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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The C.S. Norton Mansion, completed in 1897 is built of royal blue Bedford Limestone. It is a cubical structure with a hip roof with gabled dormers to the rear and a shed roofed dormer pierced by a decorated chimney on the front facade. On the right front corner a cylindrical tower rises the full two stories and is topped by a conical roof with a small finial. A one story portico over the main entry extends from the central chimney around the corner. This predominate feature has rounded corners and is supported by paired Ionic columns.

The left side of the house has a porte cochere and the right an two 1/2 story extension with a porch on the second floor. There has been a non-conforming porch added to the rear of the building recently.

The entire building is constructed of royal blue Bedford Limestone laid in alternated wide and narrow courses and rusticated with the exception of a band around the tower. Ionic pilasters appear on the facade corners and below the smooth stne band in the tower. The windows are one over one sash type with curved glass to match the curve of the tower. In general there is a minimum of fenestration and windows do not form a dominant factor in the building.

Because this structure was used as a school administration building for some years the interior has undergone some changes but a majority of the original fabric is extant. The building is in generally sound condition but does need some maintenance,

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The C.S. Norton Mansion was built during the years of prosperity in the Indiana Limestone Industry. The builder, Clint Norton, was having years of financial reward with his Royal Blue Quarry, located at the west end of what is now known as Norton Lane.

His "Royal Blue" stone was so much in demand through the country, a couple of Nortons' jobs of prized Blue Stone were the front of the New York Commercial Office and part of the St. Louis Depot. The Norton Mansion was also built with the Royal Blue Stone.

Clint and Kate Norton, working with architects, designed their new home. Many of the large stones were cut at the building site and then lifted into place. The elegant carvings in the front of the house, and in the main fireplace, were probably done at the mill, then brought to the house with horse drawn wagons.

The year 1913 brought a drastic slowdown to the Limestone industry and the Nortons were forced to sell their home. It was purchased by the Bedford Stone Club for \$15,800.00. The Stone Club used the mansion to entertain wealthy out of towners involved with the Indiana Limestone Industry.

In 1928 the building was purchased by the Bedford City Schools and has been used as an administrative office since that time.

As a sophisticated limestone building using the best stone and workmanship it is a symbol of an industry so important in Bedford. It is also significant as a statement of what a prosperous leader in the stone industry considered ideal.

Good morning Frank and Paul:

I was wondering if either of you were familiar with an architect named Milton C. Pritchett who resided in New Albany and had an architectural practice in Bedford. Time frame would have been the late 1880s through 1920s. What started this interest was a series of original photographs that surfaced around Christmas on E-Bay and at a local antiques shop of some furniture and other artwork that Pritchett and his wife Mary created and were displayed at the Southern Exposition in Louisville in 1883. Pritchett lived and designed his residence in the Silver Hills Section of New Albany and supposedly also designed several other early residences on Ridgeway Ave – all in a Queen Anne style with some Shingle influences. David Barksdale, Floyd County historian, and I have subsequently been attempting to research his works and with the help of Joyce Shepherd at the Lawrence County Museum, have been locating some of his known work. We also have knowledge of a now lost house in Bloomington and an extant house in Greencastle that have a likely Pritchett connection.

I attempted to search his name in the SHAARD database, but did not find anything. Curious if this name is one you may have come across. Will forward some other interesting materials we are discovering. Below is an image of one of the pieces of furniture Pritchett is known to have designed. It, along with a communion table, is found in its original setting in present day St. John Presbyterian Church in New Albany.
