The United States Custom House fills a large trapezoidal block bounded by Canal, North Peters, Iberville and Decatur Streets. Begun in 1848, its massive, four-story walls were completed and temporarily roofed when construction was interrupted by the Civil War. When work was resumed the design was altered by the elimination of a central dome and the simplification of the roof and cornice which were completed in 1881.

Alexander Thompson Wood was the architect. James Gallier, Sr., in his autobiography, described Wood as a murderer and ex-convict who pirated elements of Gallier's custom house plans submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury in the last months of the Tyler (Whig) administration. Thomas K. Wharton served as resident supervisory architect through much of the 1848-62 period of construction; Major G. T. Beauregard was superintendent of construction.

Architectural drawings published by the Secretary of the Treasury in 1857 correspond exactly to the present appearance of the exterior walls; the Quincy granite is extremely resistant to change. Except for the rounded corner at the acute intersection of Canal and North Peters Streets, the four elevations are similar. Centered in each is a slightly projecting, pedimented pavilion having four, fluted, engaged columns with open papyrus capitals, the only Egyptian element in the design. Near the ends of each facade are pavilions of minimal projection having flat pilasters and no pediment. The columns or pilasters of the pavilions rest on the smooth rusticated base which constitutes the ground story. There, semi-circular arched niches ornament the pavilions and the original decorative metal gates screen the cart ways. The continuous cast iron cornice has wide-spaced triglyphs below a band of dentils.

The General Business Room or "Marble Hall" is the most important interior space. Its central skylighted portion is defined by 14 Corinthian columns supporting a full entablature. Alternate column capitals are ornamented with heads of Mercury and Luna. Bas reliefs by A. Defrasse depict a pelican feeding her young, Bienville, and Jackson. Counterwork dates from extensive interior remodelling in 1915. At that time the principal stair from the Canal Street entrance to the Marble Hall was completely rebuilt. Although many of the interior spaces have been rearranged, some of the major offices still contain original or early cabinets and furniture. The General Services Administration is planning extensive restoration of the interiors, more appropriate lighting, and adaptation of the unfinished attic spaces to modern office use.

Of strategic importance in American history, the port of New Orleans links our greatest river system to overseas markets. In such a setting a customs house is a building of major prominence. When new, the New Orleans Custom House was, among Federal buildings, considered second only to the United States Capitol in size. It occupies the site of an 1819 custom house designed by Benjamin Buisson to replace Benjamin H. Latrobe's custom house of 1807. A late 18th-century Spanish custom house occupied a site across Iberville Street.

Excellence of design and construction is especially evident in that unstable soil, high humidity, occasional hurricanes, and periods of lax maintenance have left the Custom House exterior unmarred. The Marble Hall is a Greek Revival interior of notable originality and monumentality.

Henry Clay participated in the cornerstone ceremonies on February 22, 1849.
