DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Holden Center District is located on both sides of Main Street at the intersection of Routes 122A and 31. Situated on a hill, it is composed of 11 structures, a common and a burial ground. Architecturally, the styles of the district range from late Georgian to Richardsonian Romanesque. The single most represented style, however, is Greek Revival. The district is generously shaded by a multitude of oak, maples and sycamores.

At the southeast corner of the district is the Damon Memorial Building (1), constructed in 1887. It is two stories high and its load bearing walls are constructed of a locally quarried brown stone in random ashlar. The asymmetrical facade is defined by a central round arched entry and balanced by a square 64' high bell/clock tower which has a hip roof on the east and a projecting bay with gable to the left. The west elevation is dominated by a large bow. Its Richardsonian Romanesque style is evidenced by the use of polychromatic stone and asymmetrical massing. It is further stated in the sparing use of a simple Romanesque order throughout.

The First Congregational Church (2) is directly west of the Damon Memorial Building and sited at the corner of Highland and Main Streets. Originally built in 1789 on an acre of land donated to the town by John Hancock for that purpose, the church was moved across the street to its present site in 1827. The church is a simple rectangular auditorium. The gable of the ridge roof faces Main Street. Fenestration is of varied styles and irregularly spaced. The entrance is enclosed in a gabled wing that projects from the facade. The double entrance doors are framed by a Georgian architrave with a broken triangular pediment and partially engaged urn ornament. Enclosing this is a large pediment. The gable of the entrance projection has a simple cornice and fan window. The base of the spire begins at the junction of the auditorium and the entrance projection. At the four corners of this base are octagonal pinnacles. The second stage of the tower is an octagonal bell housing with round arched louvered openings in the four major sides. This stage is topped by the octagonal spire.

To the west of the church is the Holden Town Hall (5). It was built in 1836 and designed by Martin Harrington. It is two and a half stories high. The gable end of the ridge roof faces Main Street and forms the pediment of the free-standing Doric portico. In the pediment are doubled windows with a balcony. The second floor of the building is known as Memorial Hall, dedicated to local soldiers who died in the Civil War.

The Holden Trowel Club (6) is sited near the corner of Main and Maple Streets, just west of the Town Hall. It was built in 1797 by Squire Lemuel Davis. This four-square, three story Federal¹ is constructed of brick and has a hipped roof topped by a cupola. Fenestration is 2/2 at the first floor, 6/6 at the second, and 6/3 at the third. All are capped by a jack arch lintel. The simple cornice is supported by a band of modillions. The facade is five bays wide. The center entrance is framed by side lights and a fan light. A rear kitchen ell and the front shed roof porch were added at a later date.

Across Maple Street is the First Baptist Church (7) and Parsonage (8). This large two story structure was built in 1835. The auditorium is four bays deep. The gable of the ridge roof faces Main Street. An entrance porch projects from the facade. The entrance is a single story, monumental in scale, with a Doric order temple facade. At the corners are pilasters, and the inset center entry is framed by two columns. Atop the roof of the auditorium is a three stage tower and spire. The first stage is a simple clapboarded base with a balustrade. The second stage has segmental arched, louvered openings on all four sides; above these openings are clock faces. There are also pilasters at the corners. The last stage is an octagonal spire topped by a weathervane. The Parsonage was built in 1848. The facade of this simple 2½ story Greek Revival house is three bays wide. The side elevations are four bays deep, and to the rear is a 1½ story ell. The walls are sheathed in clapboard and have open pilasters at the corners. Fenestration is six over six throughout and capped by a triangular molding at the first floor. A shed roof porch covers the first floor of the facade. The Parsonage was covered with aluminum siding in 1975.

Across Main Street from the Parsonage is the Red House (11). It was built about 1750 as a farm. The two story saltbox is three bays deep. The facade is eight bays wide and has entrances in the third and sixth bays. The house is sheathed in clapboards with simple corner boards. Fenestration is 2/2 and capped by a projecting flat pediment. The two entrance doors are Queen Anne style.

The Old Post Office (10) is a simple single story ridge roofed structure built in 1880. The gable faces Main Street and frames the plain storefront of center entry and large plate glass windows. Above the entrance is a projecting gable roof.

The General Store (9) was built in the 1840's by Samuel W. Armington. It is 2½ stories and has a ridge roof; the gable is parallel to the street. The facade is three bays wide. The building is sheathed in clapboard; the gable pediment of the facade is matched board. Fenestration is 6/6. The glass and aluminum storefront is the only incompatible element in the district.

The Old Burying Ground (3) is the original burying ground of the town and the original site of the First Congregational Church.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Holden Center Historic District is significant as the traditional center of the community and for its associations with people and events important to the history of Holden. The district is significant for its architectural cohesiveness as well.

The Holden Town Common (4) is a small greensward immediately in front of the Town Hall and First Congregational Church. It was a gift to the Town in 1789 by Governor John Hancock.

