DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Barker Dam consists of a structure of cement and stone faced with stone about nine feet high with a later concrete addition three feet high, raising the total height to twelve feet. The dam, including the addition, is about 150 feet long. Its design is rather odd, incorporating several indentations. Above the dam is a low wall of dry stone probably intended to keep livestock out of the deeper part of the tank formed behind the dam. ("Tank" is a rural western term for reservoir.)

Below the dam is a crude pond fed by a pipe from the reservoir. The pond consists of two low circular walls of concentric design. The pipe apparently fed water into the center circle for human consumption, and it overflowed into the outer circle for consumption by stock in the canyon below the dam.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Barker Dam is of local historical significance under the category of agriculture. The dam is typical of such structures erected by cattlemen in arid desert regions to impound run-off rainwater from infrequent desert cloudbursts in an artificial "tank" or reservoir in order to provide water for their stock. This particular dam created a sizeable "tank" which served a number of cattlemen over the years. In less rocky terrain, earthwork dams were more common, but the rocky, boulder-strewn high desert topography in what is now Joshua Tree National Monument together with the character of its arroyos apparently encouraged construction of dams employing cement and local rock rather than earth.

The above statement of significance is based upon the following historical data:

A local cattleman named C.O. Barker constructed a nine-foot high cement dam faced with native stone in 1900. Construction required sixteen eight-day-long trips to haul the cement, wooden forms, mixing equipment and other material from Banning to the site of the dam. When completed, the dam impounded run-off rainwater from desert storms to form a reservoir where cattle could obtain water. Subsequent to 1917, at an unknown date, another local cattleman named William F. Keys obtained ownership of the dam, and using concrete, he raised its height from nine to twelve feet in order to increase the amount of water the dame was capable of impounding. The dam, still serviceable, provided water for stock as long as cattle were run within its vicinity.
