7. Narrative Description

The Davis Avenue Recreation Center is located at 1361 Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue in northwestern Mobile on the south side of MLK, facing north. The property is relatively flat with a play area for children located on the western end of the property and an Olympic sized swimming pool (circa 1970) located at the rear. The pool is noncontributing. Constructed in 1936, the recreation center is a one-story, structural tile building covered with stucco. It rests on a concrete foundation and has a gravel on tar flat roof.

The north facade features a slightly projecting central bay with an inset entryway supported by iron posts. Metal double doors are present along with large paned windows surrounding the door. Additionally, sash windows flank the entryway, two on the eastern side and one on the western.

The west elevation can be divided into three main portions. Eight sash windows and a fire exit is present along the first 1/3 of the elevation. The central portion of the elevation, which corresponds to the basketball court and is consequently taller than the rest of the building, features large-paned awning windows and a pair of metal double doors. Two windows along the rear portion of the west elevation have been covered with plywood.

The south elevation features four windows. Two of these windows on the western end have been covered with plywood, while the other two on the eastern end are sash windows. A centrally located fire exit is also present.

The east elevation is similar to the west. However, only five sash windows are present on the first 1/3 of the elevation. Also, no windows are present on the rear portion.

The double door entry opens into a large game room furnished with game tables. Double doors on either side of the gameroom lead to a classroom and computer room, respectively. A single doorway at the front of the room leads to an office. A pair of double doors at the rear of the gameroom leads to the basketball court. Two doorways along the rear wall of the court provide access to the stage and locker rooms. Two double door entrance/exits are located at either end of the basketball court. The floor is tile. The interior walls of the game room, classroom, and computer room are plaster, while the basketball court is painted tile. The ceilings are drop tile. The original ceiling has been dropped to provide for the addition of air conditioning (circa 1970). A clerestory, comprised of a total of twelve sash windows, is present along the central axis of the building.

The Davis Avenue Recreation Center retains its integrity of setting, location, design, materials, and workmanship.

8. Statement of Significance

The Davis Avenue Recreation Center is locally significant under Criterion A for ethnic heritage: black. The recreation center was established in 1921 as the Davis Avenue Community House. It was the first recreation center in Mobile established for African-Americans. In 1936, a new building was constructed to meet the growing demand of local residents for recreational activities. The recreational center is significant for its implementation of athletic programs for African-Americans living along Davis Avenue (now Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue). The period of significance for the Davis Avenue Recreation Center extends from 1936, the year it was constructed, to 1961, the fifty-year cut-off date, although it continues to be a recreation center enjoyed by residents of the neighborhood.

The Davis Avenue Recreation Center is also locally significant under National Register Criterion C in the area of architecture. The building is the only example of a recreational facility built for African-Americans in Mobile using WPA funding and utilizing early modernist design elements such as a geometrically precise aesthetic favoring volumetric forms devoid of applied pattern, texture or ornament, and an open interior arrangement with multi-purpose rooms illuminated by large expanses of plate glass windows. Additionally, no other recreational facilities were built in Mobile using WPA funds.

Historical Summary

Since African-Americans in Mobile were excluded from the larger white society by segregation in fact and later by law, an entire community, essentially a city within a city, developed along Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue. Beginning in the late 19th century and progressing into the early 20th, the community developed, and became known colloquially as "The Avenue". By 1920, "The Avenue", complete with its own churches, schools, recreational facilities, and businesses, reached its height and would continue to thrive and grow.

The 19th century saw the development of the recreational/sports facility. The YMCA, founded in London by George Williams in 1844, offered the first of these facilities. The YMCA was introduced into the U.S. in 1851. The organization grew rapidly, and by 1899 Mobile's branch was located in an impressive neoclassical building at Government and Conception Streets (NR listing 1974/demolished 2003). Each facility was staffed by local employees. Its primary goal was to provide the means by which a young man could maintain a healthy spirit, mind, and body. The YMCA branches offered structured sports instruction in basketball, volleyball, swimming, and racquetball. Weight rooms were also a common feature (www.wikipedia.org).

City recreational facilities adopted the YMCA model. Founded circa 1920, the Spring Hill Avenue Recreation Center is the oldest in Mobile (Bivens 2004, Appendix HH). This facility was for whites only. In 1921, the City of Mobile purchased land on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue from Dave Patton, a wealthy African-American businessman, and constructed the first recreation center for African-Americans.

The facility opened later that year and included tennis courts, a swimming pool, and a small park for children. The facility was originally named the Davis Avenue Community House before being changed to the Davis Avenue Recreation Center. The African-American- only facility was consistent with the "separate but equal" philosophy that dominated racial relations before the attainment of full civil rights (Ibid 2004, 147).

In 1936, the original 1921 building was demolished and a new, tile and brick building was constructed. Funding was provided by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). A small amount of funding was also made available by the city. In 1942, Joe Radford Thomas was hired as director of the facility. During his tenure, baseball, softball, and basketball programs were initiated. Thomas' stature and contributions to the community were such that the facility was renamed in his honor in 1973. He died in 1964 (Ibid 2004, 148).

During its 84 years, a number of the recreation center's local users have gone on to gain national fame including Henry "Hank" Aaron, Willie McCovey, Major General J. Gary Cooper, and others. Out of town visitors also included the singer Cab Calloway. The Davis Avenue Recreation Center is the second oldest recreational facility in Mobile and the oldest continuously operated facility in the African-American community (Ibid 2004, 148). Although integration has put an end to the segregated facilities of the South, the recreation center is still strongly identified with the African-American community of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue. Because of its pre-eminent position in the community, the facility is one of the foundations upon which the Avenue's heritage and culture is built.
