ESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Fine old <u>Greek Revival type</u> mansion in an attractive spacious garden setting, framed by Washingtonia Palm trees that soar 100 feet into the air. These line a semi-circular drive that leads to a beautifully proportioned graceful portico at the front of the house.

The house sits high on its foundation. The portico is reached by six steps. From this vantage point one can look up and down University Avenue, which is lined with attractive well-built homes. The portico is an arresting feature of the house. Its four channelled Ionic columns and four pilasters support a beautiful entablature and pediment, where dentil mouldings give emphasis to the entrance below by the lively effect they produce in their abrupt alteration of light and shade. The capitals at the top of the columns are carved in the manner of those on the Erechtheum, Temple of Minerva, Acropolis, Athens, Greece. There are four volutes on each capital and tying these scroll-like features together are egg and dart carvings. Just below these are beaded, carved bandings. Large dentil mouldings are carried around the house just below the roof line.

The house was designed by a well-known architect, T. Patterson Ross, 222 Sansome Street, San Francisco, California. His contractor, George Mosher, was a fine Palo Alto craftsman. The house remained firm during the 1906 earthquake, except its two brick chimneys toppled. Mr. Mosher not only directed workmen, but he was so dedicated that he hand polished the rosewood sliding doors and the rosewood mantle in the living room and parlor. His workmanship, together with well-chosen seasoned lumber, has endured the test of time. The house today is in good condition; there are few cracks and no evidence of a settling process.

Behind the formal Grecian facade, the Squire House is friendly and comfortable. Through a handsome oak door, one enters a reception hall which leads to a broad oak stairway. To the left is a 40' by 18' drawing room. The ceilings are high. A centered fireplace on the outside wall is flanked by two bay windows. At the far end of the room — through rosewood pannelled doors — is a small library.

Across the central hall from the living room is the "parlor". It too is entered through sliding rosewood doors. A bay window and an outside door overlook a terrace and porte cochere. Back of the parlor is a large dining room. Golden oak panelling has been used. A kitchen at the rear of the dining room is being remodeled. Down the central hall to the rear of the house is the maid's room, a full bath, and a rear stairway leads to the second and third floors of the house.

On the second floor there are five large bedrooms, a sleeping porch, sewing room, and a room-sized set of cedar closets. Off each bedroom are balconies and between each two rooms are recessed marble topped lavatory tressing tables.

7. Description

Above the second floor, a glorified attic, without partitions, covers the entire house. The floor is in excellent condition. There are four dormer windows and a skylight. A ladder leads to a trapdoor at the top of the attic through which one may ascend to a "Widow's Walk" at the top of the roof.

The entire house is steam heated by a basement furnace where there is a workroom and a laundry.

When Mr. Squire was alive, he built a meteorological laboratory. He was not only a Greek scholar and a professor of the classics, he was expert in the science of Weather and provided, free of charge, the official daily weather reports for the Palo Alto Times newspaper and other papers on the Peninsula. Below the Stars and Stripes on his flagpole, he ran up a daily weather flag. After he passed away in 1930, Mrs. Squire continued to live in the big house and to report the weather. The laboratory is no longer in existence.
