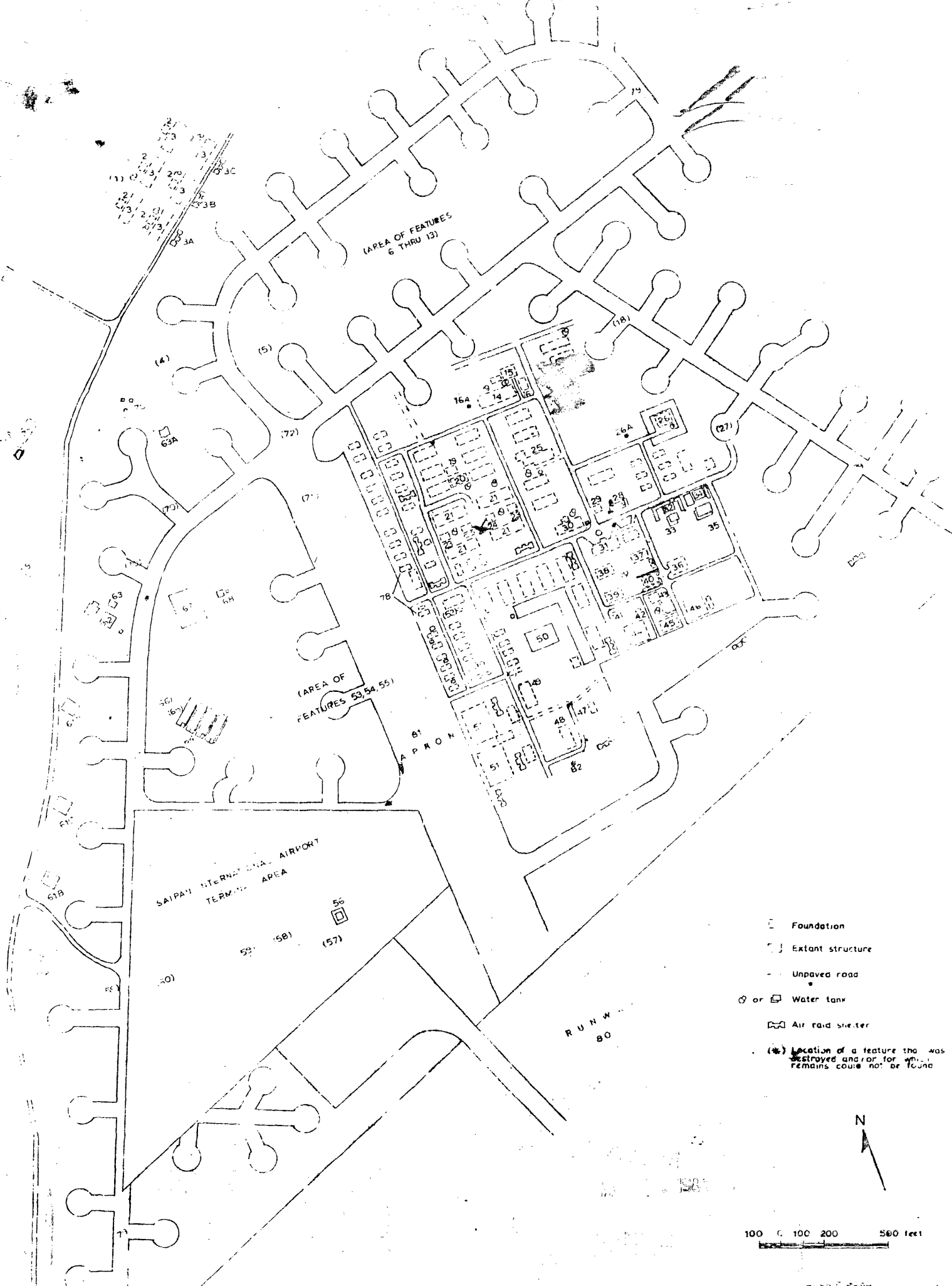
