DESCRIPTION:

The O'Neill Brothers Building is a modest one-story brick block built to a nineteen feet, ten inch-by-eighty-foot plan. The facade is largely filled by the storefront, which retains its coffeed window-bases, plate glass windows, and mezzanine lights. The intact bases indicate that the beveled right side entry is original, although the drawins for the front elevation show a centerd entry. Otherwise the storefront and the masonry detail of the upper facade are precisely a designed. A few feet above the mezzanine is an outset string course of stretcher brick; cented on it is a double cross vent. The ends of the string course intersect the large ornamental elements dropped from the corbel table, which is a shallow seris of stepped elements surmounted by bands of end-set bricks and a band of header bricks. The parapet above the corbel is drawn up to a low peak. The whole is finished with a narrow concrete coping.

The exterior is substantially intact except for the replacement of the door, halfboarding of the display windows to protect the glass, and painting over of the mezzanine lights.

SIGNIFICANCE:

The O'Neill Brothers Building in Glenns Ferry is architecturally significant as a well-preserved one-story storefront of a modest but neat and attractive type which Tourtellotte and Hummel designed several times for smaller Idaho main streets--for example, the individually ineligible Alexander's Store in Caldwell--but which is elsewhere unrepresented in the Thematic Group. This building also serves as an example of teh way commissions tended to follow each other in a local community, and of the recycling of plans in such a setting.

Thomas and Garrett O'Neill were proprietors of O'Neill Brothers Drugs. Their neat little building went up next to R. D. Gorby's Tourtellotte and Company-rebuilt commercial bulding, down the street from his theater (site 84), and around the corner from the firm's 1922 McGinnis Building (site 107).
