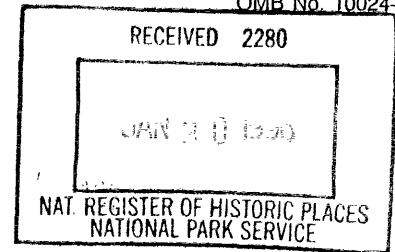

7 - Description

Located on West Main Street in the downtown area of Mound Bayou, the Mound Bayou Bank building is a two-storey, brick, commercial building with a chamfered corner containing the main entrance. The building features segmented arches above the upper windows and a decorative corbelled cornice at the parapeted roofline. A non-historical, one-storey, concrete block addition is located to the south of the building.

The eastern facade features original, metal pilasters that separate the three bays of the first storey (d, w-w, w-w). The door is a modern, wooden, flush door with a small, round, glazed portal and is topped by a transom. Windows are paired and filled with modern, metal, two-over-two, double-hung sash. Transoms above the windows have been infilled with plywood. The entrance to the first storey is located at the chamfered corner on the northeast side. The door at this entrance is glazed and is surmounted by an infilled transom and flanked by three-light sidelights, some of which have been infilled.

The upper storey retains its original wooden, one-over-one, double-hung sash windows. The eastern, southern, and northern elevations each have three windows, while the chamfered elevation has paired windows.

The first storey of the Bank retains its open space, with flush-board walls, ceilings, and floors. The second storey is accessed by the doorway on the eastern elevation, and the space is subdivided into two major areas. The upper storey is finished similarly to the first with flush-board walls, ceilings, and floors.

Although the Mound Bayou Bank building has undergone some changes in recent years, it retains a degree of historic integrity through retention of the original placement of doors and windows, as well as the retention of the original floor plan of the first storey. The Bank stands as the only historic, commercial building from the early settlement period of Mound Bayou.

8 - Statement of Significance

The Mound Bayou Bank building is locally significant for its role in Commerce and African-American history under Criterion A. The period of significance is from the establishment of the Mound Bayou Bank in 1904 to 1914 when the stock in the bank was dissolved. It stands as the only historic, commercial building testifying to an active, independent community of African Americans in the Mississippi Delta during the early twentieth century.

In 1887, under the leadership of I.T. Montgomery and B.T. Green, approximately twenty former slaves purchased land from the Louisville, New Orleans & Texas Railway Company to establish a community composed solely of African Americans. This attempt of self-determined segregation was one of the many solutions tried in the South to find a place in society for the millions of newly freed slaves. The early settlers of Mound Bayou built homes and became successful cotton farmers on the recently cleared land in the Delta. Soon, businesses owned and run by African Americans for African Americans were established to provide the inhabitants with needed consumer goods and services. The Mound Bayou Bank was established by Charles Banks and John Francis for the fiscal needs of the people of Mound Bayou in 1904 with a capital investment of \$10,000.

The bank prospered, as did the community, through the early years of the century. The Mound Bayou Oil Mill and Manufacturing Company, the largest cotton oil mill in the state, was completed in 1907 through investments from the leaders of the Mound Bayou Bank. New settlers continued to come to Mound Bayou to enjoy the high level of independence and success not always found in Southern African American communities. Cotton prices continued to rise and the citizens of Mound Bayou enjoyed both financial and social success. Booker T. Washington stated that Mound Bayou was a model of independence for the Negro in the South. The town was indeed a beacon of hope to the millions of African Americans who sought a life without daily reminders of Jim Crow in the South.

Unfortunately, this prosperity was not to last. In 1914, after a decline in cotton prices, failed financial undertakings, and the interference of outsiders, the State Banking Commission closed the Mound Bayou Bank. The oil mill was sold to white investors who squandered the assets. During these years, many farmers lost their land and joined the great migration to Chicago and other northern cities. Disaster continued to plague the town and fires in 1926 and 1941 destroyed the majority of commercial structures in the town.

Today, the Mound Bayou Bank building is the only commercial building remaining which suggests the prosperity the thriving community experienced in the early years of the twentieth century. After the bank was closed, the building continued to serve the community in various roles, including the post office, a credit union, a cafe, and a residence. Alterations have been made in such a way that they have not irreversibly changed the historical integrity of the building. The Mound Bayou Bank building stands as a symbol of the courage and entrepreneurship exhibited by hundreds of Mississippi African Americans in the years following the Civil War.

