Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Norman is by far the more elaborate of the two apartment buildings Drake University built west of the campus at 31st Street and University Avenue. The three-story rectangular brick building features two shades of tan brick and considerable Gothic Revival limestone trim. Period ornamentation includes stone quoins around windows, Tudor arched entry, medieval lettering of "The Norman" on plaque between second and third stories, shields with fleur de lis flanking the plaque, diamond pattern panes in windows above entry, ogee arches on some windows, and stone detail at the slightly projecting entry with recessed archway. The latter stone detail has carved female faces and piscatorial These elaborate Gothic Revival details combine with gargovles. yet more decorative elements to produce a rich and active surface. Note the darker brown base that anchors the building, the full-height three-part bays, angled stone course above the first floor windows. Also diapering and other brick patterns, an attractive centered parapet with moulded stone and carved finial and a plaque with "1908" incised upon it. State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The property relates to Drake University's growth and development and the effect its financial policies had on nearby settlement. It is significant under Criterion A: properties related to the financial development of Drake University, 1881-1913. Significance relates to themes discussed in the Context section of the Multiple Property Documentation Form, "The Successful Beginnings of Drake University," especially sections entitled Collegiate Financing and Drake University as Developer.

Based on the cornerstone and contemporary newspaper accounts, the Norman was built in 1908. Drake University officials announced an ambitious plan to build five three-story apartment buildings that would house sixty families. All would be under the control of the Drake Board of Trustees. Norman Haskins, long a Drake supporter, donated the land. The Trustees considered the project "a business investment...and the endowment funds of the University are to be used in the building." The Trustees felt "that the money so invested would bring greater returns than if the money were deposited in a bank."

The Norman was the first to be completed under these ambitious plans. Its neighbor, the more modest McCoy apartments, was the second and only other apartment the Trustees built for Drake University.

Proudfoot & Bird, the most prolific and active architectural firm in the state, was selected to design the Norman. The firm also designed the Carnegie Library on the Drake campus during this period, as well as all the major buildings on the state university campuses at Ames and Iowa City and important buildings at Simpson College in nearby Indianola.
