Beginning at point A , proceeding south 336 feet along a fence to B, thence west 190 feet along a treeline to C, thence north 336 feet along a fence to point D, thence east 190 feet along the south side of U.S. 60 to the point of origin. The boundaries were chosen to encompass the house and its domestic-related space as defined by fences, a tree line, and the highway, and which comprise the lot which the house occupies. Included within the boundaries is a contributing frame barn of contemporary date with the house.

Point A is 60 feet east of the eastern edge of the drive at its intersection with U.S. 60.

Two-story hip-roofed frame house of the double-pile side-passage form with highly developed stylistic features derived from Queen Anne period pattern books. Picturesque outline gained by intersecting gables and dormers, round, shingled, projecting stair tower, and ornate one-story porch and porte cochere, as well as a curved secondfloor balcony projecting over the entry bay. The slightly projecting entry hall is flanked on the east by a square parlor with coved plaster ceiling and wood mantel on thick columns. The interior is characterized by earred trim reminiscent of the Greek Revival, and by elaborate spindle friezes over the curved stair, and various internal openings. The stair, which is lit by a stained glass window, has corkscrew balusters. The exterior of the house has a bracketted cornice, panelled highly decorative gables, and a vertical tongue- andgroove wains cot around the entire perimeter of the first floor, incorporating panels under each window with applied turned paterae. The porches have spindle friezes, turned posts, sawn (south) contains a kitchen and is bordered on the west by an enclosed porch incorporating an originally enclosed room (pantry?) at the south end. There is a fine original frame barn directly behind the house, which has a wood shingle roof, a louvered cupola, and several shed additions. It is unusual, not only for its decorative nature, but for its location on a suburban lot just east of Shelbyville.

The nominated area includes two contributing buildings.