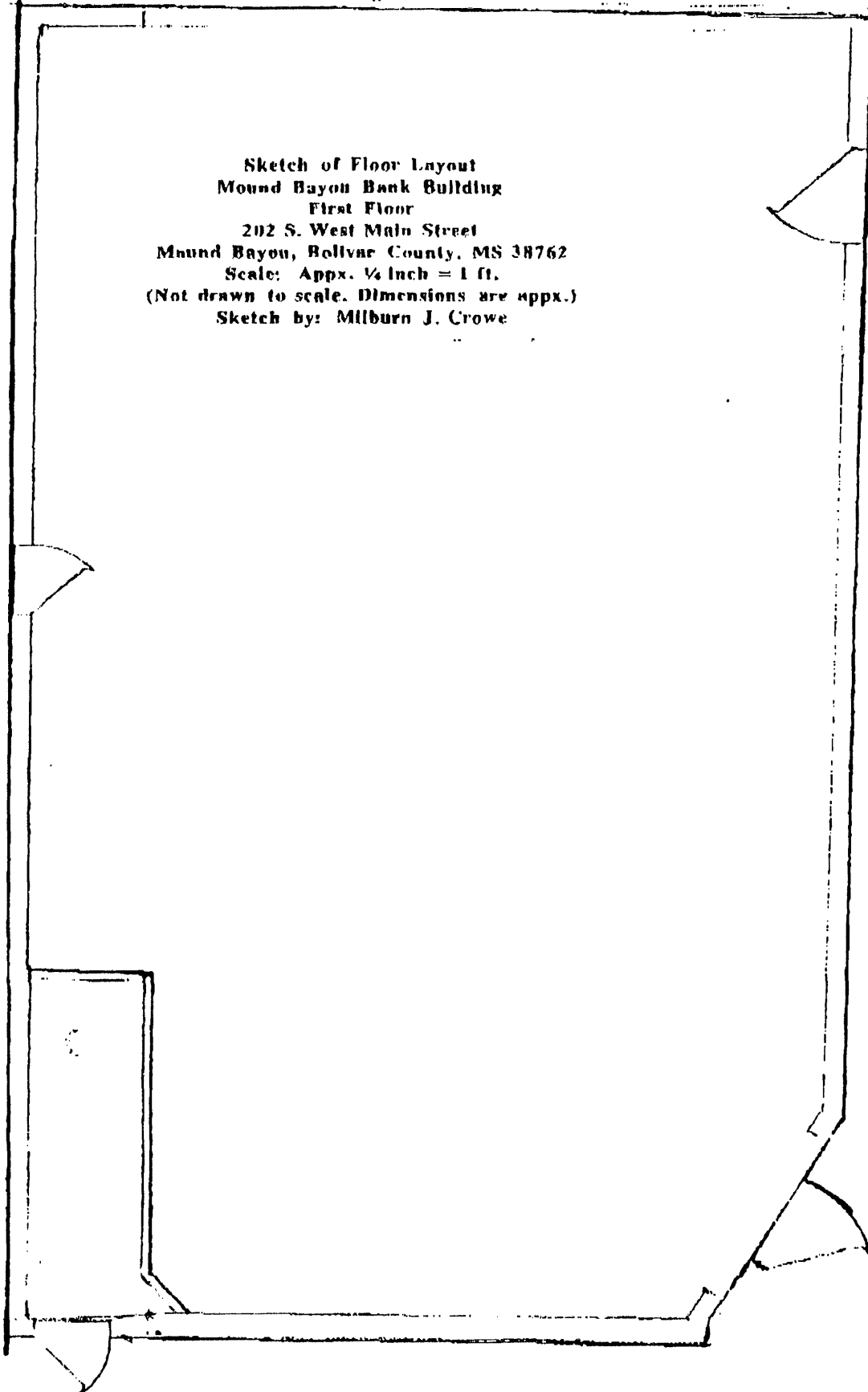
Verbal Boundary Description
