Fairfield house is presently a five-part complex with a two-and-a-half story hipped roof central block having walls of irregular native limestone ashlar throughout. Twentieth-century additions to the complex include the dormers on the central block, the one-story attached dependencies at the farthest ends of the complex, the additions to the rears of the original one-story wings, and the broad screened-in one-story porch on the garden front; the small one-story portico on the entrance front is

a nineteenth-century addition.

The plan of the central block is a striking parallel to that of Kenmore, having the drawing room extended across three of the five bays on the garden front, with two nearly square rooms in the other corners. The stairhall is arranged almost precisely as that of Kenmore, the stairway ascending in the same manner, and having a similar balustrade detail. Fairfield lacks the rich plaster-work decoration of Kenmore, but the surviving woodwork and panelling in the principal rooms is of fine quality. The drawing room chimney-piece features a panelled overmantel flanked by Doric pilasters on pedestals.

Fairfield retains a number of old outbuildings, none of which can be positively dated from the eighteenth century. The most interesting is the large brick, frame and stone barn to the south of the house. A much enlarged and altered early overseer's house stands to the east of the main house. Fairfield's extensive gardens are ornamented with an abundance of fine English boxwood, some of which is believed to have survived from the eighteenth century. The pastoral setting of the entire complex is quite beautiful and unspoiled.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Around 1765 Warner Washington (1715-1791) married Hannah Fairfax, daughter of William Fairfax of Belvoir. Washington, who was a grandson of Lawrence Washington (d. 1697/98) and therefore a first cousin of George Washington, had previously been married to Elizabeth Mason of New Kent County. About the time of Warner Washington's second marriage, he acquired some 1600 acres from his brother-in-law, George William Fairfax, in a part of Frederick County that later became Clarke County. On this tract, called Fairfield, Warner Washington erected the massive stone mansion which probably was completed by 1770. George Washington visited his cousin at Fairfield on numerous occasions, as the General's diaries indicate.

Fairfield has a close architectural kinship to several Tidewater Virginia houses, most notably Kenmore. It has been suggested that the appearance of Fairfield may have been influenced by John Arris, an architect from Westmoreland County who was living in the vicinity of Fairfield at the time it is believed to have been built. Regardless of the design source of Fairfield, it remains one of the largest and most impressive of the interesting group of stone colonial mansions in northern Virginia. Its historic significance is greatly enhanced by its associations with the first President and his family.





On April 19, 1973, Mr. Bob Camble of your office attended a joint meeting held in the office of the Virginia Historic Landmarks
Commission to discuss the proposed highway project on Route 340 in Clarke County north of Berryville and its effect on the Fairfield Farms Mational Register Property. This meeting was also attended by the State Liaison Officer and various representatives from the Virginia Department of Highways, the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission and the Federal Highway Administration.

The advantages and disadvantages of each of the four proposed alternates and the effect of each on Fairfield Farms were discussed in detail. It was generally agreed that Alternate No. Two is the only feasible and prudent alternative. This was the same conclusion as that reached in a March 9, 1973 meeting which was attended by all the parties involved with the exception of the Advisory Council.

Attached is a copy of the agreement developed after the previous meeting which is signed by the representative of each of the involved agencies. It lists each of the actions that would be taken to mitigate the effect on Fairfield Farms should the project be approved for Federal-aid funding. This document was included as pages 12 and 13 of the h(T) Statement which was previously furnished you.

We trust that this agreement will serve as a proposal to mitigate the effect of the proposed project on Fairfield Farms. It would be appreciated if you would propage a Removandum of Agreement based on this proposal and forward it to us for the necessary signatures.

On Friday, March 9, 1973, a meeting was held among the Federal Highway Administration, Virginia Division, Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission, State Liaison Officer, and the Virginia Department of Highways for the purpose of documenting coordination procedures outlined in Appendix A of PPM 90-1. Mr. Jones opened the meeting by outlining for Mr. Kirk the previous meetings that had taken place between the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission and the Virginia Department of Highways regarding the 4(f) property known as Fairfield Farms. After the discussion regarding the previous meetings, the alternatives considered at Fairfield Farms were again discussed at some length. It was the consensus of those present that Alternative No. 2, as described in the 4(f) Statement, is the only feasible and prudent alternative for this project.

It was agreed that the only significant adverse impact upon the Fairfield Property will be visual impact created by the partial elimination of the existing plant material screen between the house and the roadway.

It was also agreed between the Virginia Department of Highways and the Historic Landmarks Commission that the Department of Highways would replace species of plant material similar to those removed in such a way as to provide an adequate screen for the Fairfield Property. This will be accomplished by planting within the right of way. The development of the planting plan will be coordinated with the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission and the owner of Fairfield Farms. This planting will take place as soon as practical after the construction is completed.
