DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The improvements consist of a cabin, woodshed, fruit room, and two small sheds. Most of these improvements are old. The original portion of the main cabin was reportedly built in 1880. The other sheds are of varying ages. Much of the material used in their construction came from the land while the manufactured items required a long haul to reach the site.

A more detailed description of the improvements follows:

Main cabin - $17\frac{1}{2}$ feet by 31 feet - with two full length porches 8 feet wide on either side. It contains 542 square feet of area in the living quarters and 496 square feet in the porches. The exterior finish is of untreated vertical logs. The original portion of the cabin (about $21\frac{1}{2} \times 20$) was of horizontal logs that have been covered with the vertical material. There is no foundation and the logs rest directly on the ground. Considerable rot is evident in the lower portions of the walls. The roof is covered with cheap roll roofing that is in good condition. Originally there was no floor but in later years a floor of rough fir planking was added. This lowered the head room making the doors of substandard height. The interior consists of two rooms. One is used as living quarters and the other as a storeroom. The living quarters are finished with 4" plywood lining the walls. no ceiling. Cheap linoleum covers the floor in the portion used as a kitchen There is no plumbing but water is run by gravity through a pipeline to an outside tap. There is a crude six volt lighting system. The building has had fair to good maintenance and the effective age is estimated to about 60 years.

Woodshed - 16' x 25', or 400 square feet, pole frame, mostly open sides, roof $\frac{1}{2}$ covered with aluminum, the remainder with wood shakes. It is in fair condition.

Fruit room - $8\frac{1}{2}$ ' x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ' - Rough boards, double walls filled with sawdust for insulation. This room corners on main cabin.

Sheds - 16' x 12' - Pole frame, vertical boards, shake roof - only in fair condition. One small 4' x 4' shed roof covering a small 6 volt generating plant.

The Whisky Creek cabin was constructed around 1880 when men were attempting to mine and inhabit the remote regions of the Rogue River. The cabin is an excellent example of an early miner's cabin; the oldest known cabin still habitable in the Rogue Wild River Area. The cabin and surrounding area remain isolated and inaccessible except by river or trail, much like it was when the miners first inhabited the area. These historic miners' cabins are rare along the river. Flood, fire and vandalism have removed most of the cabins of significance.

The name of the original occupant is unknown. P. H. Rushmore filed the first recorded mining claim on January 5, 1917. He sold the claim to Hansom A. (Cy) Whiteneck on May 7, 1918. Mr. Whiteneck occupied the cabin from 1918 to 1954. From 1954 to 1972, Lou Martin lived in the cabin as caretaker for Mr. & Mrs. L. M. Nichols. The BLM purchased a Quitclaim Deed from Mrs. Nichols on February 27, 1973. Many of the tools and equipment used to sustain the miner's remote lifestyle were protected and still remain in or near the cabin.

This type of structure is of historical interest to the public in general. The cabin was mentioned in Zane Grey's book "Rogue River Feud" and in Mrs. Harriet Wheatley's book "Lady Angler". On March 24, 1973, Portland Channel 12, KPTV telecast the Rogue River Special on the American Adventure Program at 7:00 P.M. The Whisky Creek cabin and the plans to preserve it were an important part of this program.

2. LOCATION

The cabin is located in the SE½NW¼ of Section 34, Township 33 South, Range 8 West, Willamette Meridian, approximately 3 miles by trail downstream from Grave Creek, or approximately 37 river miles below Grants Pass, Oregon. The cabin is located within the boundaries of the Wild Section of Rogue River component of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. The cabin lies about 1000 feet north of the Rogue River. Whisky Creek flows past the cabin and joins the Rogue River at this point.

3. CLASSIFICATION - ACCESSIBLE TO THE PUBLIC

Access is restricted to the public in that the cabin can be reached only by hiking trail or riverboat. Motorized vehicles and horses are not allowed in the Rogue Wild River Area.

7. Description

The original cabin was constructed in 1880. We have not been able to obtain conclusive information about who built and occupied the cabin between 1880 and 1916.

Changes in the original cabin since 1900 are:

- 1) An attached flat roof shed on the southwest end of the cabin was removed and a storage room was added. The roof and porches were then extended to accomadate the storage room.
- 2) A floor of rough fir planking was added in the original cabin and porches. Linoleum now covers the floor in the cabin.
- 3) The posts holding up the porches were replaced.
- 4) The shake roof was replaced with cheap roll roofing.
- 5) Additional outbuildings such as a fruit room and shower room have been constructed near the cabin.
- 6) The original cabin has been finished inside with $\frac{1}{4}$ inch plywood.

8. Significance

In his book, Rogue River Feud, published in 1930, Zane Grey described the cabin in these terms: a "one room cabin, most comfortable wilderness quarters, with its rude furniture and trophies of the chase, its wide yellow stone fireplace and neat cupboard and shelves."
