Dear Mr. Director:

The following is my report on operations and conditions in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks for the month of June, 1930. This report has been considerably delayed; first, by the visit of the governors' party and dedication of the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, and then by some other events which have kept me busy since.

000 General. The month of June has been very satisfactory from both the travel and weather standpoint. Although the mean temperature was slightly above normal, the total rainfall was far in excess of the usual amount, and this balanced things up rather nicely. Due to rains occurring at very favorable times, I have never seen the country so green and fresh-looking at this time of the year as it is at present.

100 Administrative.

110 Status of work. With the possible exception of some office work, all work is up to date. During the greater part of the month we were trying desparately to get our river protection job completed before the 1st of the month, when the appropriation would expire. We were, therefore, working two shifts each day attempting to complete this work, and succeeded in doing so on June 25. However, this put a very heavy burden on our office force.

120 Park inspections by

121 Superintendent. During the period from June 1 to June 6, I was in the Park, being engaged mainly in office work. On the 7th I drove to Cedar City and return, and June 8 and 9 I spent with Mr. Vint and Mr. Langley on park landscape problems. On the 10th and 11th I went over the same problems with these men at Bryce Canyon, returning to Zion on the 12th. The 13th and 14th were spent in Zion in the office and in inspections of the valley area. On the 15th I left for Salt Lake City, where I met with the committee arranging the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway dedication. On the 16th, and returned to the park on the 17th.

On the 18th and 19th, I was in the park, and the 20th I made a trip to St. George to arrange for music for the dedication program, and in the evening drove to Bryce Canyon. On the 21st, 22nd, and 23rd I made a pack trip through the proposed Bryce Canyon extension area. Drove to Zion on the 24th via Cedar City. From the 26th to the end of the month, I remained in Zion Park.

123 National Park Service officers. Chief Landscape Architect T. C. Vint was in Zion on June 8 and 9, and Bryce Canyon June 10 and 11.

127 Other agencies. On June 1 the Utah Public Utilities Commission, consisting of Mr. McKay, Mr. McGonagle, and Judge Corfman, were in the park making a study of transportation.

140 Labor situation. At one time during the month we had 131 men on the payroll and found it rather hard at times to keep our forces full up. However, closing down of the river protection job on June 25 has reduced our force to almost nothing again and men are plentiful at the present time.

150 Equipment and supplies. The following equipment were received during the month: one Chevrolet Sedan, one 2,000 pound air hoist, and miscellaneous small equipment consisting of Fresno scrapers and hand hoists.

180 Publicity bulletins. One publicity bulletin was issued during the month and the first 1930 copy of Zion-Bryce Nature Notes.

200 Maintenance, Improvements and New Construction.

220 Improvements. Considerable work was done in improving the attic at the chief clerk's residence. The space was partitioned off and two bedrooms provided which will make the house comfortable for the average family.

230 New construction. The superintendent's residence was finished on June 29 and I doubt if there is a finer building than this anywhere in the Park Service. It is built entirely of native stone, has two downstairs and two upstairs bedrooms, two bathrooms, a kitchen, a living room, a dining room and a good sized basement equipped with a modern hot-air furnace for heating the house.

The main project has been the river protection job, which was being carried on under a deficiency appropriation. By changing our quarry site and nearly doubling our force, continuing our 16 hour day, we were able to complete all of this work on June 25. This has been the major construction job in the park as far as we are concerned. Every other job was side-tracked to make way for it.

Early in the month a crew was sent over to Bryce Canyon and work was started on a stairway to connect the foot trails in the canyon with the rim. Plans were also made for building a new horseback trail in the canyon and for building the barn and warehouse allowed in the 1931 appropriation. We will have very little difficulty in finishing all our work at Bryce this year.

The only work in progress on the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway was on the Pine Creek and Virgin River bridges. The Virgin River Bridge is now completed and the barrel of the Pine Creek arch was also completed by the end of the month and it now appears possible that the governors will be able to cross over this bridge on July 4.

240 Improvement of approaches to park. The contractor is making rapid progress on the State project between Toquerville and La Verkin and it is reported, is getting ahead rapidly on the Three Lakes project near Kanab. In preparation for the visit of the governors the state of Utah has oiled practically all of the approach roads into Zion Park. The work of putting a process surface on the road between Toquerville and the Ash Creek Bridge, about twenty miles south of Cedar City, was completed on the 19th.

260 Landscape work. Mr. Harry Langley, Assistant Landscape Architect, has been in these parks the entire month supervising landscape work. He has also given very close attention to work on the interior of the superintendent's residence, and to him must go the major share of the credit for the very fine work which has been done on this building.

In order to carry on the river protection job to the best advantage it was necessary for us to open up a quarry site against the advice of the landscape division. The needs in the case were so urgent, and time was so valuable, that it was not possible to refer this difference of opinion to your office for arbitration. Action was therefore taken and then a report made to you.

300 Activities of other agencies in the park.

310 Public service contractors. The entire system of the Utah Parks Company, including lodges and transportation, was put into full operation on June 1 and they have rendered their usually high class service to the public since.

314 Complaints. No complaints have been received except that we are being quite severely criticized for the condition of our public auto camp. The situation which is bringing most of this about is a very bad fly condition which has existed practically the entire month. I have never seen flies as bad as they have been. We are making every effort to reduce this nuisance and do away with some of the complaints which have been made as the result of it.

380 Cooperating governmental agencies. On June 8 Mr. R. T. Evans, of the U. S. Geological Survey, arrived from Washington to continue his work of making a topographic map of Zion National Park. He informs me that much of this job will be done by airplane photography.