The Damon Memorial Building (1) was also a gift to the Town. It was designed in 1887 by Stephen C. Earle, a prominent Worcester architect. The building was the gift of Samuel G. Gale and his wife Susan Damon Gale. The structure is dedicated to the Damon family; they were long established Holden family prominent in town affairs. Originally, the building housed the high school as well as the town library.

The Town Hall (5) has been in continuous use as the center of the community's political life since it was constructed in 1836. Before its construction, the First Congregational Church (2) served as the town meetinghouse. This structure was constructed in 1789 and moved to its present site in 1827.

The Trowel Club (6) was built as a residence in 1787 by Lemuel Davis, who was the son of the first minister in town. Davis bought the land on which his house stands from John Hancock. Davis served as a selectman and was the town's first postmaster. Amasa Howe converted the house to an inn in 1875. In 1914 it was the Community House social and meeting center for the townspeople. In 1922 it was purchased by the Masonic Order.

The Baptist community in Holden constructed the First Baptist Church in 1835. After an unwelcome start in town, this denomination grew to be a thriving active element in the community.

Opposite the civic and religious center of the town is the small commercial area. The Red House (11) was originally built as a farmhouse. During the French and Indian Wars it was used to store munitions. The second floor was used to train Revolutionary War recruits. Later the front room was the first post office and a cobbler's shop was located in the basement.

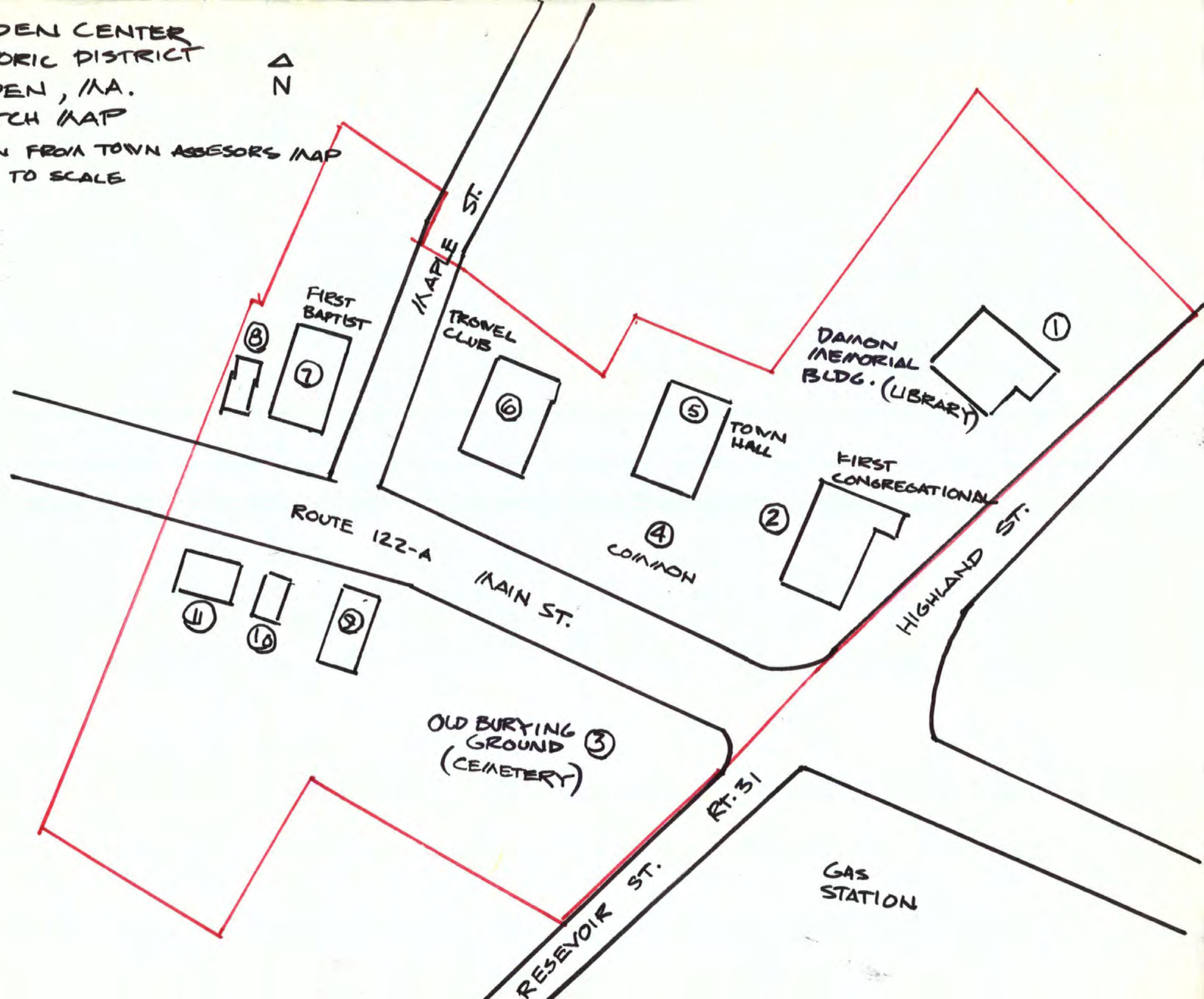
