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The Captain David Judson House is a substantial early 18th century house with many interesting features. The front entry with broken scroll pediment is what gives the property its architectural significance. It is probably the earliest house in Connecticut with this classical treatment.

J. Frederick Kelly, pioneer restoration architect in Connecticut, writes of the "bullseye" glass, small panes thickened at the center, which are the transom lights in the door. Arranged in a horizontal row, the four lights are separated by heavy moulded muntins. "Each pane measures  $7\frac{1}{4}$  inches wide by  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches high, and is about one inch thick at the center. The use of the glass in the door itself, after this fashion, is decidedly unusual."

The windows have caps or headings which are flat pediments with moulding; at second floor these are more modest and extend nearly to the box cornice at eaves line. Sash is 6/6 - a replacement of earlier, smaller sash.

The overhang at gable ends is an early feature. On the east end, the original hand-split shingles reputedly remain. The deep stone foundation at west end is thought to be a remain from David Judson's great-grandfather's house (William Judson), built in 1639. (In fact, Kelly's reference is to the William Judson, rather than David Judson, House.)

There are later additions, not unharmonious with the character of the house. To the southwest side is the Historical Society's museum, built in 1958, containing the library, exhibits, and storage area, as well as space for small group meetings. The setting is attractive as the house is set well back from the road and has appropriate buildings near-by.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Captain David Judson House is located on what was first called Watch House Hill, later Meeting House Hill, and now called Academy Hill. It is said to have been built in 1723 by Captain David Judson, possibly on the foundation of the house built by his great-grand-father, William Judson, in 1639. Captain Judson was a prominent man in the area; he served as auditor of the Connecticut Colony records and as deputy to the General Assembly.

It was probably Thomas Salmon who built the house for Judson. Salmon came from England in 1717 and is thought to have designed the Second Episcopal Church in Stratford, completed in 1743. An engraving of the church shows a striking similarity between its doorway and that of the Judson House. The broken scroll pediment is the earliest example of what is now known as the "Connecticut River Valley doorway". It is primarily this that makes the house of such great architectural interest.

Now owned by the Stratford Historical Society and open as a museum, it is the only 18th century house open to the public in the greater Bridgeport area and is visited by hundreds of school children and adults each year.