400 Flora, fauna, and natural phenomena.

410 Ranger, naturalist, and guide service. The rangers have been busy mostly on checking and traffic duty. Due to the charge on the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway we were forced to maintain a checker at the east park boundary. This leaves us no one for patrol duty of any kind in the park. We started checking at Bryce Canyon on June 19 and this station also requires practically the full time of two rangers, leaving no one for general patrol and police duty.

One ranger-naturalist was on duty at Bryce Canyon during the month. Mr. Woodbury, Park Naturalist, arrived at Zion on June 6, and Ranger-Naturalist Thornton on June 13. Ranger Russell was assigned to educational work on June 22. During the month a total of 36 field trips were conducted with an attendance of 1,050; 70 lectures were delivered to 3,918 people; and 1,780 people visited the park museum, making a total of 6,878 educational contacts during the month. At Bryce a total of 34 field trips were conducted with an attendance of 596; 30 lectures were delivered to 2,369 people, making a total of 2,965 educational contacts during the month.

500 Use of Park Facilities by the Public.

510 Increase in travel. During the month a total of 9,107 people entered the park. Of this number 8,232 entered in 2,680 automobiles, 2 via other private transportation, 866 by stage, and 5 by miscellaneous means. Compared to the same month last year this is an increase of 2,132, or 31 per cent. Rail travel showed a decrease of 35 per cent. At Bryce Canyon National Park a total of 8,573 were registered, of which 7,873 arrived in 2,610 automobiles. The season total for Zion to date is 23,123, compared with 13,464 last year--an increase of 71 per cent. No comparative figures are available for Bryce Canyon, although the season total to date is 11,357.

Cars have been registered from every state in the Union, District of Columbia, Territory of Hawaii, and ten foreign countries. It is also noticed that travel for states other than Utah has increased 44 per cent, to date.

520. General weather conditions. The past month showed a mean temperature of 77.5 degrees, which is 1.6 degrees above normal. The total precipitation was 0.63 inches, compared with a normal of 0.19 inches. This is the greatest amount of rainfall to occur in this section, with but two exceptions since 1904, during the month of June. The mean maximum temperature was 93 degrees and the mean minimum 62 degrees. The highest was 105 degrees on the 30th and the lowest 46 degrees on the 1st.

There were 23 clear, 3 partly cloudy, and 4 cloudy days.

540 Visitors. The following distinguished people visited the park during the month. On June 1 Mr. McKay, Mr. McGonagle, and Judge Corfman of the Utah Public Utilities Commission; also Mr. Head, General Manager, Railway Express Agency, at San Francisco. On June 7 Mr. L. M. Huggins, District Bridge Engineer of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads. On June 9 Mr. V. K. Chestnut, a friend of Director Albright's was in the park. On June 9 Chief Landscape Architect T. G. Vint and Mrs. Vint. On June 18 Mr. Stephen Johnson and family of New York arrived. This was Mr. Johnson's eighth visit to the park, his first having been in 1910. I believe he holds all long distance travel records for efforts in reaching Zion Canyon, and is only rivaled by Mrs. E. C. Finney, Mrs. Scoyen's mother, who arrived on the 27th for her sixth visit. On June 26 H. I. Solomon, of San Francisco, a friend of Director Albright's.

550 Public Camps. Every effort has been made to keep the public auto camps at both Zion and Bryce in good condition. However, the flies at Zion have been the cause of much complaint and the lack of equipment at Bryce has also caused us some trouble. However the great majority of visitors are very much pleased with our camp ground service.

600 Protection.

610 Police protection. No arrests were made by the ranger force during the month. However two brothers, Charles and Elmer Higley were apprehended by a special agent of the Union Pacific for stealing a watch at Zion Lodge. They confessed to the theft, returned the goods, and were allowed to go with a severe reprimand. On Tuesday night, June 17 a car owned by tourists who were camping on the North Rim of the Grand Canyon, was broken into and robbed of several valuable articles. A Union Pacific special agent and a deputy sheriff went to work on the case, and on the 18th the guilty parties were arrested in Zion Park, which was due the great part to information given by Ranger Schiefer.

During the month we have had considerable trouble with people stealing gas from Government cars. We also had one case of malicious mischief during which someone wrecked one of our air compressors. They filled the radiator with sand, the gas tank with dirt, and did so much other damage that this piece of equipment has been in the shop for a complete overhaul. No clue to these people has been uncovered to date.

620 Fire protection. On June 9 at 6:30 P.M. a fire was reported in Bryce Canyon Park about three-fourths of a mile west of the Lodge. After burning about an acre it was brought under control and finally put out. About 140 Yellow Pine trees were apparently destroyed.

630 Accidents. On June 6 a Ford touring car driven by F. A. McNally of the Union Pacific was forced off the road by a truck, and turned over without injury to Mr. McNally and very little damage to the car. It appears that the truck was on the wrong side of the road and the car was traveling at an excessive rate of speed. Mr. Ray Higley, of California, was injured, but not seriously, in an accident on June 24.


On June 23 the car driven by Mr. David Dennett was wrecked on a curve about two miles below Rockville, and Mr. Dennett and his one passenger, Mr. William Regland, were instantly killed. Although the accident occurred outside the park, it is of some interest to the Service as Mr. Dennett is a well known early pioneer guide in Zion National Park and was a very good friend of our former Director Mather.

900 Miscellaneous.

On June 24 the Western Air Express plane which was lost here January 10, Maury Graham, Pilot, was found wrecked on Cedar Mountain, about 20 miles north of Zion National Park. It appears possible that Graham may have wandered down into the park after the wreck, but no trace of him has yet been found.
