The barn at the Tate estate is a well constructed, multi-level farm utility structure.

The main portion of the structure is thirtyseven feet wide and fifty feet long, consisting of
a potato cellar, two corn storage rooms, an equipment storage room and a two level hayloft. There
are two sheds twelve feet wide and fifty feet long,
the one on the north for implement storage and one
on the south for horse stalls.

The roof of the Tate Barn is covered with hand-cut cypress shakes while the walls are covered with clapboard siding. The roof of the north shed projects from the north wall of the barn and its north edge is supported by six four-inch by six-inch posts. The posts are supported by solid isosceles shaped concrete blocks at their base, and braced at the top by two by four timbers that taper inward about two feet from the edge of the roof to the posts. The roof has an eight foot overhang on the west side and a two foot overhang on the east side.

The south shed has solid walls on its north, east and west sides, while the south side is mostly open with boards nailed horizontally across it much in the same manner as a wooden fence, with approximately a one foot opening between each board. The roof is covered with cypress shakes and is similar to that of the north shed.

The haylofts are loaded through two large horizontally sliding doors on the front (west) and rear (east) facades. A rail is suspended from and parallel to the ridge supporting a trolley and hook assembly for handling large loads.

The west elevation of the main section of the barn has five openings. The three lower doorways are entrances to different levels of the barn. Located in between and just above the south and central doorways is a sliding door which opens into a hayloft area. Another small swinging door is located above and north of the sliding door. The east elevation has four openings. The south end of this elevation has a ground level doorway. A sliding door is located above and north of the

#### 7. Description

ground level doorway and two small hinged openings are located in a horizontal line north of the sliding door.

The barn interior is a complex plan that has a total of five levels. The lowest level is the potato cellar, which is located in the northwest corner of the building. The entrance to the cellar is the north door of the west side of the barn. The center door of the main section of the barn leads to a hallway, which is the access to the other three levels. The hallway runs east and west with stairs on the west end at the entrance that ascend to the third level. The rooms on the third level are made accessible by a hallway that runs north and south and intersects the east-west hall forming a T-shape on the north side of the east-west wall. This level consists of two rooms located on either side of the north-south hall. On the south side of the intersection of the hall are a door and a stairway that leads to the east room of the second level. The west room of the second level is directly west of the east room and in the southwest corner of the barn.

The fourth and fifth levels are storage areas for hay and would be considered the barn loft. The access to the fourth level, which is one large room, is the stairway on the east end of the east-west hall. A small section of stairs on the north-central side of the fourth level leads to the fifth level, which is also one large open room used as a hayloft. There is a large sliding door on both the east and west sides of the fourth level with a small opening on the west end of the fifth level.

The barn is built of cypress timbers. The structural frame is a braced post and lintel system. The columns and beams are four by six inches in sectional dimension with two by six

joists and one by three stripping under the cypress shingles.

Because of the excellent weathering quality of its cypress timbers and the outstanding crafts-manship employed in its construction, Tate's Barn is in good physical condition.

The Tates were among the earliest settlers of Arkansas and were the first settlers of Ouachita County. In 1816 Captain Richard Tate, a veteran of the War of 1812, left North Carolina with Abe, his slave, seeking gold. After a short and unprofitable stay in Oklahoma, the Captain returned to Tennessee where some of his relatives lived.

In the fall 1818, however, he again headed west to Arkansas. On May 5, 1819, the boat became stranded on the Ouachita River, and the two men, master and slave, settled nearly on a spot thereafter known as Tate's Bluff. Ten years later, other Tate's followed. Richard's nephews, John Tate, who brought his wife and four sons; and William H. Tate, along with his wife and brother-in-law. Also included in the group were Richard's neice and her husband, Mr. Dousak Gates, and a Mr. Harrison and a Mr. Watkins.

Members of the family were, thus, prominent in Ouachita County from its first settlement. Judge W. F. Tate although born in Dallas County, was a descendent of Captain Tate and returned to that area his forbears had settled. Judge Tate served as county judge, and secretary of the school board for many years in addition to other interests.

Consequently, the Tate property has considerable local historical significance. However, the principal importance of the Tate Barn arises from its being nothing more or less than a first-class barn. Its five levels and its roof of hand-cut cypress shingles make it fairly elaborate for a farm building. This and its unaltered

state make it almost unique.

The structure was probably built during the 1880's, although the exact date of construction is uncertain. It is an excellent example and a well-preserved symbol of a life style that is rapidly disappearing from the Mid-South. When it was built the state was almost entirely rural, Little Rock and Fort Smith were only small towns; Fayetteville and Hot Springs, only large villages. No famous general ever quartered his horses at the Barn; no notorious desperadoes ever "hid out" from the law in the place; yet it remains a simple and rather dignified relic of the past.


