Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Science Hall is significant because it is the oldest remaining building on the campus of Northwestern Oklahoma State University and because it is the design of Solomon Andrew Layton, one of Oklahoma's foremost architects.

Northwestern Oklahoma State University is the second oldest institution of higher learning established by the Oklahoma territorial legislature. Established in 1897 as a normal school, it expanded twenty-five years later to a four year college offering bachelor degrees in science and liberal arts and a master's degree in teaching.

The Science Hall was the second building on the campus. The cornerstone was set in December 1906 and the building was completed during the following year. It contained a library, a gymnasium, and a lecture hall with a capacity of three hundred students. Another feature highlighted in the school catalog was the absence of any interior heating plant that might cause a fire; the building was heated from a separate facility (built in 1908).

It is an excellent example of Jacobethan Revival architecture. This was a popular style for educational buildings in Oklahoma around the turn of the century.

Solomon Andrew Layton, the architect, was destined to become one of the most important and influential architects of Oklahoma's history. From 1902 to 1943 Layton designed more than 100 public, educational, and commercial buildings, including the state capital.

The Science Hall, one of Layton's early works, has served a variety of purposes. Originally, it housed the departments of Agriculture, Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, and Domestic Science. When the administration building (the only structure on campus which pre-dated the Science Hall) burned in the 1930's, it also provided offices for the various school officials and records keeper. Today, the interior has been altered to accommodate numerous small classrooms and academic offices. Although a number of other buildings have been added to the campus, the Science Hall retains a significant role in the university's effort to educate Oklahoma's youth.
