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

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			


Background information regarding this building is of historical importance. It was originally constructed in 1894 and used as a schoolhouse. Twenty-seven years later, from 1921 to 1928 Dr. R. R. Parker and his staff from the Montana State Board of Entomology and the U. S. Public Health Service occupied this old building about one mile west of Hamilton, Montana. This group engaged in the study and control of spotted fever, a serious and often fatal disease prevalent in Montana and about 10 other Western States. While at this laboratory, the Spencer-Parker vaccine for spotted fever was developed and other important studies on ticks and tick-borne diseases were started (tick-borne tularemia, tick paralysis).

Before vaccine was available, about 400 cases of spotted fever had occurred in the Bitterroot Valley and over 250 of these were fatal. After vaccine came into use only one death was recorded in the Valley in persons who had taken the vaccine, and this was a professional laboratory worker. Similar results from the vaccine were experienced elsewhere in the Rocky Mountain region. Before a vaccine was developed there were six cases of spotted fever in research workers in Montana laboratories and others; all were fatal. Since vaccine became available there have been over 30 cases in laboratory workers with only one death recorded. The work done at this laboratory was a significant part of the medical history of the West.

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The work at Hamilton, Montana, has been the basis of a book "Fighting Spotted Fever in the Rockies" by Eleanor Gaskins Price (1947), for a movie, "Green Light", and for numerous articles in magazines and newspapers.

In 1928, the laboratory work was moved from the Canyon Creek site to a new building on the edge of Hamilton. The laboratory has grown from one building to a complex of many units with a physical plant value of approximately \$3,000,000 value. It has a staff of over 160 workers. It enjoys a world wide reputation for work on arthropod borne diseases, virus studies and other medical research.

For many years tourists were taken through the laboratory even to rooms where work was in progress. Now tourists are limited to the library and a small museum room and are not encouraged. Professional visitors are received for brief or extended visits.


The restriction on visitors was not a lack of hospitality, but was made because of the danger of infection from some of the diseases being studied including typhus, Q fever and tularemia.

For this reason it appeared desirable to have a public museum where history and work of the laboratory could be exhibited. The Canyon Creek Laboratory seemed most appropriate for this purpose.

The building was acquired in 1966, and the first year was spent in cleaning up the building and grounds. Displays and pictures were borrowed from the Laboratory and from other sources and installed.

The museum has been open to the public for three summers, 1967, 1968, and 1969. No admission has been charged. No "tourist material" has been on sale.


