Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Janecek house and outbuildings are situated on an entire city block in southeast Schuyler (1970 pop. 3,600). The house is a simplified two and one half story vernacular Queen Anne product which has its basic rectangular shape broken by two, two-story bay windows. Constructed of frame in 1885-86, the house was stuccoed in 1927. At this time, the Eastlake porches were enclosed. Decorative features include the imbricated gables and a small third story porch situated atop the north bay.

The interior of the house features basically a four over four room plan with the remaining space taken up by the front and back stairwells. An operable dumbwaiter is located between the kitchen and the second floor hallway. Two marbelized slate fireplaces enhance the decor of the house.

The exterior of the house will be preserved in its present 1927 state, while the interior is being meticulously restored by the owners to the mid-1880's period with the exception of tasteful modernizations in the kitchen and bathrooms.

The grounds surrounding the Janecek House provide space for a garage, chicken house and woodshed. The garage was constructed in the early 20th century, however the chicken house and woodshed appear to be of an earlier period. All of the structures were stuccoed in 1927 to match the house. Also found on the grounds are a stone fountain and birdbath, concrete benches and pillars, and pathways which lead to various sections of the garden.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The John Janecek house is significant locally in the areas of architecture and social-humanitarianism.

John Janecek was born in Bohemia in 1851. He immigrated to the United States in 1870 and settled in Colfax County, Nebraska in 1873. Janecek pursued a farming career for a short time and later opened a saloon in Schuyler. He was best known in Schuyler as the builder and proprietor of the Janecek Opera House which became the hub of social activity in the county between 1895 and 1930. Much of Schuyler's entertainment took place in the opera house and besides the locally produced plays, traveling road shows and movies which were booked, the house was the location of wedding dances, high school graduations, and other community functions. The Janecek family sold the opera house in 1920 and the building was razed in 1963. John Janecek died unexpectedly in 1895 soon after the completion of the Opera house. His son Jaroslav (Jerry) took over his late father's business affairs and also resided in the Janecek house until his death in 1956.

In the area of social-humanitarianism, the Janecek house is significant because of its association with John and Jerry Janecek. The Janecek Opera House provided Schuyler and Colfax County with a place for the social interaction so representative of small town living.

Architecturally, the Janecek house stands as a locally significant example of one of the last remaining Victorian homes (and the best preserved) in Schuyler. Schuyler's residential architecture is presently primarily 20th century bungalows and ranch-style house types. Constructed during Nebraska's building boom years of the 1880's, this house displays Queen Anne features so popular in this state during that era. Adding to its architectural significance is the fact that it was designed by one of Nebraska's finest architects, German-born Henry Voss. Voss studied in Germany and Switzerland before coming to Omaha, Nebraska in 1872. He enjoyed a very successful architectural career which included the designing of many commercial structures in Omaha - among those being the Metz and Storz Brewing Companies' buildings and the Anheuser-Busch Beer Depot (NRHP--Douglas County).
